EARLY TWIN FALLS SUBJECT OF PAPER BY FIRST MAYOR

S. T. Hamilton Tells Story of Transition from the Sage Brush Period to the Era of Civilization; Pioneers Are Named in Article.

The first jail was built up 1841 by W. G. Clarke, Fred E. Rainey and S. T. Hamilton. The structure was of two-story brick and shiplap, together with barred windows and a concrete floor. The building may still be seen at the city park of the city. After the construction of the jail, the city pulled this building about 1865.

The first store was erected by Kimberly and was operated only a short time, until the Calzadito Mining and Elevator company constructed a store at Twin Falls in charge of L. I. Breckenridge who continues to represent the company.

The first bridge across Cook creek was constructed in 1856 by contribution of the owners of city lots, and was used until the present firm and structure replaced it.

Sveels' Had Auto.

The first automobile was brought to the town by J. R. Sweels. No record was kept of the number of automobiles that ran away by this car.

The first garage was established by J. E. East on Second avenue south and the judges has given to an extent evidenced by the dismantled structure now occupied by the Lant Automobile company.

The first bank established by Twin Falls was the First National Bank in the spring of 1905 in charge of John M. Maxwell, who continues as its cashier. The bank was located in Block 103 adjoining the Twin Falls Investment company's office. The bank was continued until moving to its present quarters.

The first abstract business was by Canada County Abstract company, which was succeeded by the Twin Falls Title and Abstract Company.

The first commercial hotel was organized in 1866 and has continued to the benefit of the people of Idaho. The first newspaper was the Twin Falls News, which was developed into a leading daily in the state.

The first post office was established in 1842. It was located on Second street east.

The first hospital was on Second avenue south in the summer of 1905

when but one thought could be had— "What will make this tract bigger and better?"

It is an esteemed privilege to have shared the joys and felt the sorrows of those who played their parts on the stage of early development and progress. Pioneer life was of short duration but it was none the less real during the first years.

Hundreds of dollars worth of damage was done and the new furniture store building of Twin Falls, as well as an adjoining structure, were seriously gutted by a fire from an unknown cause which broke out at 276 Main avenue night this morning at 11 o'clock.

The old building was occupied by an auto working concern, established by W. T. Seal, now of Idaho, and temporarily in charge of O. S. Shawney, in behalf of the manager and associate owner, J. M. Blaes. The adjoining structure, which was also occupied, was occupied by the shoe repairing shop of J. L. Gray and the Linnemann-Russell company.

A department and many posts were touched by the flames in this auto wreacking establishment and the chimney was injured. Contents of the adjoining building, which is owned by Mrs. Blaes' care, other contained damaged.

Loss Not Great. The total loss so far as can be ascertained will be less than \$200,000. Of this, approximately \$125,000 will be in the auto repair and wreacking establishment where a complete estimate showed the loss in \$60,000 and the loss to the building, \$75,000.

The building is owned by A. S. Gray and the Linnemann-Russell company. The news were withheld earlier by mistake. The fire started in the building at about 11:00 p. m.
