

LUCY HART SESSIONS ARE BEGUN

Chorus of 62,000 Children Formally Open Second Day's Services.

Pageantry of Ancient Romans Displayed Before Thousands at Athletic Stadium.

(By J. J. O'BRIEN.)
CHICAGO, June 21.—A chorus of 62,000 children lifted their voices in praise and thanksgiving to Christ, their Eucharistic King, here today in the greatest religious gathering ever held on American soil.

In a setting that exalted in splendor and ceremony the pageantry of ancient Rome, the festival for the children was united with the voice of Chicago's parochial school children in this most elaborate spectacle of the Eucharistic congress.

The commercial life of a great city was still as the services got under way. Thousands filled the sidewalks and the sky-scrapers along Michigan boulevard to watch the pageantry.

The procession marched into the stadium on 30 a. m. led by the white-coated priests. They were followed by the higher church prelates, who came in the order of their rank ending with the twelve cardinals.

One hundred thousand people were gathered on the streets and lanes leading to the field. Another 100,000 were bunched in the open places between the field museum and the stadium entrance.

Police had difficulty in keeping the crowds from climbing a 100 foot radio tower and many of the hardy scaled the heights of the tower for an extraordinary position from which to see the spectacle.

COMPROMISE MAY RESULT IN GERMANY

Government to Push Measure Providing for Partial Retention of Estates.

BERLIN, June 21.—Even though the failure of the anti-monarchist appropriation bill frustrates the confidence of the former dignitary, President Ebert is estimated at a billion dollars, he is by no means a forlorn conclusion that these immense riches will be returned intact to their previous owners.

The government is still confronted by a powerful opposition which could be derided at the risk of provoking serious political consequences and perhaps even violent outbreaks.

Following Ebert's referendum in which the move to retain the treasure was defeated, the government today announced that it would inaugurate a compromise bill through the Reichstag whereby the state retains a part of this valuable property, while the remainder is given to the ex-overthrown monarchs and their families.

One of the most significant features of the referendum is that, 15,000 German citizens have reaffirmed their opposition to the old regime by voting for expropriation of the estates of the fallen rulers.

The final vote in the referendum yesterday stood:
For expropriation, 14,859,000.
Against expropriation, 53,000.

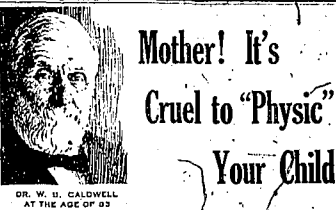

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
