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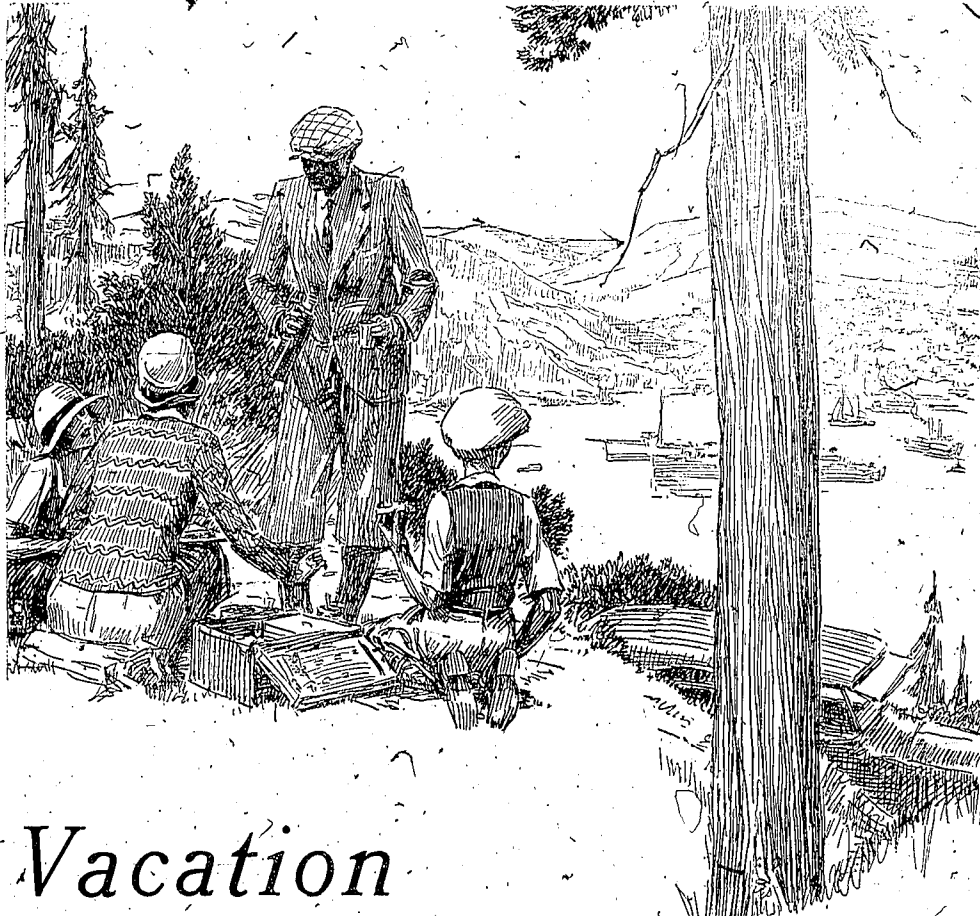





Take a good look at father and see what the years and the storms of life have done to and for him, and how he has become weathered, how storms have shaken his pace plucked at his hair and put the stoop in his shoulders and tinged his morning stubble with desolate gray.

This is no plea for father. He does not want it nor does he want either sympathy, pity or consolation, and he does not care to be looked upon with an eye which dims nor spoken to with a voice which grows a bit husky when the thoughts come of "poor old dad," for he is a dependable piece of furniture, quite capable in most instances, of taking care of himself and quite a few others, for that is his job and he goes through with it.

Father is a veteran who has seen and been through many campaigns and who bears the scars of the battle of life, and he is not a very romantic individual as a usual thing and you would have to look twice at him in order to comprehend, perhaps, that he represents a sturdy and dependable nature who hoists his burden to his shoulders and tramps along the highway of life bearing his cross with the lily murmur of complaint, if any, and in most cases right cheerfully.

The flower that has been chosen to represent father is the dandelion and those who are acquainted with the reason might be guilty of a quiet smile if not a real loud guffaw. It is men of that kind who have held high office who undermine the public confidence.—Nevada State Journal.

In a statement today, Editor Donald Wood said that most issues dividing these producers and handlers are taken up.

Topics for discussion. Among the topics named are the following: "What are the prevailing manufacturing problems in which help is needed?"

What steps should be taken by the state bureau of dairying to help to improve the quality of raw materials? What do you think of the special ruling regarding the return of buttermilk, skim-milk, and whey in the milk and cream cans, and the weighing and certifying of the cans?

Are you in favor of forming a district butter and cheese makers association that will be a part of a state-wide organization? Would you be interested in a demonstration school on factory efficiency and manufacturing problems to be held in different districts of the state this winter?

Would you be interested in a joint state and federal inspection service on products shipped out of the state? This service gives a federal certificate of grade on every lot of butter, cheese, or eggs.

Should the state bureau of dairying promulgate standards of composition on butter, cheese and cream and also on eggs, and a price schedule to the Idaho manufacturers against the practices of outside of state manufacturers dumping old standard products into Idaho in order to sell?

Should a dairy legislative committee be formed? Should a dairy legislative committee representative of all interests be formed? What other matters have you for discussion?

PROGRESSIVES ARE ATTEMPTING TO MANEUVER BOURBONS OVER CLIFF

Writer Questions Action of Ada County Progressives in Declaring Against Fusion of Parties After Five Meetings Throughout Southern Idaho; Rumored State Body Has Acted Against Proposed Merger.

By A. F. DOOLEY HIDDLEBOHN.—Now it appears that the Progressives are endeavoring to maneuver the Democrats over the cliff. After sectional conferences of Democrats in five points in southern Idaho and adopted resolutions recommending that their state committee, nominating the Progressives for office in the coming campaign, the Ada county Progressive committee meets and declares against fusion.

Apparently the Ada county committee might not be assumed to speak for the party in general, but practically speaking it would hardly make any difference calculated to "run the wheels" of a program to which the state committee was committed.

Democrats to Meet. And that matter, it is being said, although no such action was made public at the time, that the Progressive state committee when it met in Boise May 26 adopted a resolution expressly rejecting a fusion and calling for a complete Progressive ticket.

The Ada county declaration was received by the first gathering of Democrats in the expressions of the Democrats on the fusion proposal.

The Democrats have not been heard from, and their state committee has taken no action in its meeting in called for June 28. Nevertheless the Progressives have apparently a decided strategic advantage in dealing with them.

Whereas, the Progressive party in Idaho has a record against corruption and malfeasance of both old parties.

Do it resolved, that we, the Ada county Progressive central committee, are absolutely opposed to fusion with any party, Republican, Democrat or Socialist.

Do it further resolved, that we invite the progressives of both old parties to join our party and help our selected Progressives to be candidates on our ticket.

A clause of the resolution adopted May 26 by the Progressive state central committee, for comparison, was this: "Resolved, that we invite the progressives of both old parties to join our Progressive party movement."

As it stands, the Progressives feel free to nominate a full ticket, and to choose for places on that ticket men well known as Democrats. They infer that this may be some kind of fusion they will maintain—places that they will not leave blank places and allow the Democrats they favor to be carried on a Democratic ticket.

Danger Ahead. And they profess to believe that the Democrats will be almost forced to agree with any and these candidates if the Democratic vote in 1924, a presidential year, was less than 20,000, it might shrink to 14,000 in 1926—less than 10 per cent required by law to give the party continued recognition. Or if a check-and-balance ballot were agreed on and those candidates not allowed to the Democrats failed to poll 14,000, the effect would be the same. This danger, Progressives say, is acute.
