SAMUELS AND REPUBLICAN PRESS

The Idaho Free Press complains that the Republican press is ignoring the Samuels race at 47 pages because its owner is a progressive. That is mild, compared with what that press did to Alexander. Three weeks before the election of 1922, all conceded that Alexander would be elected should the vote be taken at that time. Then an organ of misrepresentation was let loose, coupled with the cry "Mose is slipping." Democrats by the thousands got scared, many in a panic rushed into the Samuels ranks. As a last blast, Alexander's free temporary loan to the national guard, his most patriotic act, approved by a republican attorney general, was represented as an attempted graft, after all his papers except the Times had been issued for the last time. And except where the Times circulated, Alexander lost votes, many of whom Samuels gained. In consequence Alexander dropped to third place, though increasing the Samuels vote was not the primary intention of the machine. Knowing that Alexander would be elected they wanted to take his votes, for Moore if possible, but take them in any event.

Senator Jones, of New Mexico, declared that while he would vote for the amended Haugen bill as a makeshift emergency measure, the true remedy consisted of adopting a tariff policy which would open foreign markets now closed to farm products. This was the doctrine of Thomas Jefferson as a permanent policy—a reciprocity. It later found favor with Tyler, a whig, Douglas and Buchanan, and later had not only democratic endorsement but was advocated by Garfield, Blaine, Harrison, McKinley, Roosevelt and Taft.

BORAH RAPPED IN NEW YORK PAPERS

The Idaho Statesman, commenting on the attitude of the New York newspaper refers to that city as the most "un-American in the United States," and says of Idaho in comparison to New York:

Idaho has no very rich people, no real poverty, no class feeling. Our people have money enough to travel the world around. Many of them go to New York each year and observe the perfect organization there for robbing the stranger—cloak-room handlets, theatre manager handlets, head waiter handlets, taxi handlets, hotel handlets, shopkeeper handlets. They know that New York takes immense tribute from every branch of business in the United States. The robber barons of the Rhine were pikers in comparison. Our people would rather have a few gopher holes around our homes than face a mass of handlet gravers. And after visiting New York they still think our gopher holes were gentlemen and sportsmen; they took villages. The article in the Statesman goes further and informs the "effete east" that were it not for the best young blood of the west going to the halls of national legislation the entire country would go to the "denimition boys-crows" or some other such place.

Etrogens Dispose of Much
Stock in the United States
During Year.

WASHINGTON—Foreign securities
publicly offered and sold in the United
States during the past year were
more than double those sold during
1925 and exceeded by more than
\$200,000,000, the amount sold during
1925, according to figures compiled by
the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic
Commerce of the department of
commerce.

The largest volume of foreign securities
publicly offered in this country
last year reached \$128,488,294, the
Bureau reported, while the figure for
the previous year was \$53,816,500 and
\$84,255,000 in 1923. The 1925 figure
was only slightly exceeded in the peak
years of 1918 and 1920, when the
 Anglo-French loans were offered in the
American market.

Of the families borrowed last year,
\$12,720,000 consisted of securities
used by corporations solely on their
own credit, the remainder representing
government, provincial, municipal,
municipal funds, including corporate
issues, guaranteed by government
securities.

The marked increase in foreign securities
was attributed by the Bureau to
a number of factors. Three of the
factors included the increase of foreign
American investors in foreign
securities, acceptance of the
 Dawes plan, and the abnormal low
prices in New York which attracted
 foreign strength to the outward flow
of capital.

Europe the largest borrower,
Europe borrowed \$67,770,000 for
more than any other region of the
world. Of this total only \$40,000,000
were returning, leaving a net borrowing
of about \$27,770,000. This was an
increase of about \$44,000,000 over
the preceding year, and about
\$12,000,000 over 1925.

Part of the amount was borrowed for
financial reconstruction.
The German government loan of
\$10,000,000, provided for in the Dawes
plan, served the two-fold purpose of
increasing the gold reserve in the
Reichsbank and providing means for
the financing of reparations in
kind.

The French loan of \$100,000,000 is
being used largely for exchange
stabilization.
Part of the Belgian loan, amounting
to \$50,000,000, will be used for
consolidation.

Other loans made primarily for production
purposes, such as the French
railway loan, have, nevertheless, had
beneficial effects on exchange stabilization
point of view.

Distribution of loans.
Canada and Newfoundland sold securities
to the United States to the amount
of \$24,258,814, of which
\$12,250,000, representing returning
loans, was included in the total.
The balance of \$12,008,814 was
used to acquire \$50,000,000, was
received for the total completed with
1925, and a decrease of about \$70,
million from the 1924 figure.

Portions of several issues that were
sold in Canada in previous years were
offered in the United States in 1926.
A number of offerings, such as the
\$50,000,000 one year Dominion
notes, are short term and therefore
may represent only a temporary
investment.

Latin-American loans during the
past year amounted to \$37,275,000
and represented \$19,875,000 new
investments. About 25 per cent of
the total consisted of corporate
issues, while government securities
represented 75 per cent. The total
amount borrowed increased
\$15,390,000. This represented an increase
of about \$30,000,000 over the
1925 figure and about equal to the
1923 figure.

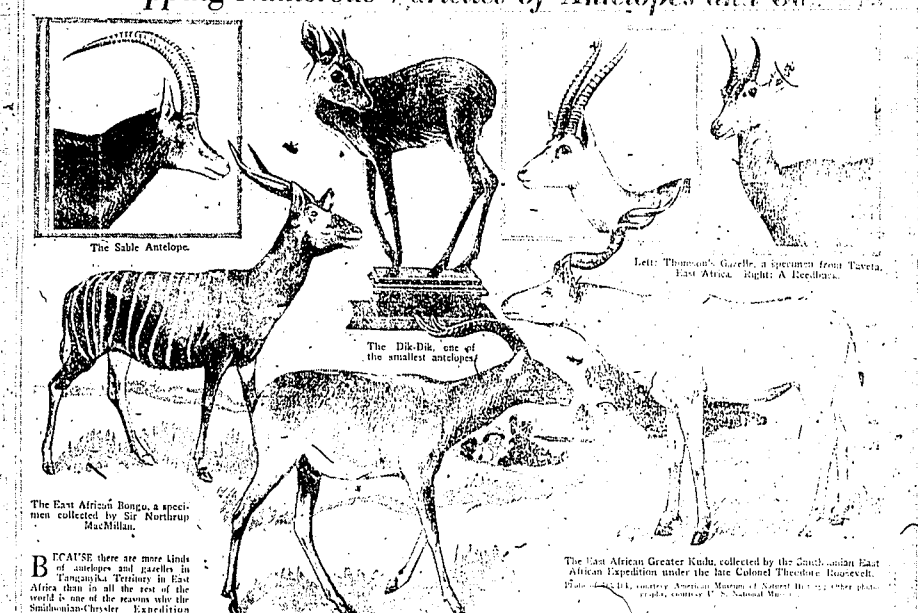
