Steam-Cleaning Stone

Heavy-duty stone polishing that blots high with shine between clean, new structures can now be steam cleaned so that they not merely look almost as good as new, but attain the method, reduced look of the age. The Bureau of Standards has conducted a series of tests to determine the best way of cleaning buildings. This method of cleaning buildings, with fresh methods of acid cleaning, and blasting, scrubbing with soap powders and hand brushes are effective, but very slow and laborious.

Like steam cleaning was first tried on dirty stones in the laboratory, and then on twenty-year old accumulation of dirt on an old bank building in Baltimore. The result showed that this new method could be used rapidly with unexpected common labor, although the cost is somewhat higher than for acid cleaning. The cost is expected to drop when the method passes the experimental stage.

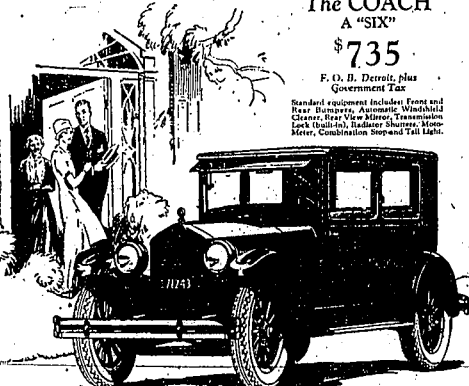

Thatched Roofs Still Common in England

One of the oldest crafts in England is that of thatching in Norfolk, where by thatched roofs still pass along the streams covering some who add gables for the roof. When roof-wood is in full swing huge piles of dried reeds stand along the banks waiting for the thatchers. Thatching is really one of the ancient arts hereditary in certain families in that country. One family has engaged in the occupation through four centuries.

Only one change has been made in the process during the 400 years. Formerly the reeds were bound to rafters with long strands of braided hair. Now either tarred twine or iron pegs are used. It is said that the thatched roofs are being put on the roofs that tops are still laid in place with a bit trowel known as the bogot. This implement consists of a block of wood with comb-like arrangement of horizontal nails.

That funny fellow at the Twin Falls and Blvd chautauque certainly said some real sharp things. It got right under a fellow's hide and if the gentler sex took their advice as willingly as the men then we will all do better.

Many homes have been entered by petty thieves of late and the officers are urging that when people go away for a vacation or on business that they leave some one in charge of their home. That is leave the key with some neighbor so they can go in and out and detect anything which may go wrong. The officers should watch carefully and hunt down these petty thieves who are pilfering homes.

The pageant to be presented here next Monday will be more than a display. It will be a real educational program with a great purpose back of it. People should stop to consider more than usual at this 150th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. It means much and we should think back what this liberty has cost and what we are going to do to perpetuate this idea of American independence.

The program presented last evening at the Twin Falls chautauque was by far the most interesting and gave evidence of great talent and remarkable ability in many lines. Rattor is certainly a splendid entertainer and his interpretation of the music masters is far superior to the average platform man in this line of endeavor. The Philharmonic Ensemble is a very unusual group of musicians and their program last evening was heartily appreciated.

'GREATER AMERICA DAY' IS CELEBRATED TODAY

One day Thomas Jefferson sat in the White House pondering on a report before him announcing that through a secret treaty Louisiana had been acquired by Napoleon. His prescient mind contemplated all the possibilities at a glance. For years he had considered the acquisition of New Orleans and the control of the Mississippi river essential to the prosperity and the safety of the nation. This secret treaty presented a barrier that might be insurmountable. Worse: it constituted an imperial threat, for what nation could have a sense of security with the ambitions Napoleon as a neighbor?

With Jefferson to conceive was to execute. He took up his pen and wrote to our Minister in Paris that "France assumes to us an attitude of defiance"; and that the situation thus created might necessitate a defensive alliance with England. The Minister was instructed to frankly state the danger to the Government of France with the statement that "nothing since the Revolutionary War has produced more uneasy sensations through the body of the nation."

Tallyrand was Napoleon's minister, and Tallyrand was cold. Meanwhile the fighting spirit of our western settlers was aroused and party politics fanned the smoldering fire, threatening a flame.

In the crisis, Jefferson appointed James Monroe as special envoy to negotiate with our minister in Paris; secured an appropriation of two million dollars to be used in the event it could be used for the purchase of New Orleans, and the provinces of Florida; and instructed Monroe that on his mission "depend the future destinies of the republic."

Not all American statesmen saw it—Jefferson did! Then Napoleon, his eye on European wars, needed money. The hour was ripe. The whole of Louisiana was offered for ten times the amount available. The American minister and Monroe, knowing the views of Jefferson, seized the opportunity, took the responsibility, secured an even better price, and a vast empire, one of the richest in the world, passed to America for about \$11,250,000.

Thus without drawing of a sword, without the shedding of a drop of blood, without the crime of conquest, America, in territorial extent, became one of the greatest nations on the globe.

It was the crowning achievement of the administrations of the man who a little while before sat pondering on the report which carried a sinister threat to the security of the young republic.

Thus many Americans today rejoice over peaceful acquisition of an empire that compromised no American principle and brings no blush of shame.

ZONED CITIES IN U. S. SHOW RAPID INCREASE

WASHINGTON, June 29.—More than 27,000,000 people live in zoned cities in the United States today while less than 100,000 had in 1910.

Reports to the commerce department indicate 436 municipalities have zoning regulations, now while only six cities of the country were zoned in 1916.

NEW PRISM TO AID SCIENTISTS

LONDON.—A small specially manufactured prism is being used by a French physicist, with which science hopes to learn the real truth about the aurora borealis. It is waiting its first opportunity for use in the observatory of the Lullier observatory.

The physicist says that the prism is a reflection of the light of the sun. The new theory adopted by the Lullier physicist is that the aurora is a discharge of the upper atmosphere, probably set up by particles emitted from sun spots.

"The approach this year of the maximum number of sun spots, which have been observed to date every 11 years, may bring the most favorable conditions for the aurora, which is increasing in its number of appearances within the past few months," Herbert Dudley, assistant professor of astrophysics at the Imperial college told the United Press.

DURKIN TRIAL NEARING END

CHICAGO, July 1.—Martha Durkin, alleged slayer of Federal Agent Edward J. Shanahan, today was placed in the automobile from which he fled the fatal shot, while attorneys for the state maintained to the jury that the government had Durkin and not Shanahan fired.

Activities of the court in which Durkin is being tried were transferred from the crowded court room to the jail yard where Durkin's own attorneys were parked. Durkin was asked to take his seat at the wheel while the state's attorney demonstrated to the jury that if Shanahan had opened the apartment while the woman was still in his seat, the shot would have passed through his head.

Durkin came out of the courtroom without a scratch and this, according to the state's argument that it was he who opened fire as soon as he saw Shanahan.

HANABETH STATE CAUSES GOVERNOR TO RESIGN

MEXICO CITY, June 29.—Governor Valentin G. Elizondo, 37th governor of Mexico, today announced his resignation on the ground that the state is hopelessly bankrupt and that he cannot correct the condition.

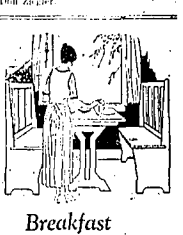

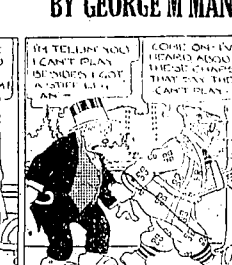
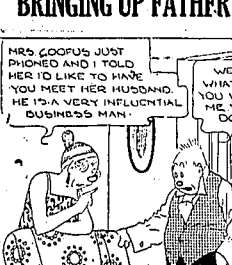
