## CHIEF JUSTICE PAYS TRIBUTE TO JEFFERSON

Head of the Idaho Supreme Court Tolls of the Day—Honorable Chief Justice W. A. Lee, of the Idaho court, paid tribute yesterday in his address at the park in this city, when he was introduced by Mayor R. E. Ashton.

Eloquent tribute was paid to the achievements, principles and high ideals of Thomas Jefferson by Chief Justice W. A. Lee, of the Idaho court, yesterday in his address at the park in this city, when he was introduced by Mayor R. E. Ashton.

The speaker dealt in particular on the far-reaching effects of the Louisiana purchase which he believed to be the greatest act of the "Age of Monticello," but he gave little credit to his comprehensive statement of the history of the public school system as well as in regard to his opposition to slavery.

Opposes Slavery

Chief Justice Jefferson in opposition to slavery Chief Justice Lee said:

"When the times, custom and social conditions of the nation are considered, this act on the part of Jefferson is not only one of the greatest acts of his life, but it is one of the greatest acts of his age. It shows he possessed moral courage of the highest order. It will be remembered that among the colonies, both north and south, including his own Virginia, slavery was then recognized as an established institution."

"It must always remain to the credit of Thomas Jefferson that among his first acts as a lawyer in the legislature of his home colony of Virginia, he placed himself squarely on record as opposed to human slavery. Had the people of the colonies possessed the same far-sighted vision that Jefferson manifested by his attitude on the question, the subsequent evils that followed, including the great Civil war, those that came after it during the reconstruction period, the cooperation of the Civil War, and the evils that have since followed, would have been avoided."

The greatest events in the history of this nation, covering the period prior to the adoption of the constitution, including the great Civil War, the death of Mr. Jefferson July 4, 1826, two years ago, are so interwoven in the work and teachings of this great

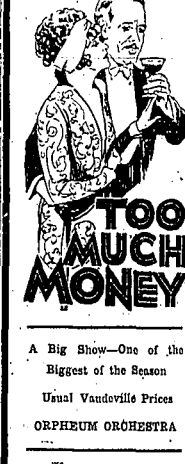

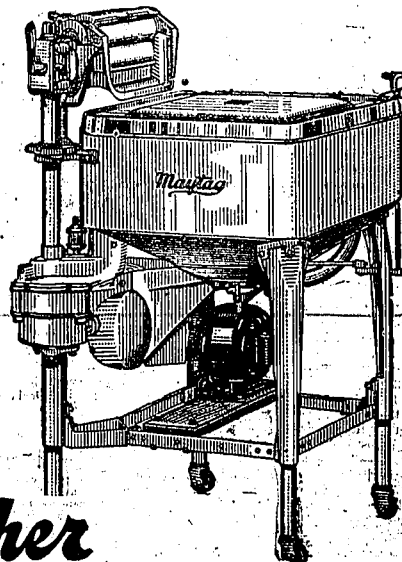

**BOARD OF SAFETY CONTINUES** to urge the construction of automobiles and all in reducing the accident toll was required.

Secretary of Commerce Hoover, chairman of the National Conference for Street and Highway Safety, met recently in Washington.

This meeting was presided over by Fred W. Johnson, of Philadelphia, who is known as the father of "safety first."

It is probably the earliest pioneer in the safety movement in this country. In the conference, which had been called by President Coolidge and was attended by representatives from every state in the Union, his was the only vote that championed the foot-proof car.

While admitting the desirability of many drivers, Mr. Johnson insisted to the manufacturers of the automobile, whom he declared were also partially responsible for the growing hazard of the highways. In urging the establishment of a "Safety Board of Control" to encourage the manufacture of "foot-proof cars," Mr. Johnson suggested that it be composed of manufacturers or their representatives.

In proposing his new approach to the solution of the highway problem, Mr. Johnson declared that automobile manufacturers have a direct responsibility to the public and that every motorist and driver has a right to expect the machine he buys is made of safe materials in construction, design and equipment.

"It is a serious question whether manufacturers in the past have given adequate thought to the element of safety in the cars they have sold to the general public," he asserted.

**Manufacturer's Responsibility**

"Over a period of years our motor car manufacturers have striven for comfort, convenience, roominess, high speed, low cost, beauty of design, luxurious fittings and other great cost of durability. Little thought seems to have been given to the safety factor since."

"On the contrary, every effort has been made by industrial manufacturers to stimulate purchasing by speed and other enterprises."

"In the last few years have advanced prominently the safety factor which has destroyed many thousands of lives and maimed and mangled many others upon countless other thousands."

"The situation is fortunate in that the interest of business is also the interest of the public. There is no conflict. The manufacturer desires that his consumer shall receive the most safety devices that are impractical."

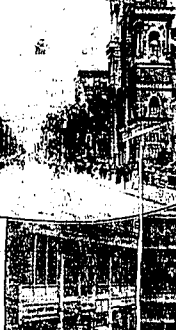

"We must take a leaf from the experience of the railroads and adapt entirely the construction of automobiles just as this type of railway coaches. The strict construction permits much smaller windshield posts and at the same time provides protection when accidents are unavoidable. If they are unavoidable, if they will not suffer or burn, and it takes a great force to crush it."

**All-Steel Body Important**

"The all-steel body is one of the most important considerations in making automobiles safer. The problem of efficient brakes is also important. Brakes should be designed to require a little adjustment in a month and should be adequate for all emergencies. The larger the surface of the tire on the road the greater the limiting capacity."

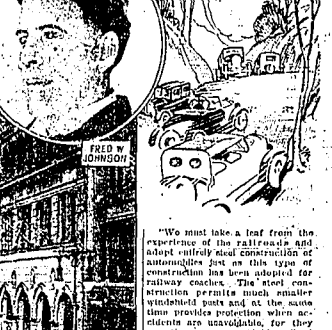
"There are unnumbered other details of which have their specific importance. The steering gear should respond quickly and easily. Body parts should never be based on the front wheels. Many types of bumpers are dangerous. They should all be a standard height from the road so they will not strike and hurt, or in the case of many new trucks, the clothes of pedestrians who pass too close to the wheels. The intensity of headlights should be limited within the bounds of actual needs for moderate driving and should be uniform all over the country."

"I do not believe in a legislative remedy where it can be avoided. Much can be done by education, particularly in the case of closed cars proof cars. But it is impossible to educate all the drivers, and even if they were, the other ten per cent would be a deadly menace to all two seconds away, or a pedestrian crossing the street."



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## PROGRESSIVE BELLS WHY FIFSON FAILS IN IDAHO TODAY

The following communication from progressive candidate for congress in 1922, Hon. Don Dunning of Idaho, present his views on the failure of the progressive party in Idaho to get together.

And that time I joined the new movement, helped in my poor way to organize it and spent several months in the campaign. It was a futile attempt to harmonize the warring elements. The causes of the failure of 1918 are now more manifestly seen. It is the organized opposition of all parties that neither the leaders of the democratic party or the non-partisan league were able to overcome and reconciliation and good will were necessary to weld together the various forces of progress for a new campaign, whose great necessity was to better opportunities for the coming generation, and not merely an attempt to grab the political offices.

And although the original victory failed for want of the right split on the part of both, the experience of the last several years has convinced the leaders of at least the democratic party, and undoubtedly 30 per cent of the rank and file of both parties, that the only

and sound policy now is to forget the sad experience of the past, get rid of the selfishness, bitterness and ill-will, and get together on the common ground of the interests of the men and women and children of the entire state. The only way which shall be based on the greatest good of all.
