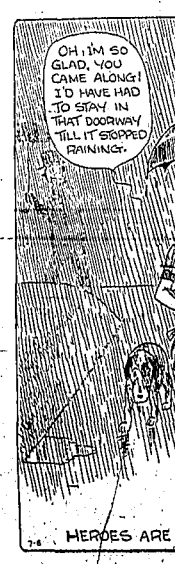

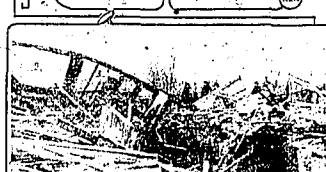

IDAHO FAIR TRADE LAWS VIOLATED

Prosecution of employees of Swift & Company at Caldwell for alleged illegal practices in testing milk, including lack of license by the tester, manipulating the testing apparatus and failure to make legal reports, is commendable if such practices are being carried on. The complaints are signed by Ronald Wood, state director of the bureau on dairymen.

Another matter pending in the courts against several big dairymen concerns his to do with alleged violations of the fair trade laws of Idaho. Some years ago, some concerns on the northside were charged with such violations, and were enjoined in the court of Judge H. C. Eason. The allegation was that they were paying more for cream at competitive points than at others in order to freeze out smaller concerns. After Judge Eason had decided against them on hearing on the temporary injunction, they agreed with the complaining concerns to allow the injunction to be made permanent without such agreement being held in an admission of guilt. Of course, this was all that the small companies wanted, since it stopped the illegal practice complained of.

Recently when several suits of the same character were started, it was stated that the big concerns would fight and would test the constitutionality of the law.

The law is a good one and should be enforced. Accompanied by strict enforcement of the state anti-trust law it ought to solve the local trust problem in Idaho.

There is no valid reason why any concern should not pay as high price as trade conditions warrant or demand, provided it trades fairly and obeys the law.

Unfortunately trusts frequently do not obey the law when it suits them to break it. It is notorious that the Great Western Sugar company was charged fraudulently with driving a competitor out of considerable territory this year by violation of fair trade principles. PROSPECTS FOR LIMITATION OF ARMS ARE NOT BRILLIANT

GENEVA, July 7.—Prospects of early and effective limitation of armaments as a result of the two weeks session of the League of Nations disarmament commission are not bright today as the delegates return upon three weeks adjournment.

The problems on disarmament have been more clearly defined and with greater definition the differences between the views of the continental military bloc and the varying following of the United States and Great Britain have become more apparent. The continental countries, frequently with the assistance of Japan and various South American countries, generally prevailed in making the following decisions, which represent the results of the conference so far.

The commission decided that the basis for the program of the disarmament conference which is expected to result from this preliminary decision shall be:

1. Military, naval and aerial armaments constitute an inseparable whole and must be treated as a single problem.
2. Any limitation agreed upon shall be applicable only to peace time effective.
3. Naval warfare shall be eliminated.
4. Naval reductions be made upon a basis of total tonnage and guns.
5. Military reductions must be made on a basis of peace time effective, period of service, training and war material in service, with consideration being given to tactical reserves and material in stock.
6. Aerial reductions must be made on a basis of total horsepower and number of planes, and total horsepower and cubic meters for aeroplanes. Consideration will be given to the total number of pilots.
7. Bacteriological experiments do not constitute a practical basis for comparing or limiting armaments.

The commission defined armaments on technology:

1. Peace time effective.
2. "Peace" as used in this case, such as military, naval, or aerial, does not include "hot" arms.
3. Ultimate arm strength including raw materials and the ability to maintain industry.

In addition to the foregoing decisions, the United States, Great Britain, Argentina and Chile filed a minority report asserting that a reduction was possible only by limiting tonnage by classes rather than by total tonnage.

United States to Stand by France

WASHINGTON, July 8.—High treasury post debt funding commission officials today categorically denied the possibility that the United States ever would join on the open market any government bonds held under debt settlement agreements, or any of the \$1,000,000,000 more to be received if the French debt settlement is approved.

Secretary Mellon, when told of the charge of Franklin Doolittle, French deputy, an opponent of ratification, that Germany might buy the bonds and present them to France for cancellation, said:

"The world might come to an end, but the United States will stand by France."

KNIFE, NOOSE STILL FAVORED BY OLD WORLD

LONDON, July 7.—Sweden's lethal gas chamber is regarded with disapproval in the old world, which is determined to carry on with its more humane methods such as the guillotine and the hanging man's noose.

The press of London, Paris and Berlin have expressed outrage and horror at the use of lethal gas for terminating the life of a criminal.

Some sections even seem to prefer methods such as the Nevada innovation and the Connecticut gallows that Joked Chapman, a medical scientist on American "progress."

Only the proponents of complete abolition of the death penalty seem to be in favor of the new method.

"Sweden is more backward than the chamber of your torturers than the gallows in England."

"The more humane the method of execution the more is the public sympathy," said E. Roy Calvert, secretary of the National Council for the Abolition of the Death Penalty.

"The fact that Sweden probably just as good as any other method. I have no sympathy with those who hang men's humane methods because the torture comes from anticipation of death. Those who are executed under modern methods actually die with suffering than they would if they had been allowed to die naturally, but the awful agony comes in waiting for the end. Therefore the lethal chamber is only a means to noose, it does not lighten the suffering of death, whether they die by the guillotine or the man's neck, and it is just as much mockery as the gallows or the guillotine."

In England the condemned are executed on the gallows where they are strangled. The condemned are hanged nearly at night in the morning. They are generally small, slender structures. In French penal circles no fault is found with the guillotine. In France executions must be held in public places, except for uncredentialed witnesses the public not allowed to witness the execution. In France, "executions" are performed on the Boulevard Arago and the guillotine is erected in the early morning on the sidewalk outside the prison walls. "The police block the streets and keep the crowd out of sight of the guillotine. The condemned is driven from the prison to the guillotine in a covered wagon, as soon as the knife drops the body is removed and the work of dismantling the guillotine commences in three. Executions are held at dawn, usually in half light, and before complete daybreak all evidence of what happened there has been removed.

Germany has three accepted methods of execution, the various processes being their own method, as do the states in America. In some the guillotine is used, in others hanging is the law, while in Prussia the executioner is a headman who uses a sword.

Many countries of Europe have either abolished capital punishment or allowed the practice to fall into disuse. Holland abolished the death penalty in 1870. In Italy the abolition took place in 1870, but its executioner had taken place since 1877, except Sweden which retained the guillotine until 1921 after twenty years with out any execution. Portugal, Rumania, Latvia, Lithuania have no death penalty and in Switzerland most of the guillotine have abolished it, a few have technically retain it, but the last execution in Switzerland was in 1912. In most other civilized countries, hanging is the accepted method, but in some time to time all sorts of practices have been resorted to in New Guinea and colonial countries.

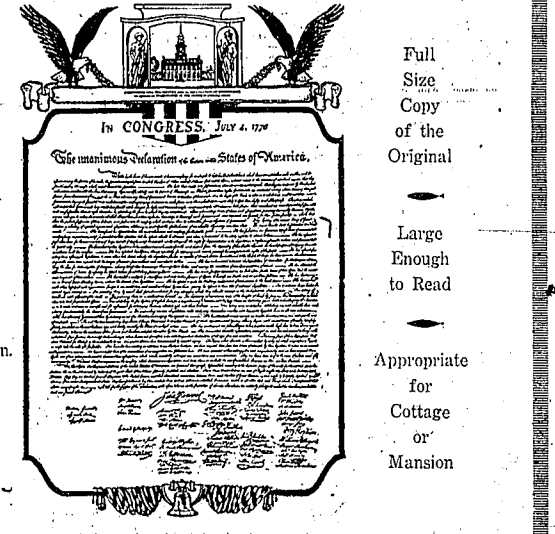

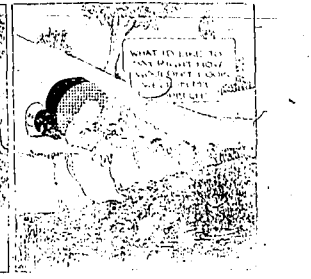
