SUNLIGHT LOSES POWER THROUGH WINDOW GLASS

CALDWELL, Idaho, July 9.—Action against Swift & Co., A. McLean, president of the company, and others, was instituted in probate court by Ronald Wood, director of the state bureau of drybing, charging violation of the state laws on there counts.
