

RIM TO RIM BRIDGE CONTRACT MODIFICATIONS

Regardless of public sentiment and regardless of the legal question involved the Twin Falls county commissioners and the Jerome board granted the changes demanded by the holder of the franchise for the Rim to Rim bridge across the Snake river. There seemed to be just one argument used in this proposition and that was, "We want the bridge," regardless. However, let it be said that the Twin Falls Times has the backbone to set forth the facts and point out to the people the danger in such a procedure. It is the solemn duty of a newspaper with courage to warn the taxpayers and the public generally of the danger of such methods and then if they fail to act, the responsibility rests where it belongs. A short review of the conditions surrounding the letting of this franchise will not be out of place here.

When it was announced on the evening of December 31, of last year, that the bridge contract had been let to R. M. Murray, following the withdrawal of the bid of the Dravo Construction company, it was stated that "minor modifications" had been made in the conditions; these modifications were inserted in the franchise after the Dravo company had left the field.

Whether these changes were or were not vitally important, they were made before the franchise was signed, and were not as objectionable as those now inserted.

The insertion of the provision now changed was the very one which finally drove the Dravo company out. In announcing withdrawal, Judge E. A. Walters, attorney for Dravo, said: "This proposal further provides that the county commissioners may, whenever they see fit, revise the schedule of tolls and may do so without any reference to what interest it produces for the bridge owner."

"This proposal will make of the bridge tolls an issue in political campaigns in the counties for nearly 50 years, and will make the bridge a political football, with rival groups of candidates basing their claims for election on their promises to reduce tolls."

"These are impossible conditions. The attempt to impose them has driven Mr. Dravo from the field. His is a business concern, doing business on a strict business basis."

That is what the financiers of Portland and Seattle are now saying nearly seven months later. By drafting the franchise as they did the boards eliminated the Dravo company, and made Murray the sole bidder. Then followed months of delay and many definite promises all of which have been broken. Sporadic and manifestly inadequate alleged "surveys" have been started and abandoned, and all the time the necessary bonds had not been sold, while the conditions of the franchise were such that no business man would bid for them.

At last after seven of the 15 months named in the franchise have elapsed, the holders come and say, "We must have this condition which Dravo said was essential inserted in the terms. It is only a minor change, of course, but we must have it." And the Twin Falls board fails over itself to put it in.

When D. W. Davis was governor an accommodating republican legislature passed a statute saying that the \$300,000 in state house construction bonds must be given at definite figure and without bids to Ferris & Hardgrove of Spokane, thus cutting out all competition. Other hardgrovings houses claimed that the state lost \$60,000 from this transaction of the Taxless executive.

It is perhaps significant that Ferris & Hardgrove is listed as one of the firms which it is said will help handle the rim to rim bonds, should the franchise, which was given to Murray, without competition, be modified to suit them. The action of the boards handed the contract to Murray on his own terms as effectively as the statute gave the bonds to Ferris & Hardgrove on their own terms.

Dravo promised to have the bridge open in one year from date of letting of the contract. Murray promised to complete it in 15 months. Dravo is reputed to always beat the time allotted. Even with the modified contract accepted, frequent promises to deliver goods as promised, makes people sceptical of his ability to finish it in eight months more.





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BRIDGE CHANGE AWAITS ACTION OF T. F. BOARD

Alterations Made Last Night by Jerome Commissioners Necessary to Approval in This County Bonds Are Tightened Up Building Work to Start Inside Two Months.

The Twin Falls branch of county commissioners will meet tomorrow to pass on the alterations made last night by the Twin Falls board in the terms of the franchise granted to H. M. Murray for the new loan bridge. President Arthur H. Jerome, of the chamber of commerce, wired the commissioners this morning and was informed that owing to the absence today of Ivan G. Lincoln, the master would go over.

In the "see ems" hours against the twin falls franchise, the Jerome board of commissioners adopted new conditions called "minor alterations" in the franchise, differing from the plan adopted by the Twin Falls board early this week, and which was to have been outlined by the Twin Falls chamber of commerce directors. A new bond for \$25,000 was drafted providing that work would start 60 days and continue steadily until the completion of the structure.

It has been said by some several lawyers that the old bond was defective in two particulars: that it was not sufficient necessary for the county to agree to the franchise to non-performers, and that it also contained a provision virtually releasing the bond should there be a "reasonable cause" for failure to complete. It was contended, however, that it was up to the legislature to invite litigation. The doubtful passes are out of the new bonds.

The new bonds were objected to at first on the ground that their signature might mean some delay as it would be necessary to break the contract of President Hodges of the Puget Sound Bridge & Dredge Co. of Seattle, but were finally agreed to by President Charles G. Huber of the Union Bridge company, who was to have been the contractor, but that the two bonds amount to \$25,000 instead of the \$50,000 demanded by the Chamber of Commerce of Twin Falls, all the conditions named by that body have been complied with.
