"It would be very unusual for a company to be able to earn enough to enable it to pay fifteen per cent for the privilege of using other people's money—moreover, if it is good enough to borrow money at all it can borrow it more cheaply than that!"

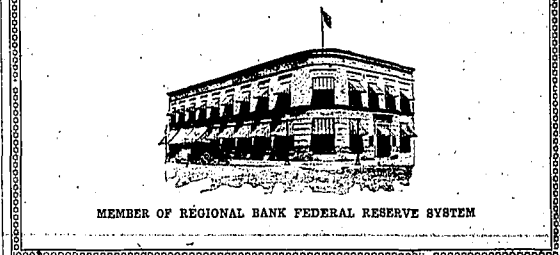

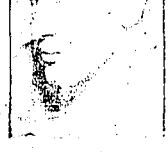

## IDAHO COURTS HALT JUSTICE

The Jurko case was not decided in the time set by the Constitution, and our information is that cases now pending and have recently been pending in the supreme court from six months to a year after being submitted, without having a decision, and our information is that about every month, a blanket order is entered by the supreme court ordering that all cases not decided are re-submitted; that this order is entered without asking the consent of either the attorneys or the litigants. Has the supreme court nullified the Constitutional provision?

Some stringent suggestions have been made recently by the American Bar Association at its annual convention in Denver, and other eminent jurists have offered suggestions to speed up action of the courts. Many Twin Falls attorneys and jurists from Southern Idaho have cases pending now in the supreme court and in other courts of this state which should be acted upon at once but for one reason or another these are delayed until justice is actually being cheated. One attorney in Twin Falls told me the other day of a case which has been before the courts for four years and yet final decision has not been rendered. There must be something radically wrong when cases are allowed to drag out in this fashion. Idaho tried to make provisions that such delays could not be perpetrated and to that end they provided a remedy in the Idaho Constitution which provides that salaries shall be withheld unless decisions are handed down. But the judges defeat this statute by re-submitting the cases from month to month.

In the district court cases must be decided according to the Idaho statutes within twenty days after they have been submitted, but this provision is never carefully observed.

Here is the Constitutional provision for a remedy to this evil in the Idaho Constitution:

"No justice of the Supreme Court of judge of the District Court shall be paid his salary or any part thereof, unless he shall have first taken and subscribed oath that there is not in his hands any matter in controversy not decided by him which has been finally submitted for his consideration and determination, thirty days prior to the taking and subscribing such oath."

Such is the provision contained in Section 17, Article 5, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho.

This provision of the Constitution was passed upon by the Supreme Court in a case brought against Judge Steele, a district judge, and reported in Volume 20, of Idaho Reports at page 768.

In that case Judge Steele in answer to the writ requiring him to appear before the Supreme Court, stated that he was waiting for the lawyers to file a brief, "and an opportunity to examine the case and reach a satisfactory conclusion therein." The supreme court said that "Section 17, of Article 5, of the State Constitution" "clearly indicate that" "the framers of the Constitution intended that after a case had been submitted for decision to a judge or court, a prompt decision must be rendered." The court also said in that case:

"Counsel ought not to impose upon the generosity of the court by asking an unusual and unreasonable delay in which to submit the brief, the court is overworked with generally on such occasions. It is the duty of the court to require briefs to be filed when necessary, so that the decision can be made within a statutory period."

"The prerogative will must be issued as prayed for."

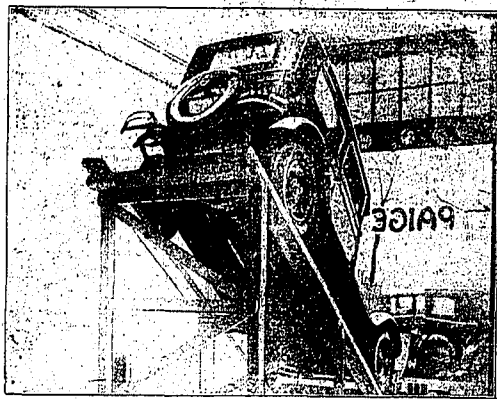
## REASON FOR FUSION

The state Progressive organ in a tearful plea for fusion between the Progressive and Democratic voters, notwithstanding the state committees have turned down the proposition points out that there is nothing to hinder them from voting fusion candidates. In order to get rid of this condition it will be necessary to take the government of Idaho away from the republicans. This can be done surely by fusion. If the democrats should fail to run a ticket it would wipe out the legal existence of the party. Should the progressives fail to run a ticket, their party would go out of existence. Neither party wants to be eliminated. The democratic party is an old, historic organization which will probably elect the next president and democrats do not want to go into a party that cannot possibly elect a president. The progressives fear that the democratic party later may fall into hands of either the wets or the reactionary element, hence do not want to scrap their organization in Idaho without ample assurance that neither of these things will happen. Yet both advocate the same things for Idaho and by fusion can get them without loss of party identity or autonomy.

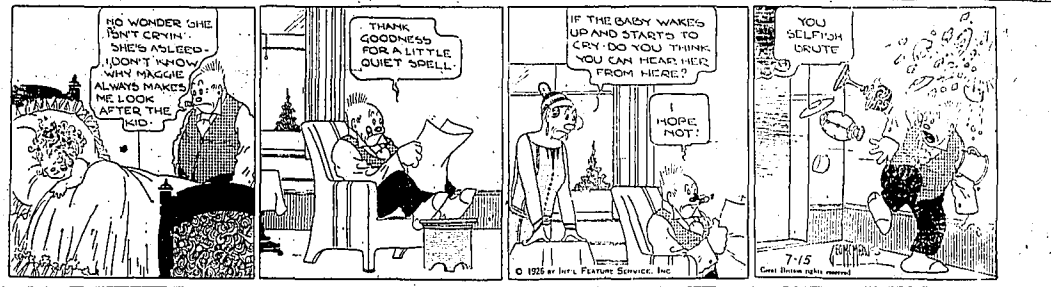
