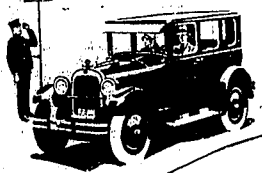

LET'S HOPE FOR BRIDGE ACTION

Everybody hopes that the bridge across the Snake river will be constructed at the earliest possible moment. Now that the bonds have been constructed, it is expected that the bridge will probably be constructed; if as, President Hueber says, the bonds will be actually furnished. It would have been better had the demands of the Twin Falls chamber of commerce been complied with and the total amount of the bonds furnished been raised to \$50,000. Still, should the bonds as agreed on be put up each county would have \$15,000 in case of forfeiture and that is at least something. At any rate the situation has been bettered by the intervention of citizens and the chamber of commerce. However, this improvement in conditions is in no way to the credit of the Twin Falls county board. That body, granted, the alleged minor changes without asking the changes which were made in the security of the bond; the alterations actually made in the bond surety were incorporated by the Jerome county board, on July 16. The Twin Falls county board had on July 15 given the bridge people all they asked without taking any steps to improve the assurance that even these more liberal conditions would be carried into effect.

Several good lawyers gave offhand opinions that the change in the word "one" to the word "10", as a limitation on the time when the county boards could lower the rates was an essential change and that it could not be made without readvertisement. In case of even serious question on this the change should not have been made, since it would take longer to determine the legality of the procedure than it would to readvertise the bridge, even should the proceedings eventually be upheld by the courts. However, President Hueber said Saturday that the bond makers are so confident that the bonds have the power to make this change that they are willing to a. k. the action of the commissioners without even a friendly suit to test its validity, and the bonding companies will take the bonds on their recommendation. He stated that the matter of a friendly suit had been discussed but was abandoned because it would cause unnecessary delay.

The blame which lies on the commissioners springs primarily from their having incorporated the conditions which they did into the original proposition, and having taken an inadequate bond to secure the rights of the people. This amounted to freezing out all bidders but R. M. Murray and delayed the beginning of the bridge for at least six months. This last is no guess. It is based on what Mr. Murray himself said about the time of beginning after he got the contract. Had the franchise been such that the bonds would have been sold at once, and had the bond been such as to insure speedy action, the bridge would have been well under way by this time. Those who recall what Mr. Murray said about speedy action when he assumed that he would be financed at once shows this.

The people have no assurance that should the present board be returned, or should another board be picked by the same machine that selected the present, be elected further dawdling may not take place. The people want the bridge and want it right away; if they are going to get it from the present contractors, and they can only be assured of this by electing a board that will stand up for their rights and interests.

The idea that capital may be frightened away from Southern Idaho if the people express their views on this franchise sounds like the ravings of an unbalanced dome. Everybody knows that if Murray passed up this franchise it will not be because of any other concerns of capital or even larger magnitude will be here wanting to bid for a new franchise and the chances are ten to one that if we let a new contract we would have a bridge quicker than we will under the present franchise. Capital and business men are hard headed and not easily frightened away from a proposition which offers real returns.

TWIN FALLS COUNTY HAS 'EM

The following facts are taken from one of our exchanges and is headed, "A Well Established Republican Rule." It has to do with a little scrap between the Nampa Leader-Herald and the Free Press, but the facts are very suggestive and some of these will apply to Twin Falls county.

To confine so rich and startling statement to the very few subscribers of the cocoanut organ would be almost criminal.

"The official organ of the cocoanut industry in Canyon county wants all of the republican 'pap-suckers' in the state house to continue to hold office, despite the fact that most of them have held the offices to which they hope to be re-elected, for from two to four terms. In an editorial on July 13, in which the republican office holders at Boise were being discussed, the Nampa paper says:

"They have all held office from two to three terms, and this has become such a well established rule with the republican party that to violate it this year would be to weaken the party and afford the enemy a strong talking point."

"What a shock this editorial from the brain of the

postmaster editor must have given to the 'faithful' who have been trying to distract attention from the fact that several of the republican 'chair-warmers' in the state house have held down the same chairs for three or four terms and are again seeking renomination. And this editorial gem appeared in the same column in which the postmaster editor was condemning the progressive candidates in Canyon county who are seeking a third term.

You are right, Ned. Seeking office "even unto the third and fourth term" is a republican characteristic, but no one expected you to be so frank in making the admission. We enjoy it, just the same, even if it was entirely unexpected."

GENERAL FRENCH FINANCES SUBJECT OF CONFERENCES

WASHINGTON—Continued conferences between French representatives and Acting Secretary of the Treasury, Mellon, relate to general financial conditions in France rather than to the Mellon-Bremer debt pact, it was learned today.

Although denied officially, reports persist that American financial experts are engaged in a study of the French conditions with a view to working out a "downs plan" for France. Once the franc is placed on a stable basis, it is pointed out, the debt settlement will be put on difficult terms for France.

For two successive days, Louis de Rothschild, charge d'affaires of the French embassy, has conferred with Winston. Yesterday he gave Winston a copy of the French experts' report on the monetary system.

Trip Significant. Winston denied modification of the French debt settlement.

Despite reports that his trip is for pleasure only, Mellon's visit to Europe is viewed by observers as significant in connection with stabilization plans for the franc.

Mellon, it is reported, may join a similar conference in the south of France. Already at the conference are Montague Norman, governor of the

Highways Cover 400,000 Miles

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 10.—Motorists in the United States have more than 400,000 miles of roads suitable for automobiles, an increase to four this summer, according to the National Geographic Society.

When the "horse" trails first appeared 30 years ago the problem was to find roads on which they could run. Now the problem is to build roads which need to take, there are so many of them.


A tourist, driving 12 hours a day at an average speed of 20 miles an hour, could cover all the touring highways of the United States and nearby "Canada" by extending his journey three years and six months.

America is now riding up the crest of its third renaissance of road building, according to the society. Nonetheless, the most important venialed trails in the Mississippi valley, had the first roads built in North America.

SIGGINS FINDS ELECTION LAW TO BE PUZZLE

County Clerk Views Statute of 1919 with Deep Concern and Finally Decides to Enact Amendments and Cut the String Provisions at the Secretary's Office.

Judge Chester G. A. Dibley, of Bull, sought to withdraw from the democratic ticket as a candidate for various offices that in days before election he was the secretary of state.

Early Developments. The withdrawal of Dibley, which caused the present election intended to refute the action of the defective legislation that is not yet in effect at the same time. Unfortunately, the legislators failed to give the law and as a result County Clerk C. S. Siggin is making his best and thinking thought that would not bear printing. In an effort to solve the problem. After telling in great detail how filing for nomination may be done, the law says that those filing for county office a candidate must specify in what law they will be before election. This is set forth plainly on page 25 and in it will would cause no trouble. But the law says that a candidate's nomination may be made for a ballot 15 days before election by those expecting to be absent and that the election will be held on the day after the requested ballot to the voters who comply with conditions named.

In other words, the voter who expects to be absent can demand a ballot tomorrow, but the time for withdrawal of candidates does not expire until next Saturday night and the ballots, as they are supposed to be issued, would then have to be prepared, so that they could not be delivered until a week from today.

Mr. Siggin has ordered ballots printed and will give them out tomorrow if demanded and then should give withdrawal later in the week. A piece of paper over the name without voters may cut ballots for those not running, but he can say no other way out.

Another mixup in the law which will cause confusion has to do with the election. The voters' books close Saturday night. The voters have until Wednesday night to get the books in to be selected out. This may cause extra expense to them back to some precincts in the city election.

Statutes are provided for by law to put on ballots whose vacancies occur and Mr. Siggin assumes that this rule would work the other way since it is not forbidden and since in any event only a few votes of absent voters will be cast for withdrawn candidates. He says that he or Levy hold that the law which gives all the trouble up to the general election of a year or so ago is unworkable are correct. In the other hand, his questions are all answered specifically under the head of early elections in the 1924 official copies of election law put out by the secretary of state, after consultation with the attorney general.
