H. H. Gilbert of the Guaranty-Volunteering market has gone to Portland where he joins his wife, after which they will visit Seattle and Vancouver, B. C.

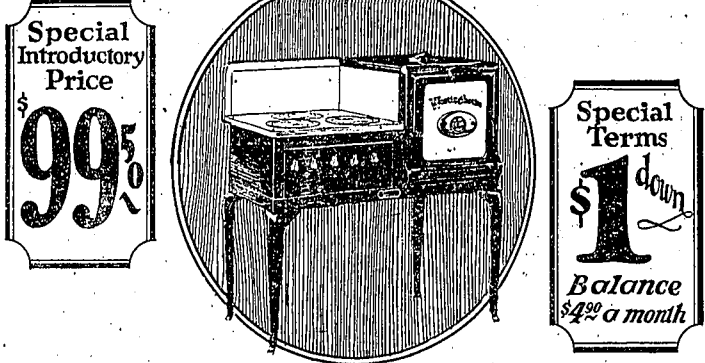

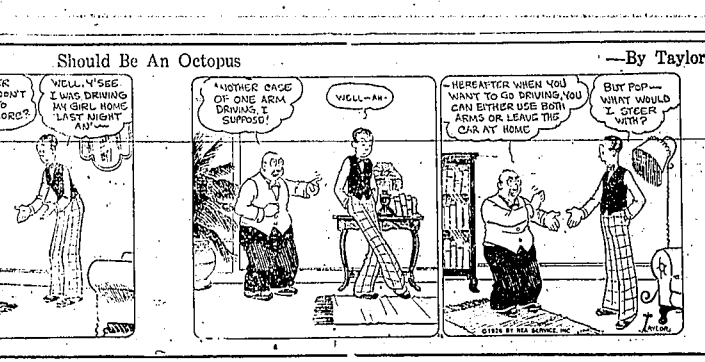

## FARM LEGISLATION

Senator Cummins, who was defeated by Smith W. Brookhart in the recent Iowa primary, warns his Republican colleagues in the senate that if they turn down the McNary farm relief bill, "the whole policy of protection is doomed to extinction."

There is no denying that the farmers have had a rough time of it these last few years. But their condition will not be improved by such radical schemes as have been advanced in their behalf—schemes which have a purely political background. It may also be true that this has been and is the policy of manufacturers to some extent, but as the situation stands there must be a compromise of views. . . . The trouble seems to be that under the present system the selling price of wheat is fixed at Liverpool; the selling price of manufacturers is fixed by political combinations.—Elko Free Press (Repr.)

This is the greatest trouble with the farmers. The manufacturers who constitute only a small group can readily combine, form a trust and collect the whole tariff. Millions of farmers by reason of their numbers cannot do this. They pay the tariff to the trusts and cannot collect tariff for themselves except on a few articles occasionally. The manufacturers say they pay out what they get in higher wages, but the investigation of textile mills during the present year by W. Jett Laueks, well known statistician and economist, shows that only from 10 to 12 per cent of the total cost is wages. Anyhow, while Secretary Mellon of the aluminum trust is piling up millions, it is not noticeable that many of his workers are millionaires. The trusts keep the tariff. Smaller profits for the manufacturing trusts, leaving more for farmers and labor would help a lot.

## SCIENTIFIC IRRIGATION AGRICULTURE (By Newton Hibbs)

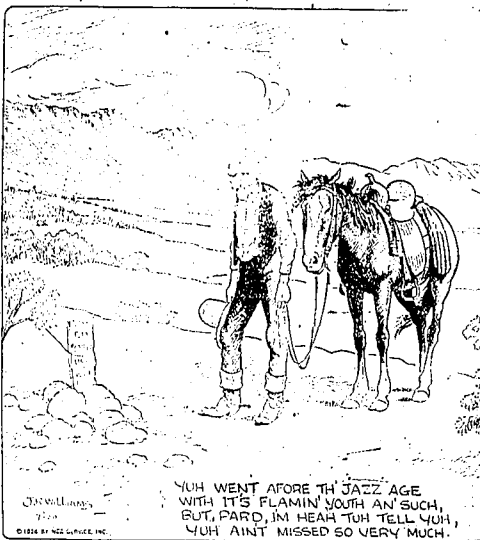
The scientists have neglected irrigation agriculture. The federal government, several years ago, made a gesture of experimental farming under scientific management, but that item of the budget was soon diverted from field service to the official swivel chair department. The theorists have since formulated at public expense and the dirt farmers have controverted at individual cost. The local vociferous noxious weed war is its example.

Irrigation remained a lost art for 2000 years. Jealousy and prejudice are still retarding recovery. While there can be no real scientific farming without moisture control and perfect sunshine experimentation is limited, almost exclusively, to the humid farm belts where floods and drought are alternating annual calamities. The few endowment institutions, permitted where sunshine is perpetual and moisture is controlled, are governed by prejudiced professors. The destiny of all irrigation projects should be committed only to men imbued with the spirit of the sunshine land. The science of irrigation agriculture cannot come from any agricultural college where prayer for rain is the only dependence for the water of life. Our predominant spirit is indigenous of the desert. It cannot be imported. Irrigation science must be a home institution.

The Twin Falls Southside is the irrigation experimental farm of the world. The science of irrigation agriculture is destined to be developed here. Every older project has advanced in decadence because of inherent conflicts of soil, water or climatic conditions. Here we have the most perfect soil structure with appropriate constituent mineralization. With effective control the native elements assure maximum fertility in perpetuity. The mill of erosion supplies the irrigation water to feed every crop its demand for mineral plant food, always in ratio of the water demanded. With us scientific farming is simply scientific irrigation. The holders of the soft swivel chairs have "balled up" our dirt farmers in the past, but home rule will save the Southside from the common fate of the older projects. A false alarm of pests has been sounded. The most fertile soil in the world breeds bacteria in ratio of its richness. The good and bad pests are readily controllable under conditions of perfect sunshine, moisture, and tillage. These are practically our exclusive heritage.

As sunshine is the source of all life; it is the exclusive source of fertility bacteria. Disease bacteria are bred in humidity and darkness. Unscientific irrigation excludes sunlight from the plant root zone and protects disease germs. Fertilization is bacterial control. We have developed various tribes of "mosaic blight" germs in soil zones which have been sealed as a result of excessive soil saturation. This blight bacteria inoculates in host plant roots below aeration soil zones only. It becomes a winged louse after feeding on the roots of host plants. This winged louse poisons the sap of all host plants, and that poison causes the second stage of "blight," which has been given the confusing name, "chlorosis." This winged louse returns to the roots which penetrates the hardpan or to other dark zones. These "blights" also live in the seeds of all host plants, like "rust spores." The blights are thus imported even in "certified" seed.

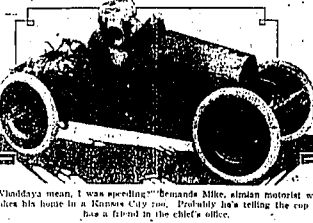

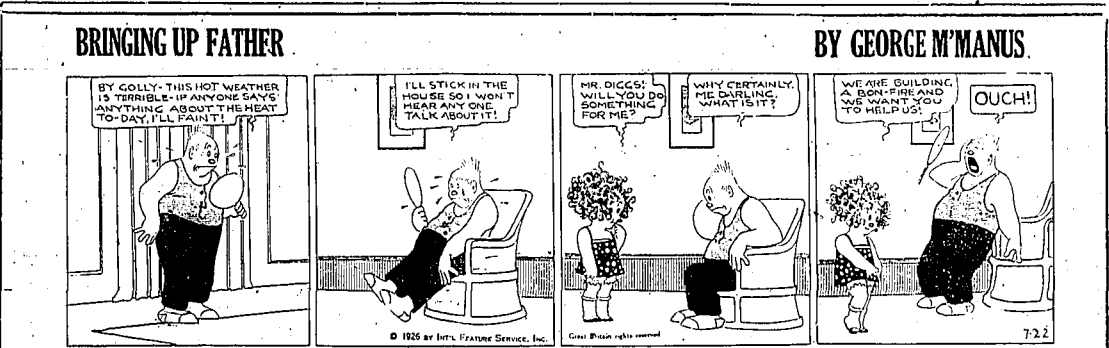
