MURDER OF BARBARA BE SOLVED

Clergyman's Wife Arrested and Charged With Two Slayings.

Couple Killed at Trysting Place in 1922; Slayer Found.

SOMERVILLE, N. J., July 28.—A trail in connection with the murder of her husband, the Rev. Edward W. Hall, and Mrs. Eleanor Mills, a singer in his choir, Mrs. Edw. W. Hall, the wife and widow of the clergyman, was held in jail today, finally charged with the two murders, each charged by a separate complaint.

Her arrest is regarded to have followed an afternoon conference among state police, Middlesex county authorities and Supreme Court Justice Charles W. Parker at Morris-town, N. J.

The murder of the clergyman and the choir singer, which occurred at Somerville in New Brunswick, one of the great unsolved crimes of the east.

Dr. Hall, pastor of the church of St. John the Evangelist in New Brunswick, had left his home, the Hotel Bellevue, here, shortly after 10 o'clock on the night of the church and a dinner.

Two days later the bodies of the clergyman and the singer were found on a farm near New Brunswick. Hall had been shot through the head. The singer had been killed by a bullet in the young woman's womb. There were four bullets in Mrs. Mills' back, her throat had been cut with a knife.

Alone the bodies were scattered fragments of love letters the couple exchanged.

Mrs. Hall was questioned at the time, as was the choir singer's husband.

POINCARÉ WILL NOT RUSH DEBT RATIFICATION

PARIS, July 28.—Premier Poincaré told the chamber of deputies finance committee that he would not ask parliament to ratify the debt financing agreements recently reached in Washington and London, before parliament begins its summer adjournment.

The minister said finance ministers, however, according to her ability and it was understood that debt negotiations would be reopened during the parliamentary recess.

Despite Poincaré's strong position in the chamber of deputies and his vigorous efforts in Paris, France's financial situation remains very dark.

GUARD PLACED AT RESIDENCE OF PUBLISHER

Youngstown Police Arrest Suspicious; May File Charge Soon.

CANTON, O., July 28.—The home of Don A. Mohr, publisher of the Canton Daily News, was guarded by special police forces in which the widow, her father-in-law and two children were temporarily overpowered. The guard was placed at the residence of the publisher because of a letter threatening the life of the publisher.

Although predicted with a description of the home when the publisher's name was mentioned, and either tossed in a yard or fired with a rifle as usual to those used for fear, no arrests were made.

The attack was regarded as a gesture of defiance from the underworld.

Carl Stutz, regional underworld leader, was questioned in the case by Joseph Cleary, the governor's detective, and his examination will continue today.

Secrecy Surrounds Panama Treaty

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 28.—"Secrecy" surrounds the signing today of the two treaties between the United States and Panama. One was a supplementary treaty resolving the abrogated Tule agreements and the other a special claims convention.

The state department declined to make any statement of the signing of the treaties. A statement prepared by the Panama delegation, commencing on and describing the treaty, was presented at the last minute at the state department's request.

Foreign relations explained the treaty texts would be kept confidential until submitted to the senate but said the customary departmental statement would be made.

This treaty aroused opposition in diplomatic quarters regarding disposition in the treaty of the sovereignty over the market.

Other provisions of the treaty give right of the United States to regulate transportation and radio communication in Panama.

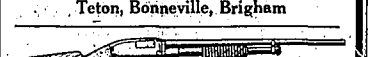
