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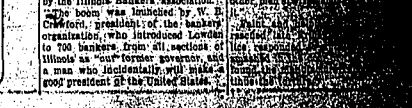

PLANT SOY BEANS WITH CORN CROP

The combination of corn and soy beans for silage produced an average increase of approximately one ton of green forage, or 500 pounds of dry matter per acre, as compared with corn alone. In four years of experiments conducted by the agricultural experiment station at Stieris, Conn. The amount of additional protein per acre supplied by the addition of soy beans was figured as equivalent to 300 pounds of 40 per cent cotton seed meal.

The largest total yields of grain and dry matter under Connecticut conditions were produced by growing one stalk of corn to three of beans in every 12 inches of the row. Drilling the corn and soy beans proved decidedly better than planting both in the same hill, or planting the beans between the stalks of corn. Eighteen different varieties of soy beans were tried and the best variety was a self-storing, reasonably tall, large silage variety, which will have its pods two-thirds filled when the corn is ready to be cut. The question which has been argued a good deal is whether or not the planting of soy beans with the corn increases the nitrogen content of the corn crop the same season. No such increase was noted in these studies.

It was considered not desirable to grow soy beans alone and corn alone, unless the two are not just the silage. Growing them together as a silage combination added a value of approximately \$10 per acre to the silage crop.

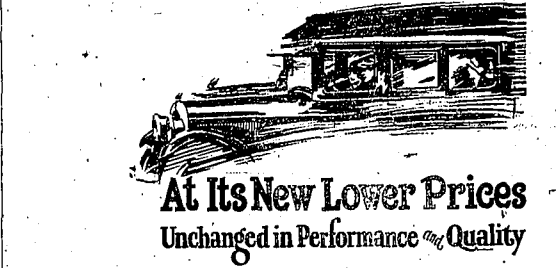

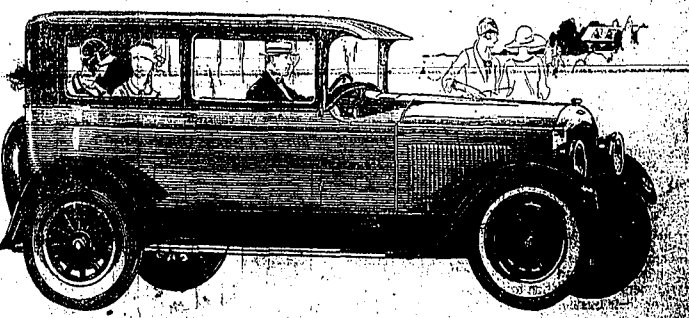

Announcement by Ed Vance that demand for the peanut honey has grown so great that it necessitates the establishment of a larger plant and that machinery will soon be in operation in the old doughnut shop is further evidence of the superiority of the famous honey of the Twin Falls tract. No other honey mixed scientifically with peanut butter would make quite so delicious a combination.

The people of Twin Falls county welcome the determination of the pioneers to secure the membership of all the old settlers at and following the picnic which will be held on the Filer fair grounds September 3. The formation of the association is not merely of sentimental interest. The lessons of the early days will prove of benefit to the present generation, both by inspiration given and by practical lessons learned in conquering the wilderness.

It is somewhat singular that the vote of the Salmon settlers yesterday in the meeting held under the auspices of the Salmon River Canal company at Hollister, gets back approximately to the majority report of a legislative committee, including in its personnel J. A. Waters of this county, which was appointed during the first term of Governor Alexander. There were two reports, a majority which held to the idea that the tract should be cut to about 26,000 acres, and the minority report of Representative Anderson which foreshadowed the Whiffen government report and favored a 35,000 acre tract. The events seem to confirm the idea that the majority legislative report was the better in order to insure complete protection at all times; in the view of most of the stockholders.

TO GO THROUGH SEASON WITH LITTLE LOSS

With approximately 47,000 acre feet of water in storage at Lake Walcott, the North Side Minidoka project seems amply protected from any great water shortage this year.

The Minidoka Irrigation district is now using between 2300 and 2400 acre feet of water per day with the demand gradually decreasing. Heretofore the bank run off at the end of the season has amounted to from 25,000 to 40,000 acre feet and using 20,000 as an estimate this year it seems certain that water will be obtainable on the North Side Minidoka project until September 1, sufficient to mature all crops.

THE PASSING OF CUMMINS

By JAMES D. WHELAN

The death of Albert R. Cummins, long a national leader, marks the passing of a man who performed distinguished, or near-distinguished, service for his country; but who in later life fell behind the procession. The noted Iowa man first came to the front as the originator of what was known as "The Cummins Plan" on the tariff. The only definite thing about the plan was borrowed from the original draft of the Sherman anti-trust act, namely, the removal of the tariff from trust made goods. It was the most valuable feature of both the Cummins plan and the Sherman act and was eliminated from both by his party associates. The immediate result of the discussion on the plan by its author, his fellow senator, Dolliver, and others was a division on the tariff within the republican ranks, which gave the democrats an overwhelming majority in the house elected in 1910. This in turn made it evident that Taft could not be elected in 1912 and led to the movement to nominate Roosevelt which split the republican party and turned what would have been merely a defeat into a crushing disaster for the g. o. p.—The most notable act of Cummins in recent years, and one from which he gained no prestige, was his participation in the drafting of the Esch-Cummins railroad law. It was enacted over the protest of President Wilson, who signed it while denouncing it, only because the time for returning the roads was to expire in a few days and failure to enact some law would mean chaos. It was opposed by a majority of democrats, and many republicans in both houses, including Borah. The measure was cleverly and scientifically drawn, but was denounced because it was believed to be unduly favorable to the roads. Since that time, the suspicion that Cummins had become a reactionist seemed confirmed with most people and his support of the demands of the dry farmers for legislation to offset the bad effect of the tariff on their business, did not overcome this feeling.
