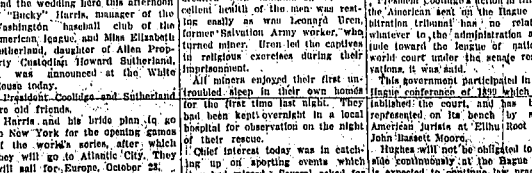
The rescued miners of the Idaho mine are in fine fettle after their release from the mine. They were taken to the hospital and are now recovering from their ordeal.



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BRITAIN WILL HELP IN WAR AGAINST RUM

England Agrees to Co-operate With United States in Checking Rum Running From Various British Seaports.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—Great Britain has agreed to co-operate with the United States in checking rum running from the Bahamas Islands and other British ports.

In announcing that the British government had accepted the suggestion made at the recent London conference for a joint Anglo-American effort for prevention of illicit liquor traffic, state department officials explained that the new agreement in fact is a treaty. No text was made public.

It is understood that the British government has reportedly related some of the most exclusive facilities to the needs of American troops in the field, and that it will receive more from its existing stocks than it has previously. But Britain is believed to have retained the right to cancel the new agreement if and when she pleases.

The new "arrangement" became effective on September 29, it was announced. The Anglo-American cooperation in the field of the British-American liquor treaty, and in the view of the administration, do not require ratification by the senate.

There was some suggestion today that the senate may insist upon seeing the text of the new agreement, though a similar suggestion in connection with Canada a year ago was not questioned.

Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Andrew Day, czar, headed the American delegation to the special London conference which drew to its agreement on July 27.

Channel Swimmer Gives Up Within 3 Miles of Goal

DOVER, England, Oct. 1.—Miss E. L. Marriott of England, abandoned her fourth attempt to swim the English channel at 7:52 a. m. this morning when she was within three miles of the goal.

Miss Marriott left Cape Gris Nez, France, under favorable conditions yesterday afternoon at 2:30 and was reported swimming strongly throughout the night, until the coldness of the water forced her to give up.

Miss Marriott, who is the name of Jane Harwin for swimming purposes, is a 27-year-old woman.

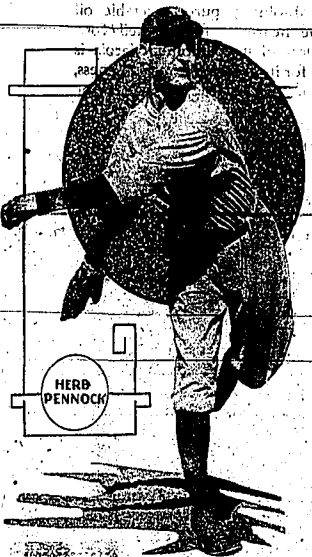

# SALE TO MINOR IS CHARGE IN BOHANNAN CASE

State Asserts That 15 Bottles of Home Brew Were Disposed of by Defendant Everett Norris as Adjudged by Jury.

Everett Norris, 22-year-old Bohal youth, who was charged with forcing a check and passing it here in July was found guilty late yesterday and will be sentenced Monday. The jury in the case of the State against Charles Bohannan, charged with selling 15 bottles of beer to Lester Walburn, was then selected.

According to young Walburn, who says he is 18 years old, he met Charles Bohannan on Sunday morning, September 5, at 9 o'clock, near the Jones and Wells street, and bought the home brew from him for the sum of \$3.50. He says that he gave some of the beer to others and drank between three and four bottles himself. He said that he and a party friend drove out about 100 miles from the city after he had the beer.

Young Walburn said that he drank three small glasses of light wine at the Paxton hall the night before but that this did not make him intoxicated and that he was not drunk the previous evening.

He said that after he had the home brew, he was not intoxicated but felt good, and declared that after he ate dinner and drank a lot of coffee the effects disappeared. He said that an auto accident that afternoon resulted from a defective gas tank was not the reason why he drank in the morning. He was put through a field cross-examination by Capt. J. W. Porter, representing the defense against J. W. Taylor represented the state.

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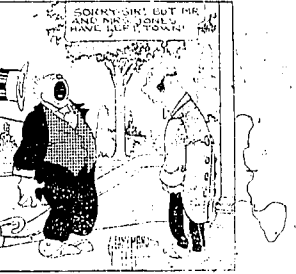

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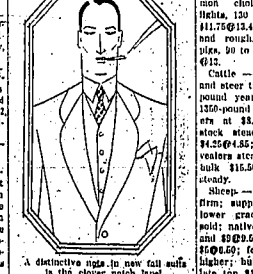
