

# State Increases the Evidence Against Aimee McPherson

## WILL INTRODUCE HOTEL INCIDENT

### Evangelist and Radio Announcer Once at the Same Hotel.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 8.—Evidence tending to substantiate the existence of a "Rose" and "Steve," mysterious characters described by Aimee McPherson as "blonders," was given today at the evangelist's preliminary hearing on charges of conspiring to obstruct justice.

The testimony was that of Mrs. J. M. Murchison, county-solicitor of Arizona, under cross examination.

Murchison identified a report he had made to Chief of Police Percy Bowden of Douglas concerning his investigation of Mrs. McPherson's kidnapping which was set out in the records by W. I. Gilchrist, defense counsel.

The report disclosed that Murchison had investigated the existence of a "Rose" and "Steve" and that a number of persons had identified H. D. Hallenbeck, former evangelist, as "Rose" and "Steve" and Rose McPherson, a trained nurse, as a couple known as "Steve" and "Rose."

The couple had registered frequently under the name of Mr. and Mrs. J. Stone at the Glendale hotel, Douglas, according to the report, and had been seen by several persons who identified them as "Steve" and "Rose."

They were in Douglas on June 22, the day before Mrs. McPherson was kidnapped, and made re-appearance in Agua Prieta, Mexico, across the border, the report said.

# INDIANA MEN WANT GRAND JURY PROBE

## Editors Hopeful of Investigation of State Government; Prosecutor Hopes All Facts and Will Decide Soon.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 8.—An order for Warren Fisher of the state capital at Michigan City to testify before a grand jury, called by Governor D. C. Stephenson, central figure in the Indiana political scandal to which here was made allusion in the Hindenburg article of yesterday, was expected to take the first steps for a probe into the alleged direction of the newspaper chain of graft and corruption dealt by Thomas Adams and his associates in Indiana.

Adams asserts he has conclusive documentary evidence that Stephenson, former grand dragon of the Six Rings, had made certain state and city officers in Indiana and headed a "sub-government" that reached to every corner of the state.

Speaking at a regular meeting of the Indiana State Bar Association, Governor Stephenson said there would be a thorough investigation to determine whether any public officials had betrayed their trust.

The governor, he said, had been contemplating naming a non-partisan committee to look into the charges of Adams.

From Justice Gilliam, attorney general, came the announcement that the attorney's office was ready to lend every resource of its command to the investigation.

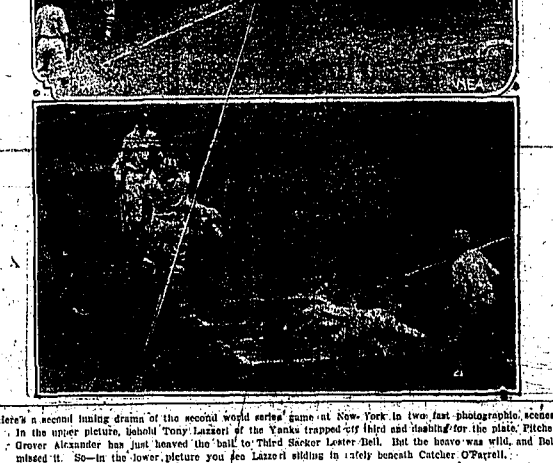

It is a pleasure to hear experts from our Federal Government praise our land and remarkable crops. But the report made here yesterday is exceptional in that these men placed the Twin Falls tract in the lead of practically all other sections they have visited lately. Two particular features were praised by these men, the first was the unusual productivity and the second was the small waste of our crops. Both are very commendable.

The Rim to Rim bridge proposition became a political football in Twin Falls county when the commissioners almost forced the Dravo Construction company out of the field in favor of the present holder of the franchise by their chicanery. They amended the franchise until they knew that Dravo nor any other real bridge builder would accept the terms and then awarded the franchise to the man whose bid was over one hundred thousand dollars higher than the Dravo bid. The assertion that not one cent of either county's tax money has been expended for the bridge thus far is another piece of chicanery. We have contended and still contend that eventually Twin Falls and Jerome counties will find it necessary to take over this bridge by some sort of purchase and when they do we will pay the fiddler for this extravagance and special privilege.

Senator Gooding has the effrontery through his campaign committee to offer the newspapers of Idaho a "measly" check of five bones for the running of a lone treatise on how an "Agricultural Conference Commends Gooding." Just to see how small the junior senator from Idaho is, we figured up this statement at our regular legal rates and he should have sent fifteen dollars and fifty cents, to say nothing about throwing in a little extra for the number of times the newspapers are compelled to print the senator's name free in semi-news circles. It never pays to be small with the press and had the senator sent this story along and asked the newspapers to run same at as much of it as they saw fit to regard as news, and discard the balance the matter would have been O. K., but when he tries to seduce the Idaho press we resent such procedure.

## IDAHO WEEKLY INDUSTRIAL REVIEW

Manufacturing activity in most principal lines this year exceeds 1925, according to Federal Reserve board reports from all sections. A continuation of this condition rests largely with the people, as they understand and act wisely on problems affecting government and industry. Here are a few of the proposed new industries from various parts of Idaho which will be constructed perhaps in the next few years:

- Lewiston—Wisconsin capitalists investigate paper mill possibilities here.
- Mullan—\$50,000 hotel and restaurant projected here.
- Kootenai county farmers have ordered \$22,000 lbs. of pyrotol-stumping powder.
- Idaho Falls—Woods Livestock company sells 5,000 tons alfalfa hay to Utah-Idaho Sugar Company.
- Coeur d'Alene—Homesuckle plant near Hayden Lake starts apple packing.
- American Falls—Concrete work almost completed for great storage dam.
- Idaho apple crop will be about 4,906,000 bushels.
- Idaho potato crop of 15,261,000 bushels is 860,000 bushels more than last year.
- Fruitland—D. B. Coates raises 67 six-months pigs selling for \$1,924.
- Jerome—Jerome Cooperative Creamery will build and operate casein plant here.

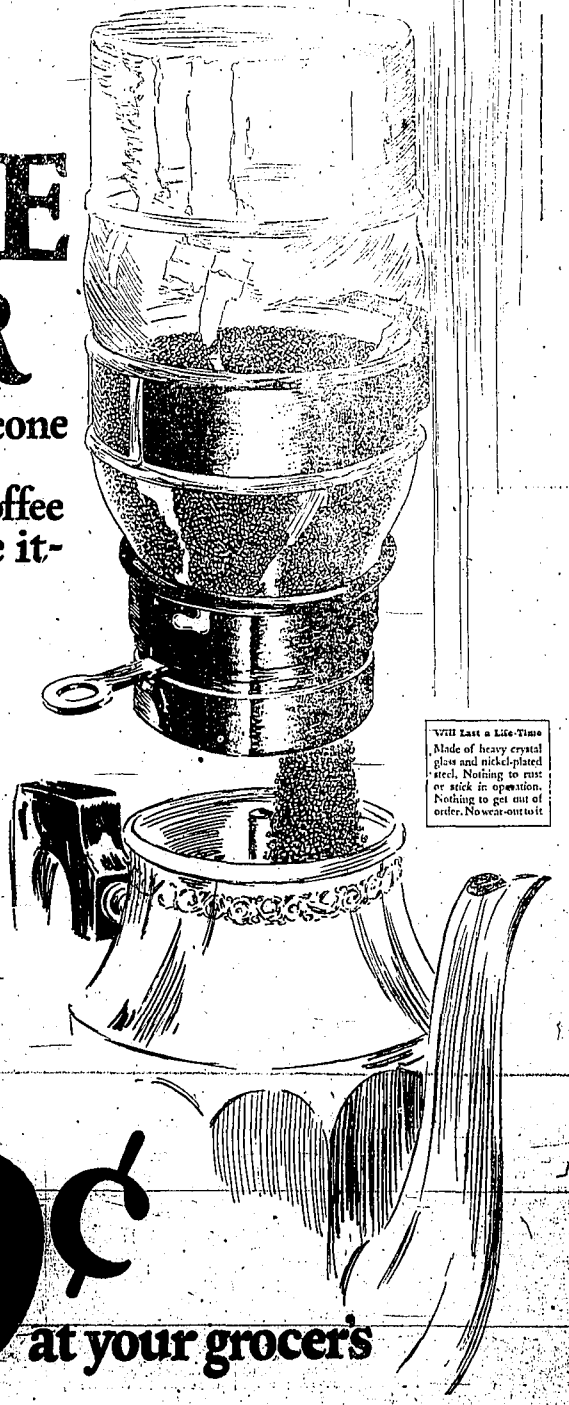

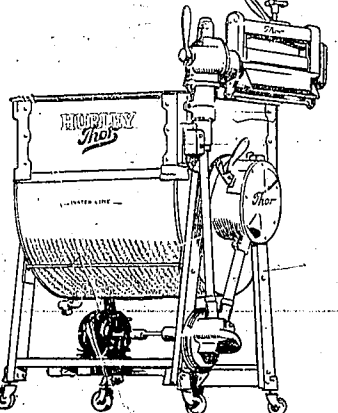
