BRUINS WIN FROM FIRTH CHAMPIONS

Idaho Champions for 1925 Defeated by Twin Falls Bruins in Great Game of Football; Perrine and Robertson Make Spectacular Runs for Bruins; Bruins Gain 177 Yards to Firth's 95.

In one of the most spectacular games ever played here for years the Twin Falls Bruins against the first conference game from the champion of 1925 High School football team yesterday afternoon at Lincoln field by a 14 to 0 score. The game was a thrilling battle throughout and while the Bruins expected this to start and on one play almost scored a touchdown. Bert Perrine and Rich Robertson were the big ground gains for the locals and Lucas at times was a star at getting through the Firth line and breaking up their plays and catching the runners for a loss. In fact, all of the Bruin squad showed up much better on defense in yesterday's game than heretofore. The line held in critical positions and while Firth looked lanky and fast they were not able to gain consistently on the Bruin squad.

The Firth squad showed splendid coaching and their attack was varied and kept the Bruins guessing as to what play was coming next. Their star captain was an old hand and kept his teammates working hard and fast. Lockyer, Tullback for Firth, hit the line hard and made several good gains but on account of the strength of the Bruin linemen he was unable to make consistent gains.

Yardage gained by teams.

The summary of yardage gained by Firth was 95 yards and by Twin Falls 177. This yardage shows the ability of the two teams to make yardage better than any other comparison. In first downs Firth made 7 and Twin Falls 9. Penalties were inflicted in a severe fashion and the majority of the fans did not understand the reason. Twin Falls was penalized once for delaying the game, which was entirely uncalled for because they were not making a wit-

ful delay. Some of the penalties for forward passes were very much frowned on. The Bruins show a total of 35 yard penalties and Firth 10 yards. In the first quarter both teams were offside several times. Firth committed an error in a forward pass for a gain of 20 yards. Twin Falls tried four passes but all were incomplete. Firth threw three passes and Twin Falls one.

Brains Score in Second.

During the first quarter the visitors started off with a touch and looked as if they would score but the Bruin backs got busy on their forward pass and soon had the ball. Sullivan kicked off for Twin Falls and Firth lost the ball without making any yardage. Rich clipped off the line on the first try over the objective. Then on the next play Young made three yards but Lockyer fumbled and the Bruins got the ball on the Firth's 42-yard line. They made two touchdowns before Perrine. Sullivan's pass was caught by Firth on the 45-yard line. Young was tackled here for a loss and an end run. Firth fisted on a new and Lucas made nearly the runner for a ten-yard loss. Perrine stopped and ran for a gain of 10 yards and 7 and finally put the ball over for the first down. Perrine again clipped off 18 yards on an end run and on the next play Rich Robertson started the fireworks with a broken run around and through a line back using his arm to get through the Firth's 42-yard line. Sullivan punted through for a touchdown on the second try and Robertson converted making the score 7 to 0 in the second quarter.

Sullivan kicked to Firth's ten-yard line and the ball was run back to the Bruin's 40-yard line. Perrine carried his forward pass and the number 10, Hollis Martin replaced Downs at half. By a series of handoffs and end runs the ball was carried to Perrine's 42-yard line but a forward pass by the Bruins was intercepted behind the goal line and the Bruins lost their chance for a second score in the first half.

Firth kicked to Martin who returned 15 yards. Martin made a five yard Perrine failed to gain and Martin made four but Firth got the ball on downs. Twin Falls regained the ball later on Firth's 25-yard line. Perrine carried 5, Robertson 6, Sully 2. Martin failed to gain and Perrine clipped off six yards. Here replaced Martin and Robertson lost five yards. The third quarter showed with the ball on the 35-yard line in the Bruin's possession.

Robertson kicked to the 29-yard line. Young made a yard, a pass was incomplete and the Bruins blocked the Firth punt and recovered it on the 52-yard mark. Sully made three yards and Berg added one and Sully went over for the second touchdown. On the try for a field goal the kick was low but Firth was offside and the point was allowed. Twin Falls 14, Firth 0.

Sully kicked off to the 10-yard mark and Firth ran it back to the 25-yard mark. A pass was incomplete and the Bruins received a 15-yard penalty for interfering with the receiver. Another try at a pass was incomplete and the Bruins recovered a fumble on their own 45-yard mark. The Bruins received five yards for delaying the game. 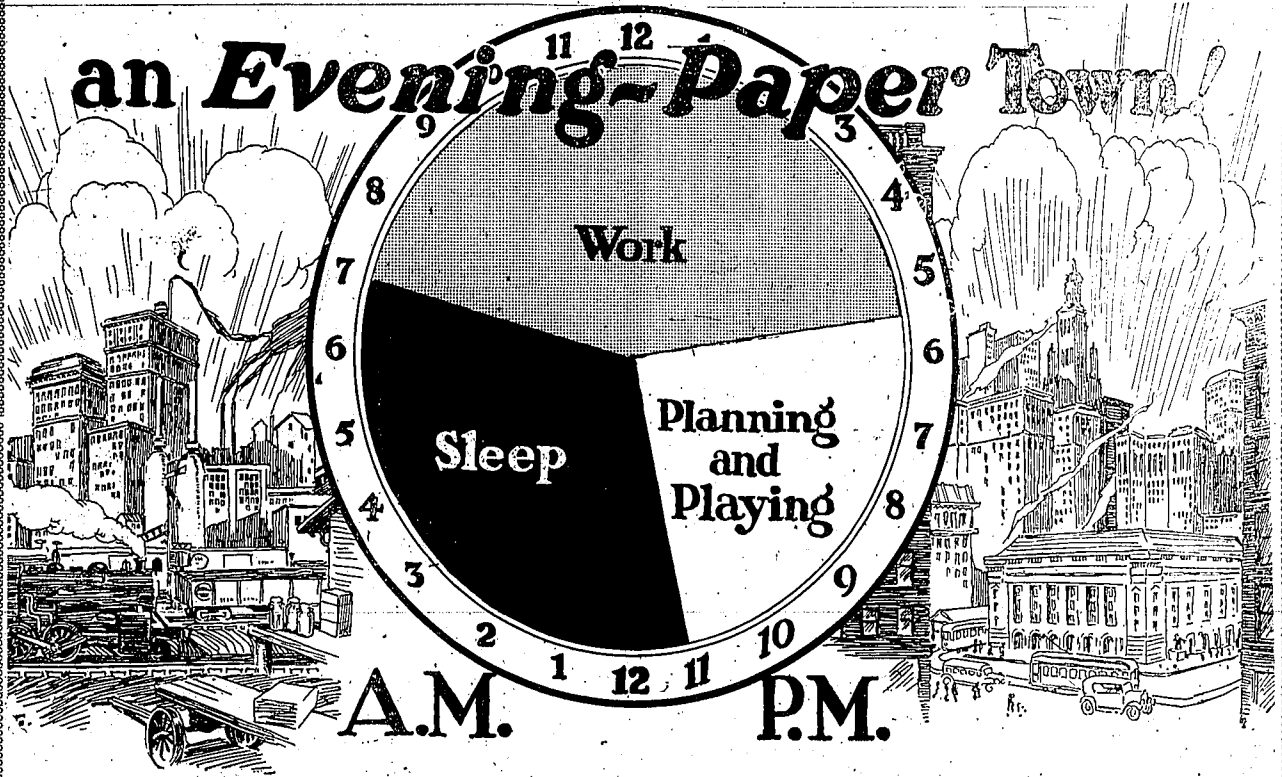
