

TWO ALASKAN TOWNS SWEEP BY BIG BLAZE

Hundreds Homeless Result of Fire in Douglas and Treadwell; Conflagration Fanned by a Heavy Wind.

JUNEAU, Alaska, Oct. 11.—More than 300 persons were homeless today from a fire which swept Douglas and Treadwell.

The fire was fanned by a heavy wind and before volunteer workers could bring it under control it had spread from the Indian section on the beach to the famous Treadwell district.

Every home on the beach and on St. Ann's avenue was wiped out. The Congregational and Catholic churches, the St. Ann's hospital, the stamp mill and other buildings in the Treadwell company were destroyed and the houses of company officials burned.

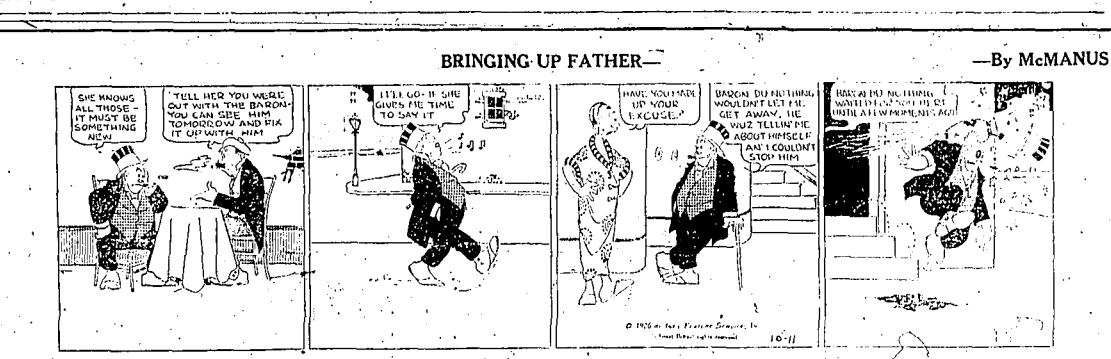
