

Borah Calls Handling Of Confiscated Alien Property Only Mess

PROBE NEEDED SOLON CLAIMS

Idaho Senator in Favor of Forcing Vital Testimony.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—According to the United States administration of \$200,000,000 of confiscated war time German property was a mess, Senator William E. Borah, republican, Idaho, chairman of a special committee to investigate the situation, commented today. "It is no wonder individuals took upon the property as legitimate prey."

Borah is planning to force before his committee testimony on the alien property transactions from Thomas W. Miller, former alien property custodian, and former Attorney General Henry M. Daugherty, who supervised a trial ended yesterday in disrepute.

Jack Dempsey, who lost his world heavyweight boxing title to Gene Tunney at Philadelphia last month, has given to Henry L. Farrell, sports editor of the United Press, his first detailed interview since the fight.

In the interview he revealed that he was not the Dempsey of old, had not suffered through his last absence from the ring.

That when he closed his training camp at the middle of Atlantic City before the fight it was because he felt he was being made to "hook bait" by one of his sparring partners.

That he will soon return to California, resume training, and come will depend his decision as to the future.

He sincerely feels that Gene Tunney was the better fighter than he was that night in Philadelphia.

GOODING AND THE CADAVR

Backers of Senator Frank E. Gooding are said to object to "digging up a cadaver," referring particularly to speeches by John F. Nugent on house bill No. 77. Perhaps a similar sentiment was felt, though not expressed, by Mrs. Mary E. Crumroy, of Paul, recently convicted of poisoning her husband, and to whom retrial was refused by the court Saturday.

Unfortunately, her attorneys were not coached by the friends of the Idaho junior senator when seeking another hearing. Digging up evidence is always disagreeable to the cadaver.

The gravest sample of attack on criticism leveled at official dereliction is the following taken from an editorial in the Idaho Falls Times-Register, sent out by Republican headquarters:

"John F. Nugent's campaign in north Idaho has been an eye opener in just one respect. He put the candidate he thought he was... The Democratic nominee has been held up as a man of superior moral attainments, an able lawyer, a polished orator, well-read, thoughtful, studious, his feet crowded on pedicure, his eyes looking forward. In fact he has been held up as just such a man as John W. Davis was when the Democrats put him in the race for president."

"Davis, one remembers, was considered the kind of man who would grace the White House. Then he opened his mouth to voice, and signed wrongfully, just inches from the dome. He dropped his fingers in good faith and rose with the appearance and reputation of a demagogue."

"Recent, alas, is following in his footsteps." Pausing for a moment on the Davis campaign of alleged demagoguery which, indeed strongly resembled the Nugent campaign: Davis pointed to the criminal actions of Harry M. Daugherty and Albert Fall, now patent enough, and was denounced as a demagogue by the trust party. The people did not believe the things that are now being shown up fully in court.

Remember that one cry for Gooding is "His interests are our interests." Doubtless a lot of small sheepmen who barely escaped annihilation voted for him in 1918 and 1920 on that very theory. Is he the sort of constructive statesman whom the Idaho Times-Register thinks we ought to keep in the senate to manage the affairs of state and nation? Or is the editorial one of those "original" contributions accompanied by a five dollar check?

Even in those things where Gooding is supposed to have learned knowledge by experience, his admitted ignorance is such he cannot be depended on to vote for such interests as he may have in common with others. He confessed in 1922 that he had been fooled by the operation of schedule K on wools and woolsens in the tariff for many years by the trusts. He admitted in the last session of congress that he supposed that the imposition of an extra 12 cents a bushel tariff on wheat would raise it that much; until it didn't do it. Then he voted for the Haysen bill said to "seek to effectuate tariff protection for the farmers as the general schedule of tariff duties protects manufactured articles; a measure which failed to pass against which the administration stood, and against which Senator Borah voted because of its unconstitutional provisions. Even the tariff on wool, while in some degree helping wool growers, at least at times, is so constructed carried woolen manufacturers say, as to keep out by exorbitant duties, woolsens which do not compete with the American wools at all, and thus to that extent cripple those whom it is intended to help.

Assuming that the voters of Idaho are on as low a moral plane as the Times-Register and the republican committee assume; granting that Daugherty and Fall and house bill 77 meet their approval; do they think it wise for the people to return a man, who may do to them as Gooding sought to do to small sheepmen with that bill and whose ignorance of economic laws has been confessed by himself more than once on the floor of the senate?

WHY CROM IS LEAVING

One of the pioneer settlers on the Twin Falls tract is leaving here today for Texas to make his future home. J. A. Crom owns much land here and his holdings are extensive and he is an integral part of this community and at his age it is a sad sight to see him leaving what has become home to him and a neighbor to us. Some one says, what is the reason for this emigration on the part of our mutual friend and neighbor and that is the purpose of this editorial. Two years ago this pioneer settler decided that it would round out his life to serve this community in the state senate and having been a taxpayer and a Republican for years he sought the nomination on that ticket. But he did not suit the bosses and the machine in Twin Falls county and the result was that he was defeated in the pri-

mary by a representative of this Twin Falls county machine and this was indeed a great blow to this pioneer settler and hardy citizen of Idaho. Had there been any real serious objection to this gentleman's attitude or general demeanor then the bosses might be excused for defeating this splendid old pioneer, but there was no such opposition. The only excuse that the bosses could offer was that he could not be manipulated.

Another keen job was made by the machine bosses of Twin Falls county when they ordered the county commissioners to let the contract to a certain bridge construction engineer instead of granting it to the people's choice and the firm which offered the best proposition. This is another of the reasons that Mr. Cron feels that he can be of more use to some other community than he can here in Twin Falls county. Again this hardy pioneer is in harmony with the majority of the people of Twin Falls county and against the bosses. He exerted and worked for the bridge franchise and stood with the many others who favored the Dravo Construction company as the proper concern to be given the franchise and the concern which was ready to begin immediate construction of the bridge. When political corruption becomes so rank that good hardy pioneer citizens will move rather than submit to the dictates of this machine it is about time that the people should rise up and brattle this ring.

One of our readers from the West End was in the other day and stated that he was so much enthused with that editorial The Times carried on Charles Helmer for county commissioner that he was going to do an unheard of thing by voting for a Democrat because of his splendid qualifications for that office. This gentleman stated that he would like to see the fellow who asserted that this bridge and road construction man would be in a position to save Twin Falls county in the neighborhood of one hundred thousand dollars in the next two years and we took him direct to the man's office who made this statement and that man stands ready to interview any others on the very same statement but is reluctant about having his name published. We believe that enough sound business men will be convinced before election this man who has spent the major part of his life as a bridge and road construction contractor will be worthy of consideration at the polls when you come to cast your ballot for a county commissioner.

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LIVE STOCK BASIS IN IDAHO

Secretary Donald McLean of Wool Growers Clubs Figures at Klamath City to Sustain His Argument; Horses, Sheep and Cattle on Mountains Enhances Their Beauty.

Declaring the live stock interest to be the basic Idaho industry, Secretary Donald McLean of the Idaho Wool Growers' association at the meeting of the Klamath club last evening produced figures to show the magnitude of its operations. Of the \$82,000,000 received for agricultural products last year, 65 per cent was paid by livestock interests for feed. He said that Idaho has constituties partly nearly 35 per cent of the crop of Idaho. Practically all the grain in Idaho must be fed and only, all the corn, barley and other grains except wheat are fed stock and some wheat is. This makes a total of \$42,500,000 to be deducted from Idaho's total of \$129,000,000, mostly spent in the state for its development.

The lumber interest is next largest, with \$25,000,000, and forestry \$22,000,000, and tourism.

Secretary Donald McLean said that livestock enhances the beauty of the landscape and makes it more alluring. He based this on "by-products" of livestock raising, totaling 75 per cent of the area of Idaho be made to pay by encouraging the live stock industry and thus increase taxable values and lower taxes. He argued for the preservation of natural resources.
