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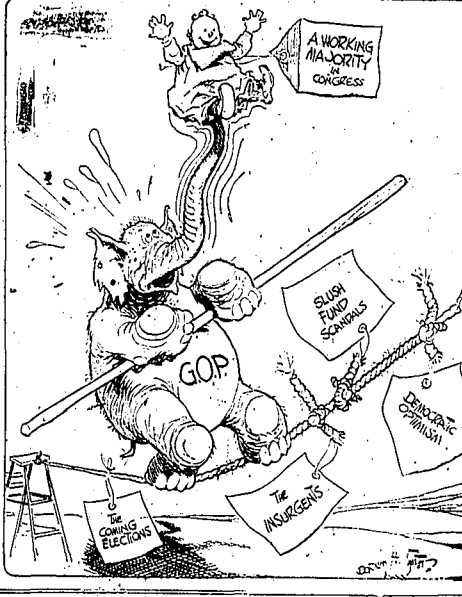

## FALSE OBJECTIONS TO MUNICIPAL POWER

BY JAMES D. WHELAN.

In view of the intelligent and systematic study of the matter of municipal power for Twin Falls, and the Barry Dibble plan for mutual power development, the criticisms on government and municipal ownership are pertinent. Under the heading, "Socialism Attacks Every Individual," the Pacific Coast Manufacturer attacks the California and Oregon referendums on measures for state development of hydroelectric power.

The whole criticism is sophistical in the extreme. In the first place the proposition for government and municipal ownership is not socialism, though it is sometimes inaccurately so-called. Practically every political economist favors such ownership, on non-socialist and individual anti-socialist grounds. On the other hand, socialist authorities like Morris Hillquit, John Sargo and Gaylord Wilshire oppose government and municipal ownership, as based on principles opposed to their own, and likely to interfere with the carrying out of their plan for ownership and democratic management of all lines of business larger than a partnership.

The Manufacturer says government ownership of public utilities and natural monopolies is "entirely outside the function of government." This is absolutely untrue. The reverse is more nearly right. These monopolies operate by means of a franchise, which cannot be obtained except from the government. The value of the franchise and right of way is generally about half the value of the property, sometimes it is more. The private company operating a public utility secures and uses a public franchise and exercises the governmental right of eminent domain to condemn a right of way through private property, paying for same "the government value."

This power the government of nation, state or city has a right to retain and exercise for itself, and the operation thereof is an incident to this right. The only excuse for granting this essentially governmental function to a private company is that the private company will operate the same more satisfactorily and more for the public benefit than the public could operate it for itself. The burden of proof must rest on the private corporation.

On the practical side, the Manufacturer falls into a still greater sophistry. It assumes that what the private monopoly pays in taxes does not come out of the pockets of the people in the first instance in extra charges. This plain facts tell the other way. When the state grants a franchise to a company it, either by express terms or legal implication, it grants the right to collect a reasonable return on its investment. Whether so-called or not, public utility corporations are monopolies by nature, hence the term, "natural monopolies" applied to them by economists. In return for the right to collect a reasonable return for investment, the state reserves the power to set that the company does not charge more than a reasonable figure. Hence, we have public utility commissions, which never keep prices and profits down to competitive figures but which even in the worst cases, like that of Idaho, have a tendency to keep them slightly under full unrestricted monopoly figures; though the interpretation placed on the law by the Idaho commission throws doubt on this last statement.

Suppose taxes are increased on the public utility to an extent that endangers its power to collect the very liberal return that the commission calls reasonable, the commission has the power and right to allow a raise in rates so that it can still pay its stockholders a reasonable return on investment. No other principle could be applied, for a corporation were allowed only a certain rate as a maximum and then the state could tax that out of existence; I would be plain confiscation of property. The fact, therefore, are that allowance for taxes must be made in rates charged, so that every dollar the Idaho Power company pays in taxes must be collected from the public in addition to allowing it a reasonable return over and above taxes on its investment. For instance, a concrete example was given in the debate on the public utility commission in the legislature of Idaho in 1921 regarding a bonus paid by the company to allow it to absorb a certain traction company. The company paid the bonus to the city and then naturally got leave to raise its rates to pay the bonus. On the other hand, should all taxes on public utilities be abolished; the public as a whole would not lose thereby since it would be the duty of the commission to reduce rates correspondingly.

The idea that the utilities pay their taxes out of pur instead of collecting them in advance from the people is only one of the many pernicious errors into which the Manufacturer falls.

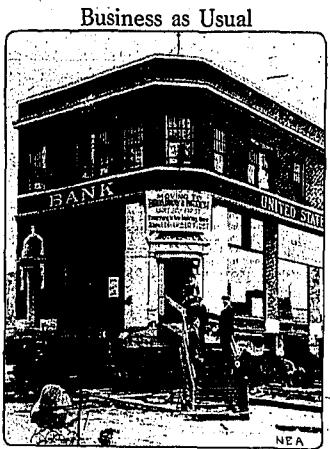

# FARM STOCK

## BALANCED RATION FOR YOUNG STOCK

It has not been many years since the balanced ration was first introduced with progressive live stock breeders and feeders. For many years experts have been contending for the purpose of determining the exact ratio between various classes of feeding stuffs that were suitable for the use of live stock. It was thought in the recent years that any ration containing the right proportions of carbohydrates, fats and proteins, provided they were of a high grade, was all that was required for complete nutrition of the animal's body. It was then discovered that there are other food substances that are necessary for growth, maintenance and development, particularly of young animals. These substances pointed to revolutionize the entire feeding industry, especially of young animals, still breeding stock. A few years ago the question of vitamins was unheard of. There was no attention paid to any such substances, nor was it thought there was anything besides the usual carbohydrates, fats and proteins. The discovery of these food substances brought out the fact that, for successful growth and reproduction in all kinds of live stock, that certain substances were necessary and must be supplied in some form in the rations. This has opened new fields for investigation and research, and, as we have seen, the case with all such discoveries, the standard principle has been greatly overworked. There is no question that vitamins are very important for all kinds of animals, but just at the present time we have no knowledge as to just what we can expect from their use, nor can we determine whether or not we can supply them from a commercial source with any satisfaction or profit.

## Hog Raising Simplified

By Green Forage Crops  
The man who is contemplating raising some hogs this year should now be planning on some forage crops for winter pasture.

Green forage, says the state college of agriculture, New Hampshire, saves a great amount of feed and allows the animal to get plenty of fresh air.
