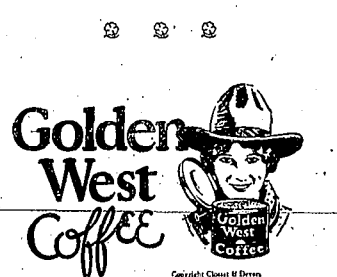

IDAHO AND OREGON ROAD ECONOMY

Said a well known republican yesterday: "Anybody looking for material on the state machine has only to travel over the roads and keep his eyes open. I was over in Oregon, where they have a democratic governor, a short time ago and saw a man running a combined plow and scraper on the road. He was doing fine work. Coming into Idaho I saw one man running a plow and two running a scraper and the three doing less work than the one was doing in Oregon and not doing it as well. But it added to the number of votes that might be expected to keep the republican machine in power. The same sort of thing works all down the line; whether in management of the county, with its numerous autos; the management of the bridge, or the management of the hospital, the republican machine is an expensive proposition for the taxpayers. Now, that election is near, we have a promise of 17 miles of oiled roads around Twin Falls, put out by the state highway department. That is pretty good propaganda. I am afraid it will be like the bridge promise; it will take a long time to fulfill after election. I am pretty tired of the republican management in this state."

GETTING OUT THE VOTE IMPORTANT

It is the duty of every citizen to vote at the coming elections. Vote as you please but by all means register and vote is the slogan of every loyal citizen in Twin Falls county and Southern Idaho. It is a sad state of affairs when the citizens of a community or state will allow a minority to elect the officers for that community but past records of election returns show that this is true in the state and in the nation. When such conditions exist is it any wonder we have poor government?

The following editorial from the Omaha World-Herald is timely on this line of thought and shows what they are doing in that city to get out the vote:

Hamilton and others among the early founders of the republic were fearful of giving the "common people" the right to vote. It is a far cry from their day to the present time when organizations like "Believers in Omaha" find it of utmost difficulty to persuade people, common or otherwise, to exercise the right of franchise which the fathers of the republic finally inserted in the constitution.

In the recent primary, despite an exceedingly hot fight over the nomination for sheriff in both democratic and republican parties, the result of the work of the "Believers in Omaha" was meager. Less than half the eligible voters showed up at the polls to mark their ballots. This so alarms those who want more voters to vote that they have stretched the constitutional provision that to vote is the right of every man, and now they have it, according to Dr. MacDermid, that to vote is the highest duty of every man or woman.

Many people, however, resent being told what is their duty. The forefathers bled and died for the right to vote, and the mothers of the present generation made various kinds of painful sacrifices to give women the right to vote and yet none of them fought and suffered to assert the principle that it is the duty of every man and woman to vote.

Voting is not a test of duty. It is a test of intelligence. The man or woman who has studied the history of the struggle of the race for liberty, knows that freedom is based upon the privilege of the government to select those who will rule over them. Knowing this, most men and women do not find it difficult to become interested in parties, to study candidates, and to go to the polls on election day to see to it that the uncontrolled, unheeded votes of the majority will not be overcome by the bought votes, or the machine-controlled votes of the selfish office seeker. Most people consider it a high privilege to be able to strike a blow for decency in public affairs at every election day.

But to say that they must do so is to go too far. The voter who has to be dragged to the polls, or cajoled into balloting, or harangued and preached at to stir him from his lethargy, doesn't cast a vote that's worth the paper it's printed on. The vote under compulsion is worth little more than the vote under bribery. Not more voters, but more intelligent voters, should be the goal of any organization interested in preserving the principles of democracy that Alexander Meikeljohn so gloomily reported the other day to be "a self-evident failure."

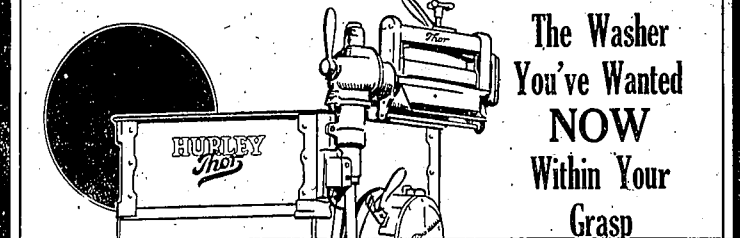
