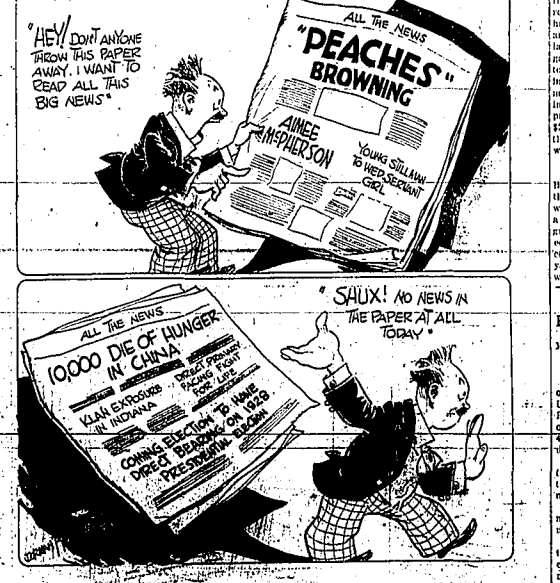

BURLEY LOSES TO BRUIMS BY SCORE OF 20-0

Twin Falls Scores Three Touchdowns on Cassia County Eleven; Burley Never Gets Close to Scoring Position.

The fighting Twin Falls eleven defeated Burley high eleven in a hard-fought game yesterday by the score of 20-0. After a close first half in which the score stood 7-0 in favor of Twin Falls the Bruims took advantage of the break and scored two more touchdowns, narrowly missing another late in the fourth quarter. Some idea of Burley's success in offensive football may be gained when it is known that the team never was within Twin Falls' thirty yard line. Despite several gains the Twin Falls goal was never really threatened during the entire game.

The Bruims played a hardy brand of football throughout, making few mistakes and justlyly doing the right thing. They took advantage of every error made by Burley and were never really pressed.

In the first half Rich Robertson clearly had the better of the play, and Burley, in the punting department and Twin Falls profited by the exchange of punts. Robertson's kicks had that necessary ability rolling ten to twenty yards after striking the ground.

Both teams played straight, old-fashioned football, resulting in few passes. Herbie Owens, distinctive Bruim ball, tore off several beautiful long end runs and Sullivan and Herbie Perrine led the Bruims unmercifully. Perrine, too, found a clear path around the ends several times.

It was noticeable that when the line came to punt, Robertson was never hurried up to the strictiveness of the Twin Falls line, while Welch kicked the machine to get several of his kicks blocked and he never had time enough. Twin Falls was somewhat wretched, then Burley.

The Bruim team played well but was simply up against a better machine. At the start it looked like anybody's game but with each touchdown the Bruim grew more easy for the Bruim and more hard for Burley. Burke Burley's 178 pound fullback, was the star for the Bruim. He was hit by Welch and Frost gave him good support. Burke tipped through the Twin Falls line for his runs time and again but was unable to get close enough to score with his terrific plunger.

First Quarter.
Twin Falls made an inside kick and took the ball. That play caught Burley completely by surprise and gave Twin Falls the initial advantage. Herz kicked out of bounds and it was Burley's ball. Burke tore through the Bruim line for yardage, but then failed to gain and Welch kicked 15 yards. The play was made in Burley's end of the field. After Burke made six yards Welch booted the oval 20 yards. Twb returned the kick. Burke, the center for 3 yards. Welch made 8 through tackle. As Burley failed to make yardage on the next four plays Twin Falls took the ball. Sullivan made 4 through center. The ball is on Burley's 20 yard line. Herz made 2 yards and on the next play it was first down for the Bruims. Owens was taken out. Buster James, of Burley, hurt. Herz made 6 yards and Robertson then went over for the first touchdown. The Bruim's first was kicked. Score, Twin Falls 7; Burley 0. Welch kicked off for Burley and Twin Falls returned the ball 6 yards. Twin Falls kicked and Burley was trying desperately to gain as the quarter ended.

Second Quarter.
Burke failed to gain on a punt and Welch kicked to Robertson who was downed in his 17th yard. The ball was taken back and Twin Falls permitted. Burley fumbled and it was Twin's ball. Robertson booted to Frank. Then Welch kicked out of bounds. Twin took the line and Robertson kicked at 20 yards. Burke made 10 yards. Burley fumbled and fell on the ball. Burley could not penetrate the Bruim line and kicked to Robertson who was downed without moving an inch. Twin kicked to Frank. Twin was penalized. The ball went to Burley and he kicked, the ball going out of bounds on Twin's 15 yard line as the half ended.

Third Quarter.
Twin made another inside kick. The ball was near the line and the Bruim made several plays in trying to take out of bounds. Twin kicked over the Bruim goal line and it was the Cassia county's ball on their own 10 yard line. Burke tore through for 15 yards. Burke again made a yard. The Bruim center threw the ball over the quarterback's head and Burley was lucky to gain possession. Welch kicked to the Bruim's 25 yard

line. Herz made 2 yards. Owens blocked around right end for 17 yards on one of the longest and most brilliant runs of the day. Sullivan failed to catch the ball and went over for the second touchdown of the game. Goal was kicked. Score Twin Falls 14; Burley 0. Burley kicked off for Twin's 10 yard line. Robertson returned the compliment. Burley booted it. A punting duel with honors about even. Sullivan made five yards. Robertson kicked left end for 20 yards. Owens scored a touchdown. The attempt at goal failed. Score Twin Falls 20; Burley 0. Burley kicked off to Twin's 10 yard line.

Fourth Quarter.
A kicking duel featured the opening of the last period. Owens booted down a Burley pass, which, if he had succeeded in intercepting, would have meant a sure touchdown as he had a clear field ahead. Burley fumbled and recovered. Welch kicked to Robertson, who was downed in his track. Burley's attempt to pass was intercepted. Twin's ball on a blocked kick. Perrine went in for downs and proceeded to tear off about 8 yards around left end—Herz made 2 yards. Twin Falls failed to gain on the next play and Robertson kicked 20 yards. Welch returned it 20 on a punt. Toward the close of the game Coach Maston put in one of his substitutes but they had little opportunity to show their stuff because the final whistle put an end to this game.
