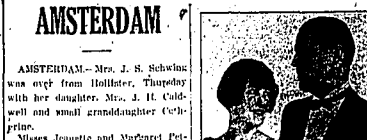

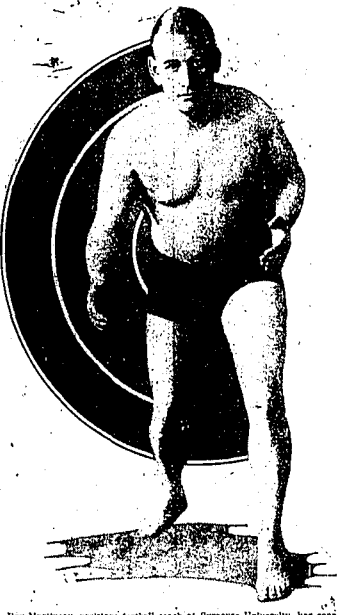

WHO CAUSED THE RECENT PANIC?

Since the morning paper has attempted in its flimsy editorial way to explain all the panics which have taken place during the last sixty years, it might be worth while to ask them what caused the panic in Idaho about three years ago when more than 100 banks failed and the whole nation was in the throes of a financial depression. That must have been caused by some Democratic president or administration, and yet the Democrats' lost control of Congress in the election of 1918. President Wilson took the tariff out of politics and it should be kept out, but now the Republicans hope to bring it back into the political circles at least long enough to re-elect Gooding to the U. S. senate. There is no other real excuse for re-electing him and they hope to trump up one under the old hoodoo of the protective tariff. The tariff costs Idaho every year at least five times as much as it returns to the state and yet the Democratic party is not the free trade party that the Republicans try to make it appear to be.

But the Democratic party pledges itself to put the tariff on a scientific basis where the farmer will get equal relief with the manufacturers.

Let us examine the facts and see if we can determine just what the causes for these panics were. In the first place it harps back to the Cleveland panic or rather the panic which was brought about by President Harrison, a Republican protectionist, and the political leaders in Congress were able with Wall Street's help and by depleting the gold reserve beyond the danger limit, to stave off until President Cleveland took his seat; but it is a well established fact that the dies for that big bond issue which followed were actually ordered and made up under the Republican administration of President Harrison. Then in reality the cause of this panic was due to the Republican party with a high protective tariff. Here at least are two panics which were caused by Republicans under a high tariff.

Cleveland had "no eight year period." He was nominated first in 1884 two months after the panic that year broke out under the high tariff regime of President Arthur, and so ably administered things that he pulled the country out of the hole and accumulated a big surplus through economy. Defeated in 1888 by "black-or-five" purchases he still had a big plurality on the popular vote, and was returned in 1892, following the panic of 1890 under Harrison and high tariff. Two months after his inauguration under the operation of the McKinley bill, the panic to which the morning paper refers broke out. The Wilson low tariff bill did not pass until August 1894, 15 months after that panic broke out. On February 19, 1926, the American Economist, organ of the American Protective Tariff league, said editorially, "Beyond all shadow of a doubt the real cause of the panics of 1890 and 1893 was not tariff or trade conditions." To take any other position would have left the Economist laying the blame on the high tariffs then existing. Then the morning paper should recall that Black Friday after the war was under a republican high tariff, that the great panic of 1873 was under a high tariff and that the great financial panic of 1907 was also under republican and high tariff rule.

The republican lay great store by the claim that implements are on the free list. So they are, but world conditions are such that foreign implements cannot compete even on neutral ground with American, and all the trusts have to do in such cases is keep down domestic competition. It was simply shown in the great steel trust report of the house of representatives that the trust kept its domestic competitors in line by preventing them from getting tough with some of the things needed to make complete articles. The steel trust, the harvester trust and aluminum trust have material for all parts in every article they make. A few smaller concerns have the same, but only a few. The steel trusts by putting a tariff on missing parts needed by competitors compel the latter either to buy abroad and pay the tariff or to buy direct of them at their own prices. In either case, the competitors cannot cut the price to the consumer. Hence, the present tariff not only holds up the farmer but retards American production. After quoting so many republican authorities on tariff tariff futility recently, among them Haugen and Frank Gooding, further citations would be superfluous.

The republican machine falsely seeks to make people believe that the chairmanship of every committee controls that committee, whereas the chairman is simply the presiding officer thereof, and a shift makes no difference. Senator Borah is head of the foreign relations committee, but when the administration wants a measure over it puts it over through Senator Swanson, ranking democratic member, as happened for instance, in the case of the world court. This fact is so notorious that the impudent implication in the republican advertisement is an insult to every intelligent voter.
