JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

The Judicial Department of our state is in fact the most important department and we should look well to securing men to fill the positions of judges who are known best for their legal ability rather than for their political opinions. I feel that the rank and file of all parties in this state agree that this department should be taken out of politics forever, and it is my purpose to see that in the future judges shall be elected on a non-partisan ticket with regard for legal qualifications and disregard for political faith. The ballots for this should be separate from the general ballots. Instead of men who are nominated for such positions campaigning the law should provide that committees be appointed by the Bar Association of this state. The duties of this committee for campaign purposes shall be to set forth the qualifications of the candidates which such committee represent.

No nation is any stronger than the belief of its people in the decisions of its courts.

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

The duty of this body is to enact necessary and reasonable laws to govern and protect the citizens of our state. At the coming election you will be consulted with the matter of voting for an amendment to our constitution. This amendment has been submitted to the people by the legislative body of our state. They are asking the people to give them \$10 a day in the place of \$5 a day for their stipend as legislators, but as these are

elective offices and no one is required to serve unless he signifies his willingness and because I believe that every man owes a duty to his state without full cash compensation and for the further reason that some of your state officers whom you elect receive a compensation adequate for the efforts, time and talent which they should give, I am opposed to such a constitutional amendment.

We have citizens who are commended by the courts of our state to act as jurors at such times as the courts see fit and who now get but \$3 a day. This amount is not sufficient to pay the board and room required during the time these men are on duty, this sum should be raised to \$5 a day. These men do not serve of their own choice but are conscripted and in many cases have to perform a very disagreeable task in rendering decisions against acquaintances and friends. In my opinion about the losses from intemperance to their personal affairs. These jurors are generally called during the time of year that most of these men, who are farmers, have to leave their personal work to others to perform.

Another piece of effective legislation that is necessary is a provision whereby men elected to the legislature may not, during the time for which he is so elected, receive an appointment from any officer of the state department which will permit him to draw a large salary during the remainder of his legislative term, for performing a service in some other state department. For the reason that in some instances they are undoubtedly swayed in the votes that they may cast on certain subjects in which the officer, who may make such an appointment, may be concerned in having enacted as a law.

A constitutional amendment should be proposed by the next legislature providing for Probate Courts having jurisdiction in civil cases to the sum of \$1000 instead of \$500. The law should be amended so civil cases in the justice court would be applicable to the Probate Courts only and further provide that sums under \$100 should not be applicable to the District Courts. Our District Courts are becoming so congested that it either means putting additional duties upon the Probate Courts, most of who have time to care for same, or to crowding more district judges within our state. These minor matters can be easily handled in the Probate Courts of our state.

WANTS HEADLESS BALLOT.

The headless ballot should be adopted by the State of Idaho so that each voter shall make his choice for each official to be voted upon rather than by utilizing the circles as now in vogue in this state. You will remember that in the election that caused the great contest concerning who should hold a seat in the United States Senate from the State of Iowa two years ago. In many states it has been discarded and should be discarded here as our people are all intelligent and know who they want to cast a ballot for regardless of the statement purporting to have been made by some of the political manipulators of this state, that people are not intelligent enough to check board and vote for other than what appears on the ballot in any particular party.

ABOLISH CABINET GOVERNMENT.

The cabinet form of government in this state should be abolished as it is too expensive to operate for a population of a little over 500,000 thousand people. Such forms of government are designed and are economically worked only in states of five million people or more.

I stand for economy in all departments, for efficiency with no more on the payroll than is actually necessary to complete work on hand at stated times.

The State Highway Department makes expenditures greatly in excess of one million dollars per annum which comes from taxes on automobiles and gasoline. This expenditure is made by the head of the Bureau of Public Works without having to secure sanction from any of the elective officers. This is wrong and the expenditures should be controlled by a board of not less than three of the elective officers, as a thorough check should be made on expenditures that run into such vast amounts annually.

The State of Idaho owns 111 automobiles of which 43 are Buicks, three Cadillacs, 30 Fords and the balance are numerous other makes. This, however, does not cover all automobiles used by the State Department, but it is a fair estimate, the number of which I have been unable to obtain, belong to the employees and they are paid at the rate of approximately 10 cents a mile for use of such cars. Approximately one-half of the operation cost of the government is an indirect tax on gasoline, automobile taxes, and fees charged for certain services of state officers.

OLEOMARGERINE LEGISLATION.

A bill should be passed by the coming legislature to relieve the dairy industry of this state from having to compete with substitutions for butter, without full notice being given to the purchaser so that they may know that when they purchase such substitution that they are not getting a real dairy product. The industries of this state should and must be protected, so far as is possible, in order that the people engaged in the different industries of our state shall be able to recover the maximum from their investments and labor.

The cost per capita in taxation during the Alexander term was \$12.70, the first Davis administration \$11.70, and the second \$12.60. I have been unable to get complete data on the Moore administration, but the indications are that the taxpayers have not received any relief from the high per capita cost.

I feel well realize that the Governor of the State of Idaho is your trustee to see that the duties of that important office are fulfilled according to law with due regard for the expenditure of money, so that taxation may be much less than what it has been heretofore. For only through economy and efficiency can taxes be lowered. I have resided in the State of Idaho for over 35 years and the bulk of my accumulations are invested in farms, stock and real estate and I know full well that the industries in the state must also be protected in order for this farming community to

GOODING'S WHEAT TARIFF BEHEMETH

Acknowledges Correctness of Times Quotations of Yesterday; Schedules No Help if There Is Surplus Raised Here Without Supplemental Laws; Graham Assails Times

"I noted in the evening paper that I am quoted in saying that farmers are not benefited by the tariff on wheat. I never claimed that the tariff on wheat was a benefit. A tariff on products of which there is a surplus abroad cannot be beneficial without some legislation like the McNary-Haugen bill. Without these words, mutilating the substantial truth of the Times editorial of Thursday evening, Senator Gooding, however, proceeded to write a long letter purporting to show benefit for farmers from the Borden-McCumber bill, including 12 cents a bushel on wheat and the tariff on other articles of which the McNary-Haugen bill, which was drafted for the purpose of giving farmers increased prices, but they do not get from the tariff on other articles.

Later the senator declared that he had always been in favor of legislation in drafting tariff legislation but promised that the farm bill would right itself in due time and pass the McNary-Haugen bill.

Good Good Friday. The Twin Falls high school band paraded the streets last night as good as a crowd as attended the school meeting where no band was available.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman John W. Graham, who seemed laboring under inefficiency and suppressed excitement. The chairman announced the resolutions for the week, scored the advertising done in behalf of A. H. Aaker, progressive candidate for state legislator, and advised all to vote for Judge Hugh A. Baker and William A. Babcock.

Chairman Graham proceeded to lambast The Times and its editor regarding the publication of figures taken from the official reports of County assessor J. C. Stearns. He said, "The figures of the commission-ary office for the present year show an excess of 110,000 bushels of wheat. Look out for graft from any man who takes out of the bridge. There is this talk about the bridge, I had nothing to do with the bridge beyond walking on it and built. Probably the editor of The Times, who wanted the Borden Commission to build it, expected to get some of the money in the building of the last minute." "These things were published long ago," interrupted J. H. Masten, editor of The Times. To this Mr. Graham did not reply, but after a denunciation of John P. Noyce mentioned the signed tariff which would cut creation in the tariff and would it aside with a gesture; Senator Gooding, however, found the tariff editorial much more serious than

Gooding's. Senator Gooding indicated in a long statement of the history of the country and the tariff as understood by Senator Gooding. He called at the south, at the international bankers' country, called for lower freight rates, and claimed credit for many acts in the senate, although not chairman of the committee, introducing them. He said La Follette had not granted increased tariff schedules for the farmers in the senate bill.

The Olla Bill. He defended his action on the omnibus bill for the ground that his message would have meant: a speaking of bled products in the south. He spoke of the so-called Gooding lung and said that he had left no several qualifications, but left the impression that it might mean some changes in the present tariff.

Text of Bill. The Gooding bill provides "That no common carrier shall be authorized to charge less for a longer than a shorter haul for the transportation of passengers or of a like kind of property, over the same line or route in the same direction, if the longer distance, an amount of water, competition, or other matter, or of a like kind, is shown to exist, and such other matter, as may be lawfully in effect on December 31, 1925, shall not be required to be changed except upon the further order of the commission and provided justice, that the business of this paragraph shall not apply to rates on import and export traffic, including traffic coming from or destined to a possession or territory of the United States."

The bill was drafted by the Intermediate trade association, see Bulletin No. 117 and introduced by Congressman Gooding in the house and Senator Gooding in the senate.

He explained his pure need bill requiring cutting of foreign taxes. Senator Gooding proposed that he had always opposed him, No. 77; that his brother Fred had been repudiated by some shrewd man who was introduced some years before by Representative French at request of the Interior department and was again introduced by French; that French, Smith and Horah, not being familiar with range conditions, favored it; that he had introduced it in the senate after it had passed the house, and that it went through without roll call, during the session. Several present asked after the meeting why Senator Gooding had not told his fellow members in both house during his period that it was a bad bill, not why he gave an interview favoring the Capital News?

Many left before the senator finished his talk, and others obviously awaited his explanation of his attitude on house bill No. 77, as everyone who was left stirred and sat up when he mentioned it.

Curious Facts About Your Car and Its "Gas"

The pace at which high-pressure gas pumps have been spread since the war to other countries is only beginning to be realized abroad. It is probably even less realized here in the United States. A single illustration is that a petroleum pipe line is just being planned in Colombia, through a ten-inch pipe, will deliver 30,000 barrels of oil daily. The pipe line, a purely American project, is being planned in all the great oil fields of the world. A representative of the Borden government is now in this country studying contracts and arranging to lay an enormous mileage of pipe and accessories for lines in Russia.

The tendency to commoditize in the oil industry abroad is regarding Colombia, which is distinctly impressive. It is announced that Rumanian oil interests are ready to finance a pipeline, with view to a combination powerful enough to compete against the state monopoly of petroleum recently established in Turkey.

There is interest also in the formation of a German group aiming to control production of oil well equipment and apparatus. Manufacturers of these necessities in Czechoslovakia and the Silesia areas have joined the German companies in this project. They are now progressing with the British and French manufacturers. According to report, these arrangements concern the transportation of oil at prices, liberally distributing territory. The British interests are being far-bettered to be holding aloof.

In a recent address, W. B. Parham, president of the American Petroleum Institute, declared that "Texas fields will over 60 per cent of the total production of oil in this country in 1926. These fields include \$100,000,000 yearly production, \$2,250,000,000 gross petroleum tax, and general property taxes on \$1,000,000,000 investment in producing, refining and transporting oil."

Gasoline production during the last ten years increased 43 per cent because of the demands of automobiles. Geologists declare there are 151,000,000 acres of land in Texas from which it is possible to discover and produce oil—37 per cent of the entire area.
