ISSUING TODAY

President Calls Upon Nation to Observe Annual Holiday

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—President Coolidge today issued a proclamation designating Thursday, November 25, as Thanksgiving.

The text of the president's proclamation follows: "The millions of us as individuals we have passed another twelve months in favor of the Almighty. His insistent upon our fortunes and their growth, His plentiful blessings have prospered; industries have flourished and labor has been well compensated. While nations elsewhere have been vitiated by disaster, we have been spared any great national calamity or national catastrophe."

"Our moral and spiritual life has been enriched with the national prosperity. We are not unthankful of the gratitude we owe to God or His watchful care which pointed out to us the way of peace and happiness; we about not fall in our acknowledgment of His divine favor which has brought forth the fruits of His bounty. Neither should we be forgetful of those among us who, through stress of circumstances, are less fortunate in our acknowledgment, more acceptable in His sight."

"Therefore, I, Calvin Coolidge, president of the United States, do hereby set apart Thursday, the twenty-fifth day of November, next, as a day of general thanksgiving and prayer."

COOLIDGE REIGN UNDER SCRUTINY BY ALL PARTIES

People Wonder Whether Administration Has Been Successful.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 29.—Out of a conglomeration of men, personalities and issues, the nation's voters will select Tuesday some 600 men who are to make the laws of the land for the next two years.

Although complaints have centered around prosperity, economy, taxation, the world court, prohibition and diverse other matters, the chief national effect at issue is whether President Coolidge will continue to control his Congress during the final part of the administration.

Public opinion in the administration, that of both houses and the circuit courts, is the administration, public opinion in Congress will be shaped down to a point where a democratic-independent coalition may have law, the chief condition has assumed unusual importance.

Many republican senators who rode into office upon the Harding coalition six years ago and many congressmen who received the aid of President Coolidge's millions in majority party support, are running for reelection solely upon their own power. They, too, the 25 Republican senators who are up for reelection, are in a similar position.

In the senate the democrats must win eight seats from the republicans to gain control. In the house they must win 33 seats to fully control.

RUPERT IS NO MATCH FOR TWIN FALLS AND LOSES BY BIG SCORE

Brains Plow Through Visitors at Will; Result Never in Doubt; Perrine Again Stars With Great Exhibition of End Running.

Never threatening in any event the Rupert football team went down before the visitors of the Twin Falls high school eleven at Lincoln field yesterday, the score being 27-0.

The visitors were outplayed in every department of the game although the Bruins were hardly up to the pitch that has won them to consecutive victory over other high teams this year.

"Twin Falls made steady progress when they had the ball and checked Rupert's every effort when the oval was in possession of the enemy. Perrine directed the ends for huge gains time after time and attacked through the whole Rupert team for touchdowns." The Bruin line made holes in the visiting defense that a tractor could have driven through. Berg and Sullivan found these holes unerringly and when no holes were in evidence they would simply pass. So the game was never really in doubt once the Bruins were warmed up.

Robertson's gameplan was good and the field plays were usually good. His kicking was perhaps a shade better than that of Toyer of Rupert.

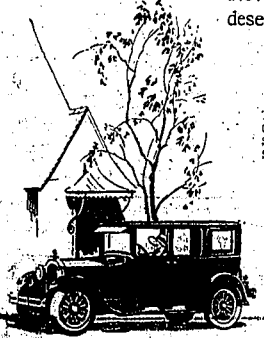

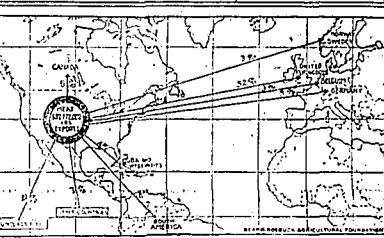

M. E. FINCH, SHERIFF. Sometimes it becomes necessary to take vengeance of the statements of those who deliberately try to deceive the public. In advertising being recently circulated in Hailey, Idaho, the interest was noted the following paragraphs, some of which statements are misleading and are direct attacks upon M. E. Finch, the present and best Sheriff Twin Falls County every day.

The excerpts are taken from Mr. Selfridge's advertising in THE TIMES of Saturday, October 23. Paragraph 2 reads: "Ten years of my life have been spent as superintendent in various railroad departments, handling charge of hundreds and in some cases thousands of men."

Men who have once reached the heights of superintendency in railway departments, do not usually quit such positions in public places from house to house for a mail order concern, to become a common collector for a season and another company, or a rambler on a 23-acre tract, as Mr. Selfridge did while living near Glens Ferry, Idaho. May he infer that he was not a law-abiding success as a railroad superintendent.

Paragraph 3 of Mr. Selfridge's advertising reads: "I have put in seven years in the detection of criminals and outlaws and know how to trap them and bring them to justice, and am not afraid to do it."

Perhaps Mr. Selfridge has put in seven years in this kind of work, but he fails to tell us when and where he did so, and in what capacity he was employed. If it is true that he positively knows how to trap outlaws and criminals and bring them to justice, he knows a lot more than our present criminologists and prosecutors of the country know, for they are continually failing in a large percentage of cases. Mr. Selfridge could have a wonderfully fine job, instead of being a common collector. If he is able to do all he says he can, again he wonders why Mr. Selfridge did not continue in such employment, he still appears to like it. Maybe others were not so deeply impressed with his skill and ability as Mr. Selfridge himself is.

Now paragraphs 4 and 5 of the Selfridge advertising state:

"I am absolutely in favor of the Constitutional Liquor Amendment, known as the Volstead Act, and the Idaho liquor laws and if I am elected Sheriff and can have the support of law-abiding citizens and the prosecuting attorney's office, Twin Falls County will be the driest county in Idaho."

"I have spent the last three years going all over Twin Falls County all times of day and night, in my present position, and know the haunts, habits and methods of forgers, thieves, moonshiners, bootleggers and other crooks, and those that protect them, and if I can't enforce the law and protect the public better than has been done for the past four years, I will resign and turn the job over to someone who can."

Talking Mr. Selfridge's statement in the first part of paragraph 5, we find upon investigation that Mr. Selfridge had been a resident of Twin Falls County only a little over a year, when he asked the voters of the county for the important office of sheriff. Mr. Selfridge lived on a 23-acre ranch in Owyhee County, just across the river from Glens Ferry, which farm he rented from R. D. Gorbly of Glens Ferry. He was while living here that Mr. Selfridge took orders for sheep for a mail order house. He left this farm and moved to Twin Falls in the spring of 1925. In the spring of 1926 he got the idea in his head that Twin Falls County owes him the office of sheriff.

We note again in paragraph 4 that Mr. Selfridge makes it conditional that he must have the support of the prosecuting attorney and law-abiding citizens to enforce the liquor law. And again he goes on to state in paragraph 5 that he "knows the haunts, habits and methods of forgers, thieves, moonshiners, bootleggers and other crooks and those that protect them," etc.

Now Section 2038 of Idaho Compiled Statutes, provides that persons having such knowledge as Mr. Selfridge says he has, may be called into court to give such information before the officers that they may be enabled to enforce the law. We would suggest that Mr. Selfridge read that section of the statute. Likely he did not know there was such a statute.

It is true that a sheriff's office depends a great deal on good law-abiding citizens for information and support in upholding the law. To do this Mr. Selfridge has attempted to place the sheep owners and other law-abiding citizens of the people that protect them. Perhaps he may have been realistic in his duty. Now, if Mr. Selfridge has not supplied the county prosecutor with this information that he says he is well informed of, he certainly cannot expect that the people have any reason to believe he will enforce the law to any greater extent than were effected in the office.

It is evident that Mr. Selfridge is grossly ignorant as to the law. It is also evident that he is unqualified in every way for the office which he seeks. He has not the necessary training and a wide successful and satisfactorily perform the office and see if you know the law try it on Mr. Selfridge, and see if you know more about his incompetence ask R.
