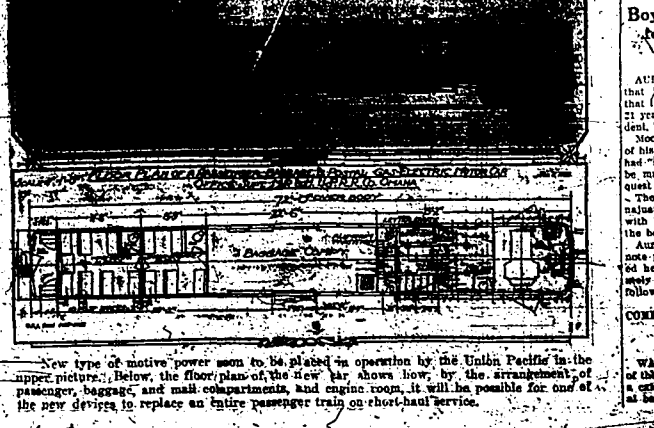

GENERAL BUSINESS CONDITIONS

By GEORGE E. ROBERTS From The Monthly Bank Letter For December Issued By The National City Bank of New York

The developments of the past month have given further evidence of slight variations in the trend of business. The level of trade and industry continues high, but the constant attainment of new high points which characterize business during the earlier months of the year is no longer the striking feature of the situation. Considerable comment has been excited by the fact that statistical records are not showing the usual upward advance, and in some instances show recent returns not quite up to the corresponding figures for last year. It may be said at once that the record of the last quarter of last year is a hard one to beat or equal, and that a moderate decline from it in some lines would have no great significance. Moreover, the flow in business is not an unvarying one. The business situation does not exactly repeat itself from year to year, but is affected by weather conditions and various influences, with the result that comparisons between the same months of different years must be made with allowance for fluctuations occurring in various branches of industry even when the sum of their activities remains unchanged. Symptoms of a declining trade have aroused apprehensions several times in the past three years which developed into any serious depression.

Stability of Distributed Prosperity Two things chiefly have contributed to the expansion of industry over the past year, and these are the maintenance of normal peacetime growth that was retarded by the war, and a great increase in industrial efficiency which has produced a wider distribution of wealth here than anywhere else and which has made it possible for the average worker greater than that of any other country. While the impetus derived from the first may be losing force, that derived from the second is ineluctable so long as all parties who have contributed to that efficiency continue to cooperate and operate reasonably well to that end. The wants of the American people will continue to be satisfied more than they were a year ago or five years ago, nor is there the slightest prospect that they will be satisfied in the future. The buyers of goods of the American people exist in the

work they do for each other from day to day, and so as limitless as their wants. The pace which they make headway in satisfying their own and each other's wants depends upon their ability to work together harmoniously, understanding all the time the cooperative character of their relations. The degree of continued prosperity is in a fair and even distribution of it. Whenever a group attempts to get more than its share the entire flow is imperiled.

Holiday trade will dominate the remainder of 1926, but the industries will enter 1927 under a strong momentum, with cautious optimism, and with absolutely no danger of a sudden breakdown. Nobody has a right to expect that business will go continually at top speed, and none but marginal speculators on the stock market type make calculations upon its doing so. On the other hand, when the general growth of business has been followed on a conservative line as has been the case since 1920 there is reason for confidence that any decline will be of a moderate and temporary character.

Business Active in Spite of Cross Currents Bank checks drawn and cashed throughout the country continue to make the best known index of the trade volume, and these have lately tended to fall below 1925 levels, after a period of practically unbroken gain in previous months. The above

been a great boon to the industry and goods are now moving freely.

Steel Mills Active The steel industry continues to make a remarkably good showing considering its sustained activity throughout the summer. October production of steel ingots totaling 4,023,000 tons was the largest on record, and while production is now dropping off gradually, consumption in most lines continues high, and no large decline is anticipated.

More Cautious About Cotton One month ago the low price of cotton was commonly taken as the sign of a depression for the coming year. Reflection, however, has very much modified the first impression. However, many equipment makers are confident of larger business from the railroads during the coming year.

Table comparing the "bank debits" for the four weeks ended November 17, 1925, and for the same weeks in 1926 and 1925, shows how the figures have been going by districts, and indicates that there has been a fairly general increase throughout the country. It is significant, however, that they have been largest in the New York district, where the decreased activity of the stock market has doubtless been a factor, and in the Atlanta district, where the figures last year were abnormally swelled by the real estate boom in Florida.

Comparing with the bank clearings, railway traffic continues to break all records for the season. During the week of October 26, 1926, the number of freight cars loaded, numbering 1,216,432, broke all records for all time, while those for the first six weeks of November, though under the record of October, were 6 per cent greater than those in the corresponding period a year ago. Featuring the figures were the heavy loadings of coal which in the week of November 20 broke all records for one week. The annual peak in the volume of merchandise and miscellaneous freight which includes manufactured products, however, reflects the activity of industry.

Active spindles in the cotton industry on October 31, aggregating 28,000,000, were 1.5 per cent greater than increase over those active September 1st, and indicated the industry to be greater at close to single shift capacity. The low price of cotton has

GAME DEPARTMENT FINDS CONDITIONS GOOD DURING YEAR

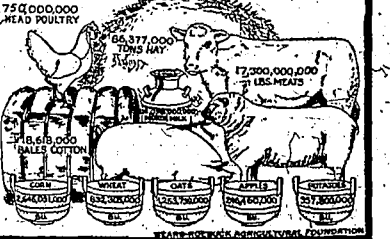
All Birds Except Buffed Wren on Increase; Hunting Hatched. Built in 1925 Will Provide Trout for Sportmen.

By R. E. THOMAS (State Game Warden.) During the year 1926 there has been a most notable improvement in conditions favorable to the conservation policy of the state. Game of all descriptions, have one aspect of game birds, has shown an increase in numbers and a more healthy condition.

Big game, consisting of moose, elk, deer of three species, mountain sheep, mountain goat, antelope and caribou, is found within the borders of the state. Idaho is the only state in the Union that permits the killing of mountain goats; it is one of three states that allows the shooting of elk; along with many other states we permit the right to kill deer—Glasgow seasons are now being moose, and building continues to be completed during the past year. At the Sandpoint hatchery a new building has been erected to be used as a nursery for sheep and goat. A cabin was erected for use in connection with swamp taking operations. Construction of a new sawing station at Ruby creek in Boundary county was completed; combining of an "in-take" dam, pipe line and flume 200 feet long—eight-bearing raceways for the man in charge of feeding. A new electric pump has been installed at the Oroya (Alena hatchery) and also at the Bannock hatchery. A new disposal has been added to the plant. Two coils of paint have been given the hatchery at Grangeville. An ice house has been erected at the hatchery. The hatchery there two additional troughs were installed. In order to save the Hay Spur hatchery from falling it has been necessary to build a concrete wall for the hatchery. Six new troughs were installed at the Cedar creek hatchery in Twin Falls county and a cabin built for the man in charge. At the Salmon hatchery a building and 10 troughs were erected and installed at Henry's lake, in Fremont county. The department completed a large number of projects and plans for the year in operation this year at Payette lake. One new saw farm was opened at Lapwai in Nez Perce county. Here also 50 new traps were set for muskrat. 2124 feet. A four-room dweller was built for the sportmen.

FARM PRODUCTION GAINS IN 1926

Important Crops Produced by Farmers in 1926



The total production of all crops in 1926, weighted according to their value, was \$750,000,000, or 10 per cent above that of the past five years and as compared with the average of the past 30 years, it was 30 per cent more. The 1926 year of heavy crop yields, says the United States Department of Agriculture in a survey of the general agricultural situation. While some crops had decreased, others showed increases, especially in crops like wheat and cotton, which have high unit values.

The total area in crops was practically the same as the average of the preceding five years. This demonstrates that in spite of the heavy crop yields, there was a tendency of the farm population to drift into the cities at a greater rate than usual. The agricultural production reported.

When all crops are reduced to a common basis of 100,000 bushels, the total production of major agricultural products as compared with 1925, was as follows: Wheat, 101,885,000 bushels in 1925, 102,000,000 in 1926, an increase of 1.2 per cent. The 1926 production of wheat, including hard, amounted to 117,000,000 bushels, which was an increase of 18 per cent over the previous year, but a decrease of 12 per cent from the 1925 crop. The 1926 production of meat, including lamb, amounted to 17,000,000 bushels, which was an increase of 1.8 per cent over the previous year, but a decrease of 12 per cent from the 1925 crop. The 1926 production of milk, including milk, amounted to 1,200,000,000 bushels, which was an increase of 8 per cent over the previous year, but a decrease of 12 per cent from the 1925 crop.

SHEEP IN 1926

With the exception of 1921 more lambs were slaughtered in 1926 under federal inspection than in any year since 1914. Lamb and wool prices have been relatively high compared with other farm products from 1922 to the present time. This stimulated an increase in production and resulted in large receipts this year and a decline of more than a dollar in average prices compared with 1925. Wool has been selling at lower prices than in 1923, which helped reduce lamb values, although wool prices worked slightly higher in the last half of 1926. Corn belt feeders loaded up to the limit with their lambs during the past fall, and the marketing of their holdings depressed prices in the last two months of the year. Western feeders greatly reduced operations, particularly in Colorado, normally a heavy feeder of lambs, because of the unprofitable results from the fat lambs they marketed last winter and spring.

In the early part of 1926 prices averaged comparatively low at a weekly average of \$12.50 was recorded in April. The early spring lamb crop met a good demand, however, and prices advanced rapidly, making a weekly high of \$17.70 in June, from which level there was a precipitate decline. From July on, the market declined rapidly, and the downward trend continued virtually to the end of the year. Market receipts were abnormally heavy and while receipts of only 139,000 head were recorded at the seven principal markets one week in May, those for the same markets rose to 175,000 head in October, when the movement of western lambs was at its height.

Due to expansion in the industry it is probable that values will work irregularly toward lower levels, although lamb prices late in the winter and next spring should prove attractive, owing to the curtailment of western feeding operations. The public seems to be developing a stronger appetite for lamb than was evident a few years ago. Idaho's sheep industry looks good for the coming year.—Exchange.

Colossal Moth Damage

Damage caused by ordinary moths exceeds more than \$200,000 each year in the United States alone, according to a recent investigation of scientists, who sought means to reduce the figures. These men discovered that the only sure means of preventing damage was to spray woolen articles with a solution of carbolic acid which moths were unable to touch. As it is the moth worm, not the fly, most that eats, this method has proved entirely effective.

Wasp's Natural Throes

Wasps are natural thieves, and they pilfer the sweet things from all manner of places, even the bees not being immune, but the wasp is a manufacturer also, chewing up bits of wood and mixing it with a glutinous sap to make a paperlike substance of which to build its nest. The queen wasp is a good January bee early days but eventually devotes herself entirely to laying eggs. If you don't need it, you can use it. Try a wasp nest.

# Eddie Martin Is Accidentally Shot But Will Recover

### Realto Steele's Shotgun as Accidentally Discharged While Hunting Yesterday and Eddie Martin Is Seriously Wounded in Right Arm and Side and Lies in the Twin Falls Hospital in a Precarious Condition; He Walked Nearly Two Miles to the Auto After Being Wounded; Physicians Say He Will Recover Unless Serious Complications Arise.

While hunting ducks yesterday, Eddie Martin, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Martin, of Twin Falls, was accidentally shot through the right arm and side while in the Twin Falls hospital in a very serious condition. The lead entered the right side and tore a great hole in the flesh and tore all the flesh from the lower side of the right arm and fractured the smaller bone slightly. The ligaments on the arm are badly torn and a second operation will perhaps be necessary in order that he may have use of the arm. He and Realto Steele were hunting together on the Salmon river just over farm from Black Rock, when Steele slipped and fell first after each of the boys had brought down a duck. The impact discharged Steele's automatic shotgun and the lead hit Martin's arm and tore a great hole in the side. Young Steele gave him first aid and Martin pulling a string from his boot and had Steele unload a tort to stop the bleeding and rushing to the grade to the top of the canyon Steele hurried on ahead and informed the other two boys, Russell Potter and Paul Grogg and the other two boys, who were hunting ducks, of the accident, as possible. In the meantime Eddie Martin walked nearly two miles up the grade and to where the car was brought. He was then rushed to Castleford and thence to Bull where Dr. A. F. McCluskey dressed the wounds and was brought to the Twin Falls hospital where it took more than two hours and a half on the operating table and three physicians to remove the shot and dress the wounds.
