... all old hands in the legislative experience. In the house almost a parallel situation exists. Speaker W. D. Gillis of Twin Falls county has the advantage of having served as speaker before at least serving in the assembly on the floor. In his kind support of the speaker, such old members as John Samsen of Gooding county, Lloyd Pomeroy of Idaho county, J. J. McIlrany, Donald Whitehead and Claude R. Davis, all of Ada county; Joseph W. Field of Blaine county; George McCann of Bonner county; B. W. Ketchum of Clark county; T. T. Taylor of Pringout county; T. T. Taylor of Kootenai county; Robert L.

Members of numerous county and others. Besides there are prominent Democrats and Progressives in the house of considerable legislative experience who will be comparatively new to the assembly to make up the balance. These include some of the members of the Oregon county delegation, Henry Carter of Valley county, and C. W. Wilson of Corvallis. The first week of the session will be the passage of an appropriation bill to take care of the current fiscal year until such a time as the regular appropriations are made for the various departments and state institutions by the legislature. This measure carried a grand total of \$699,922. Expenses of the legislature are estimated at \$43,730, but it will probably take more than that amount before the legislature has completed its work. All legislative appropriations are automatically cut off with the close of the fiscal year. There would be no appropriations until two years ago by the legislature actually expired on Dec. 31, 1924. There would be no appropriations until the state departments and institutions during the early part of the new year, until the legislature made special provisions for this. That is the purpose of the bill that was passed by the present legislature and that received the approval of the governor. It provides the funds to meet governmental expenses until such a time as the biennial appropriations are worked out and approved by the new legislature. Therefore, prior to the convening of legislatures, there has always been talk of a short session. But the session has always averaged 60 days. Nothing like this has been heard about the Nineteenth session which possibly may be able to close its work before that limitation.
