

## GRINGOS REFUSE TO SELL FOOD TO FOREIGNERS

Yangtze River Is Being Underlaid With Mines in Report Made on British for Withdrawal of Warships and Recognition of Nationalist.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 19.—Anti-foreign Chinese demonstrations at Hankow, where the Americans were directly attacked for the first time, have created a very serious situation, state department officials said today.

Systematic rioting by national spies against all foreign interests at Hankow, where they were located including the American Methodist institutional church and hospital. The consul is arranging for removal of American citizens as quickly as possible.

LONDON, Jan. 19.—The Daily News at London today reported that mines were officially reported being laid in the Yangtze river.

Chinese newspapers, the dispatch said, were charging that the Yangtze river has been underlaid with mines. The following demands of the British representative at Hankow:

1. That Great Britain officially recognize the nationalist government.
2. That the nationalist pay a proportionate share of the cost of the Yangtze river.
3. That all British warships operating in the Yangtze river be withdrawn.

If the conditions are accepted, Chen will agree to cease anti-British activities.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 19.—United States marines at San Diego and the Island of Guam were under orders today to prepare for immediate departure in the event that foreign demonstrators threatened American lives and property.

At a joint conference between Secretary of State Kellogg, Secretary of the Navy Willbur and Rear Admiral C. B. McVey it was decided to prepare for contingencies that will delay arrival of additional troops from further official reports from China.

SHANGHAI, Jan. 19.—United States action which prevented the seizure of American merchant vessels for the transport of nationalist troops from Ichang to Hankow has resulted from the government's boycott against foreigners at Ichang. Chinese merchants probably would refuse to sell food to foreigners.

American missionaries and evangelists from the province arrived at Hankow yesterday and more were expected today.

No confirmation had been received by the American consul at Hankow that American women had been stoned or otherwise maltreated during anti-foreign demonstrations at Poochow.

## MELLON MAY BE WITNESS IN FORD STOCK SUIT

DETROIT, Mich., Jan. 19.—Possibility that Andrew W. Mellon, secretary of the treasury, may be called as a witness in the \$20,000,000 Ford stock suit here was admitted by counsel today.

The admission came during argument on the refusal of government counsel to supply certain information to the tax petitioners argued was required to their case.

Following an academic argument, in which John S. Davis, counsel for petitioners, asserted "there can be no secrets as between a citizen and his government" the board of tax appeals sustained the government's refusal on condition that the petitioners first exhaust "ordinary procedure" to obtain the information desired.

There is another bill pending in the senate which would repeal Utah's former ratification of the seven states' pact and take Utah out of the colorado agreement completely.

## A GOOD CODE FOR IDAHO

If the Idaho legislature is looking for lamps with which to guide its timid feet, here is a "moral code" to consider.

It comes from a publication of Antioch college (Yellow Springs, Ohio) and is worth at least as much attention as the codes of lawyers, doctors, realtors and others.

An effort has been made, consciously, to formulate something that would find approximately universal acceptance in principles.

Here it is:

1. **Good Will.** The good of the whole must prevail over that of the individual. The best motive of conduct is a controlling desire for the good of all life for all time.
2. **Health.** The human enterprise must be carried on in human bodies. Body and mind must be kept fit by omission of all harmful conduct, however socially entrenched, and by development of habits that add to their soundness and vigor.
3. **Eugenics.** The best lives should be perpetuated.
4. **Integrity.** Only as men can trust each other are they free to achieve life purpose. Integrity in all relations is essential.
5. **Inquiry.** Only as we learn the nature of the world, through unswerving search for truth, can we learn how to live.
6. **Symmetry.** All values are relative. It is essential to strive always to see them in true relations.
7. **Aspiration.** Life purpose is potent only when pursued with desire. The nurture of aspiration is essential.

Good basic principle as that is, it has the defect of all programs and platforms. It opens the door to a lot of things not so good.

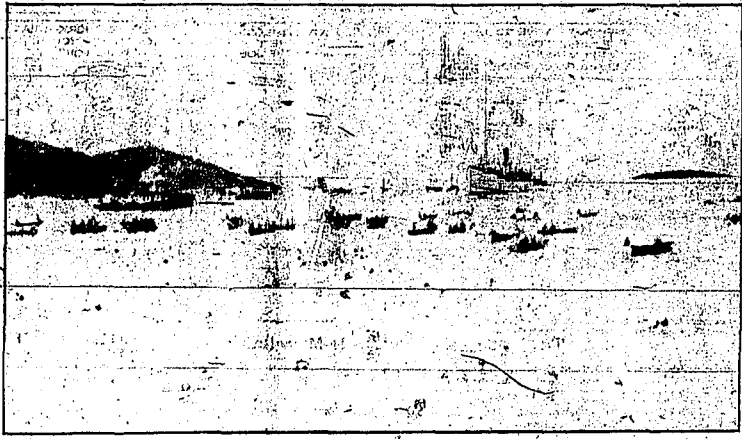
Applied as a whole, it promises well. But when was a code ever applied except by planks, by sentences, by excerpts.

For instance, the good of the whole when applied to human life implies a forsaking of personal aims and pet reforms so that there may be a larger freedom and a broader tolerance. But the reformer drops down a bit and lumps on the words "Body and mind must be kept fit by omission of all harmful conduct." On that plank he premises his personal aims and seeks his pet reforms regardless.

"The best lives should be perpetuated." The whole agenda of those who want to fill institutions with the unfit, sterilize them, throw around marriage hampering restrictions, tap heads and test minds can be hung upon that. And yet we know that some of the world's greatest men were great because handicaps of birth and temperament and physique made fighters of them, gave them strength, helped them build extraordinary personalities.

One could go on with such analysis. There is no code that is perfect. But there is none, too, that does not help point the way for us if we study it well.

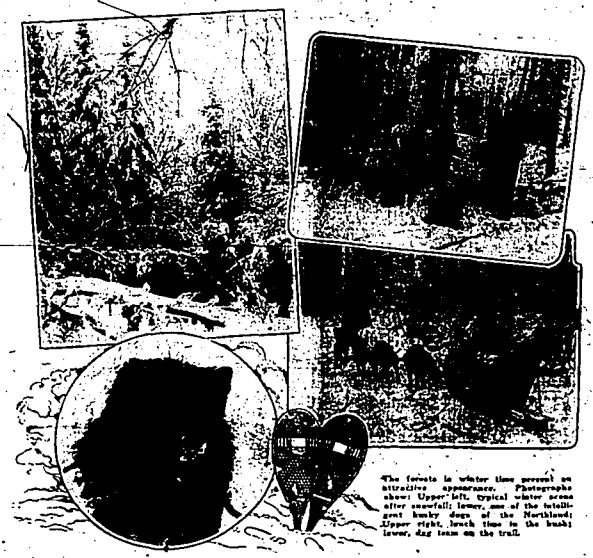
