COOLIDGE IS FIRM IN HIS ASIA DEAS

President Rejects Advice of Borah for Americans to Leave War Zone; Withdrawal Would Endanger Rights, Kellogg Says.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—The cabinet was ordered to honor today, the navy department announced. The ships are the Marlborough, Cincinnati and Richmond. At Honolulu they will await further orders. The ships carry full complements of blue-jackets. The Marlborough, now at Managua, will be relieved by the Marlborough. The Cincinnati is at the Canal Zone and the Richmond at Guantanamo Bay.

(By Ludwell Denney) WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 29.—Pressure for a more liberal policy toward China failed to move the administration today. Despite the cool reception in Peking of Secretary of State Kellogg's statement of policy, and demands of the Chinese minister here for an unconditional termination of unequal treaties, President Coolidge is unwilling to yield to the urging of the Chinese nationalists. He is, however, ready to discuss Chinese tariff autonomy and conditional admission of foreign extra-territoriality when the warring factions agree on delegates. At the same time the president's office has stiffened its policy of protection of American lives and property in Shanghai.

Oklahoma Woman Sentenced for Killing of Spouse

TULSA, Okla., Jan. 29.—Mrs. Edna Cline today was sentenced to five years' imprisonment for the murder of her husband, W. C. Cline. She was granted liberty on \$3,500 bond, pending appeal. The wife shot and killed her husband at their apartment here after a drinking party. She claimed it was at this party that her first drink was taken.

AIRMAIL POSTAL RATES WILL BE CUT TUESDAY

The air mail postal service will change its rate the first of February to 12¢ a half ounce, for any distance. The old rate was 15¢ a half ounce in Chicago and 21¢ to New York. This change of rate comes at the same time that the flying contract from San Francisco to Chicago is let to a Seattle corporation.

Ohio River on a Rampage; Rising

HARRISBURG, Ill., Jan. 29.—Flood conditions at Shawneetown, Ill., were threatening the Ohio River levee today according to reports. The gauge was 47 and the river still rising rapidly. River men expect it to reach 50 feet by 50. On the river rose to 51 feet before the levee broke, flooding land for 20 miles around Harrisburg, 22 miles distant, was affected.

COMMUNISM IS HIT BY MINE WORKER MEET

Meeting Voted to Expel All Such from Organization.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Jan. 29.—The United Mine Workers convention today struck another blow at communism by voting to expel from membership in the union all miners affiliated with communist organizations. By the most overwhelming vote yet recorded in the history of the union, an amendment to the constitution of the United Mine Workers was adopted including communists among those who cannot hold membership in the union. The constitution already prohibits members of the Industrial Workers of the World, the Working Class Union, the One Big Union and other organizations not affiliated with the A. F. of L. from joining the miners' union.

MORGANTOWN, W. Va., Jan. 29.—Ten men were injured, four seriously, in an explosion of the No. 1 mine of the Collinville By-Products company today.

SCHOOL TAX BILL PASSES IDAHO HOUSE

Legislative House Branch Votes to Allow State to Levy Tax on Property of Five Dollars for Every Child in the State.

BOISE, Idaho, Jan. 29.—After a thorough though not heated discussion in the house of the Idaho legislation, the house today passed a bill which would authorize the state to equalization to levy a state-wide school tax of 5¢ for each child of school age in the state. The vote on passage was 28 to 27. While some opposition was voiced, particularly along the line of increased taxation the proponents of the measure emphasized the need of more money to educate the children of the state.

The only other measure passed by the house was house bill No. 40, which repeals the three-men's license law. Of the measures introduced in the lower house the only one of importance is number 84, which extends the power of the department of public works in condemning school houses, sites and water supplies for sanitary or undesirable conditions. Cities of the second class will be allowed to come within the provisions of the state zoning act. If a bill which passed the senate Saturday morning by a vote of 4 to 1 is approved by the house authorized by the governor, there was little discussion on this measure outside of an explanation of it by Senator Hazan of Latah county. One measure made the appearance in the senate. Adjournment to Monday was taken by both houses in respect to Albert H. Alfred, Lewiston publisher and former member of the legislature, who died this week.

MARSHAL SUN PREPARES FOR GREAT BATTLE

Military Experts Believe That Northern Army Must Crumple When Assailed by the Canton Forces and Alarm Spreads in Shanghai.

SHANGHAI, Jan. 29.—The Cantonese armies today were pushing toward Hangchow, strategic point in their northern march upon Shanghai, and the lines of Marshal Sun Chuan Fang, defender of the great trade port, were being drawn for the decisive battle. Fearful that Marshal Sun's forces, believed to be inferior numerically and in equipment to the invaders, will crumble before the assault that will determine Shanghai's fate, foreigners were making preparations for a hasty exodus from the capital.

Fast Train Kills Two in Arkansas

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Jan. 29.—A fast Missouri Pacific passenger train killed three persons near here, but tonight when the automobile in which they were riding was demolished at a crossing.

AS MADDOO SEES IT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—The resolution of Senator Harrison, democrat, Massachusetts, placing the senate's record in favor of tax reduction at this session was side-tracked today by objection of Senator Smoot, republican, Utah, chairman of the finance committee. Harrison said he would again seek consideration, Monday.

UNETHICAL AID TO STUDENTS IS SCORED BY CONFERENCE MEET

CHICAGO, Jan. 29.—Unofficial granting of financial aid to students, because of their athletic ability, was denounced at a meeting of presidents, faculty members, directors of athletics, football coaches and alumni of western conference schools, meeting here in an effort to harmonize athletic relations. Those at the meeting ruled that granting aid in any particular case, either by scholarship, loan or remission of tuition is unethical. The recommendations made at the close of the meeting cover practically all lines of recruiting athletes and provide for punishment of any one found guilty of breaking any clause.

NAVY BILL WILL PASS LATE TODAY

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 29.—Opening the floor for the administration, Senator Curtis, republican, Iowa, urged the senate today not to vote appropriations for three new cruisers, provided in the naval appropriations bill, but to wait until the preliminary conference at Geneva looking toward another limitation of arms parity is held.

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 29.—The brother of Gus Ehlers, late president of the defunct Iowan State bank, was accused by the bank official in his death bed of "getting" him. It was testified at a coroner's inquest here today.

Shipping is Destroyed In Many Of the Ports

Terrific Gale Reaches 103 Miles An Hour and Wipes Out Lives and Property in England, Ireland and Scotland; Historic Dublin Castle Is Damaged.

LONDON, Jan. 29.—A great gale blowing 103 miles per hour which lashed the British isles yesterday continued its sweep of destruction today, paralyzing shipping and communications and exacting a heavy toll of lives and property. In Dublin alone there have been killed and more than 100 injured, a check-up showed today.

As pilots navigating the trans-Channel routes reported terrific headwinds that made forward progress impossible, and which at times drove the planes back on their course. During the height of the storm a freight train was derailed at Wootton Bridge Junction, in England. Six persons were killed and more than 100 injured, a check-up showed today.

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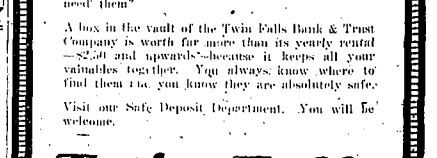

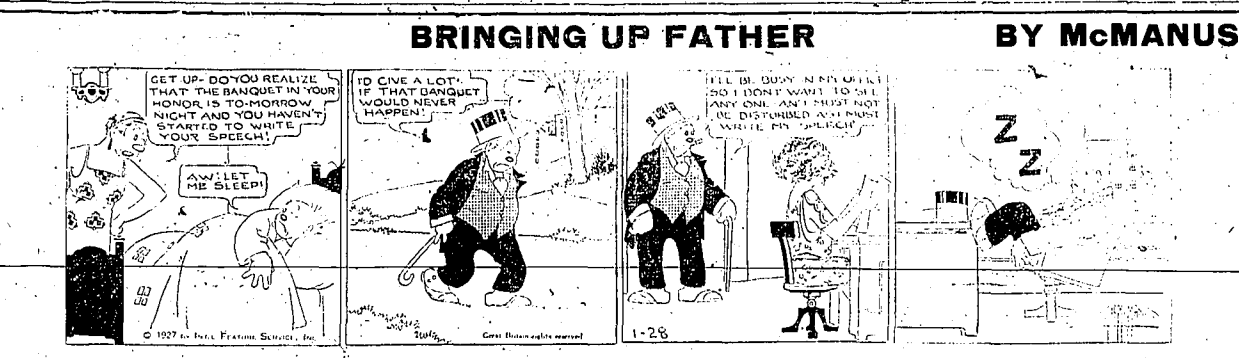
