State Commissioner of Agriculture John Walsh was present and spoke briefly on his new position and urged that Idaho present a united front in all questions of the state.

Among the principal speakers of the evening was Prof. Walter Carter of the U. S. Department of Entomology who has been here for two years studying the white fly and other plant pests and their propagation.

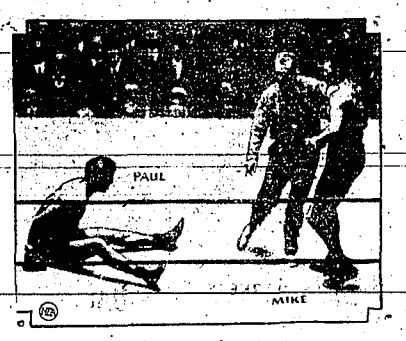
Road Builder Honored

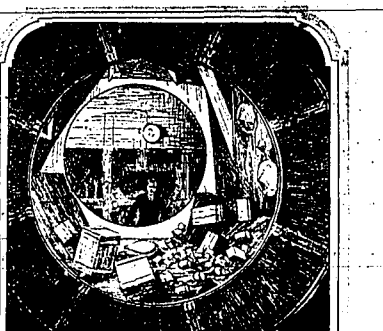

It is estimated that the \$5,000,000 railroad ties at the present untreated were given a bath in a preservative fluid, a saving of 2,500,000 board feet, would be effected annually. Spru tracks are maintained jointly by the laboratory and the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Railway, which enters Madison for practical tests of this part of the research work.

It is stated that about 47 per cent of the logs entering the saw mill is waste—represented by bark, slabs, trimmings, and sawdust. Experiments being conducted with a view to recovering this great economic loss range from the suggestion of feeding crooked sawdust to cattle to that of converting crooked trees, limbs and slabs into wood alcohol. The princess, who is now the wife of former Commander Irusman of the Imperial navy, recently was found cleaning floors by a prominent Berlin lawyer who happened to be called upon by her at her home in Munich.

"No doubt you are surprised to see me doing housework," the princess said with a smile, "but, believe me, I am a thousand times happier cleaning my own home and supporting myself than I ever was when breathing the fumes of the Potsdam court."

Princess Alexandra, who is a princess of Schleswig-Holstein by birth and a niece of the late Emperor Alexander Victoria, depends on her artistic skill for her livelihood, as her husband, who is a simple bourgeois, has no fortune but merely the title of officer's pension. Find Sand Fly Carries Deadly Kala-azar Germs

LONDON, England.—The cause of the spread of kala-azar, a highly fatal malarial, is being tracked down by a British commission organized for the study of this disease.

It is indicated by extensive experiments that a species of sand fly carries the minute organism that is the immediate cause. An Indian representative of the disease and a mosquito of the same genus as the one that transmits malaria have been eliminated in the distribution of kala-azar in previous investigations.

It is of the utmost importance, says medical authorities, that the ways of transmission of the fever be known without delay, so that steps can be taken to check it. It is a serious menace in both Assam and India, in the thickly settled sections where the population runs over 3,500 individuals to the square mile.

The real frequency of the disease, according to the commission, is rarely reported—usually because the treatment are opened in rural districts.

His Passport at Polls

Glaris, Switzerland.—The family sword which he brings with him to the polls is proof a citizen of the cantons of Glaris, Appenzel, Unterwald and Schwyz is entitled to vote.

POTATO GRADE CASE BEFORE THE COURT

State Attorneys Claim That Rules Framed by Wash State Dept. of Agriculture Violated

That the state department of agriculture was not using delegated powers in setting out grades for potatoes was the contention of Attorney General Frank L. Stephens, in urging a general demurrer to the petition of J. P. Marshall and others this morning.

The contention of the attorneys for the state was that the legislature when it provided that should congress act on certain grades, these should be adopted by the state department, deprived that department of discretion and that it could not ministerial duty of proclaiming the rules. Hence, it was contended that the objection to exercise of delegated powers was not the fact that it was simply giving effect to a legislative act. They declared, however, that even if it were exercise of delegated powers, it was made constitutional by the necessity of the case.

Claim Powers Excessive. That the powers exercised or attempted to be exercised by the department of agriculture are violative of both the national and state constitutions; first on the ground that the department is not a department of agriculture, by fixing the scales, which were claimed to be excessive, was using unconstitutional confederatory authority, was in violation of the arguments of Judge James H. Bothwell and T. K. Mackinnon who appeared for Marshall.

The attorney for Marshall and others declare that the law provides a fine for failure to obey the rules and that granting the right to the department to impose fines, which grants the right to say what shall or shall not constitute a criminal act. There are about 100 growers present. Attorneys indicate that they will ask leave to file briefs with the court.
