

INVESTIGATION OF INDUSTRIES IS PLANNED

Parliament is Opened Today by King George in Robes of State and Deep Concern is Expressed by His Majesty Over Affairs in China.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—A move is under way in the senate to start the federal trade commission into the most comprehensive investigation of industrial mergers ever undertaken in this country—an inquiry into practically every industry that supplies human wants.

The senate interstate commerce committee today will take up a resolution authorizing such an inquiry in broadest terms.

The resolution, introduced last session by Senator Arthur C. Watson, of Montana, the Montana senator who investigated the naval oil reserve leases in his committee, is being reintroduced in the senate by Senator William B. Walsh, of New York.

It is the ground for the general investigation by his broad investigation in the latter, which has been running solely for several weeks in the web of evidence to show that the consent decrees which dissolved the National Food Products corporation at Baltimore and the Bakelite corporation at the previous merger of the Continental Baking corporation, General Baking corporation and others, were entered into by William B. Walsh, now called "king of the baking industry."

One of the phases of the proposed investigation is the study of the "chain of distribution" in the following lines: Chain of distribution, electric refrigerators, typewriters, ice cream, milk and collars.

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More Than \$20,000,000 Worth of Idaho Property Escapes Just Taxation

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Great Britain's Prisons Are Administered With The Strictest Discipline

Fifteen times as many persons probably will be murdered in New York city this year than will suffer a similar fate in all of England.

During the 12 months ending in November, 1926, there were 22 murders committed in England. During the calendar years of 1925, there were 338 instances of murder and manslaughter in New York city.

Many factors enter into the creation of this contrast. Some authorities believe that British prison methods, harsh, unrelenting and sometimes cruel, prevent a small number of the habitual murderers who in one of the greatest problems of metropolitan police officers in the United States.

The habitual murderer is the burglar or robber with a gun and inhuman readiness to use it. The United Press herewith presents an authentic exposition of how the British administer their prisons in such manner that even habitual murderers are cowed and broken by rigorous discipline, brain wearing work and the blows of rubber truncheons—United Press.

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KING GEORGE IS ALARMED OVER CHINA

Speech of King is Statement of Policy Prepared by Premier and His Cabinet and is Read by the King; Britain Will Not Interfere in China.

LONDON, Feb. 8.—King George in a speech to parliament today said in his speech from the throne expressed the government's concern over developments in China.

"I sincerely desire a peaceful settlement," he said, "of the difficulties which have arisen and my government will endeavor to find a solution which should involve mutual opinion in China and throughout the world that it is the desire of the British people to remedy all such grievances and to renew our treaties on an equitable basis and to place our future relations with the Chinese people on a footing of friendship and good will."

"My government," his majesty continued, "will maintain our traditional policy of non-interference in the internal affairs of China."

The speech from the throne which each session of parliament is inaugurated by the statement of policy by the premier and his cabinet rather than the opinions of the king. The document is prepared by the cabinet and merely read by the king.

King George addressed parliament in the house of lords to which the members of the house of commons are invited at a joint session of the United States congress.

The king said he was encouraged to note signs of improvement in negotiations between the premier and his cabinet and he was pleased to see the approval of the slight change in his title made during the recent imperial conference.

Senator Couzens Stued for \$36,000,000 by U. S. Government on Ford Stock; Mystery Documents Sent to Treasury Department.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 8.—An element of mystery was injected into the government's \$36,000,000 tax suit today.

Defense lawyers were reported ready to present testimony in the mysterious letters and memorandums were sent to the treasury about the case from an unknown person.

Senator James Couzens, Republican, Michigan, and in other appellants who sold Henry Ford the minority stock in his company in 1919 contained the case would not have been included but for these mysterious documents.

"When the millionaire senator and his associates sold Ford the stock in 1919 for \$10,000,000, they paid Uncle Sam 5% profit tax of \$500,000. Six years later an additional tax assessment of about \$36,000,000 was made on the ground that they kept a share in 1919 instead of the first figure calculated.

"The mystery letters and memorandums were sent to the treasury in the few days before the statute of limitations became effective in the case. They claimed the treasury had 'missed taxing millions of dollars' on Ford stock worth only \$12,250 a share in 1919 instead of \$3200 a share as fixed by the Internal revenue bureau.

WOULD ESTABLISH AN EXPERIMENT FARM AT BURLEY

BOISE, Feb. 8.—An experiment farm to be maintained by the state for the purpose of carrying on work beneficial to the agricultural industry of Idaho will be established at Burley, Idaho, on the site of the state demonstration farm. If a measure introduced Monday in the house is finally enacted into law, the sponsor of the measure, the Honorable C. Duffee of Cassia and Falls of Minidoka.

The measure provides for an appropriation of \$15,000 for erecting buildings and meeting expenses of purchasing machinery and stocking the farm with livestock.

The measure would empower "to receive in trust from the state board of education the land formerly devoted to the Albion normal school, which has not been used, and the board of education received the deed in 1921.

The measure would provide for appointing the farm a board of control composed of the county agent and two citizens to be appointed by the governor of a term of three years.

Of the total appropriation, \$5000 would be for buildings, \$1000 for buying machinery, \$1500 for purchase of land and \$1000 for salaries for two years, and \$1000 for other expenses.

John J. Jankowski, a prominent committee suicide after firing a shot at Cornelius J. Callahan, financier and sportsman. Callahan was near death when he was shot.

Jealousy over attention he believed Callahan was paying his wife prompted Jankowski in the fatal act.

The slaying occurred today. Callahan was a member of the golfing threesome and narrowly escaped a similar fate. He denied that anything but a friendly contest was the cause.

The two men are said to have been friends and business associates for years. They came here from Toledo a month ago and were together constantly. Mrs. Jankowski joined her husband here three weeks ago.

Coolidge Will Not Be a Candidate in 1928 Says Butler

NEW YORK, Feb. 8.—Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia university, in an address before the Riverside Republican club last night, said it is not certain that Coolidge would not be a candidate for president in 1928.

"One of the president's strongest characteristics," Butler said, "is common sense, and common sense dictates this course."

"The republican party," he said, "is not going to have a hard enough time in 1928 without inviting certain defeat by injecting the third term issue into the campaign."

The next successful candidate for the presidency must take a stand against prohibition. Dr. Butler noted.

"The election amendment has no place in the constitution," he said.

MENARY BILL FAVORED.

Peck, of the Iowa Corn Belt committee, would provide \$20,000,000 for the McNary-Cole bill, declaring it would do to afford relief without equalization (see provision).

Father Threatened by Mob for Bombing Home of His Family

PUTTSBURG, Kansas, Feb. 8.—Fearing possible mob violence from an enraged population, Sheriff James Hymann last night secretly transferred Earl Mayberry to the county jail at Girard, it was learned early today.

Mayberry is suspected of planting a dynamite charge which killed his two children and seriously injured his estranged wife shortly after midnight last night for the slaying of Mayberry, 10, and Robert, 6, were instantly killed and Mrs. Lena Mayberry, their mother, was seriously injured when she was struck by a bullet which penetrated their five room home with a detonation that awakened the whole town.

Unconfirmed rumors that Mayberry had made a written confession caused feeling to run high here late yesterday and today for the slaying of the children. Sheriff Hymann refused to answer any questions.

DAUGHTERY TO TRY TO QUASH FRAUD CHARGE

Judgments Charging Daugherty and Miller, with Conspiracy Against U. S., to Defraud Will be Quashed, Says Defense Attorney.

NEW YORK, Feb. 8.—Possibility that defense counsel in the Daugherty case will attempt to quash the judgments against their clients quashed was discussed as the second trial of the case was held today in federal court.

The former attorney general of the United States, Harry M. Daugherty, and Thomas W. Miller, former attorney general of the state of Ohio, both appointed under the Harding regime, are charged with conspiracy to defraud the government of \$2,000,000 in assets in the return of \$7,000,000 in assets of the American Metals company, which were seized under the trading with the enemy act during the World war.

After adjournment yesterday, and the selection of the jury, defense counsel freely discussed the several motions to have the judgments quashed on the ground that the statute of limitations had run out.

Early in the trial, United States attorney, promised to go over the same ground so exhaustively covered five months when the case was first tried and argument, ended in mistrial of the defendants on the same indictment. It was rejected by the jury. In the same court room, respectively under the same conditions, the second trial began today.

AUTO SALES TO BE PROTECTED BY IDAHO LAW

Uniform Code for Criminal Appeals and Extradition of Prisoners Passed by Idaho Legislature Today. Amendments Should Be Printed Separately Says New Bill.

BOISE, Feb. 8.—Three house bills concerning intent to defraud in the sale of automobiles being purchased on contract were passed by the house of the Idaho legislature today.

House bill 103 would make it embezzlement to fraudulently conceal or dispose of such automobiles, number 110 makes void all contracts made in evidence of fraud and No. 111 defines contract purchasers of automobiles as bailees, for the purpose of prosecuting for embezzlement.

A number of measures were also passed by the house for the purpose of establishing a uniform code of procedure in criminal appeals and in the regulation and extradition of criminals.

The bill of importance to make its appearance in the house this morning is one to provide that constitutional amendments and other printed on separate ballots.

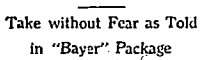

NORTHERN IDAHO TO GROW BEANS

That bean growing can be successfully conducted in certain districts of northern Idaho, eastern Washington, and eastern Oregon without seriously interfering with wheat growing, the major industry of these districts, is shown by a study made by the United States department of agriculture.

Because of weed pests and the lack of enough available nitrogen in the soil to give satisfactory yields under continuous cropping, farmers of these sections have found it unprofitable to grow a crop of grain every year. As a solution of the weed and soil problems many farmers summer fallow their land every second or third year. Under this system of farming from one-third to one-half of the land lies idle each season as clean cultivated summer fallow.

The study further indicates that beans and wheat are much more profitable for these areas than wheat and summer fallow. Furthermore, the land will produce about as good cereal crops after beans as after an ordinary summer fallow. Cultivation of the bean crop replaces the work necessary to care for the summer fallow and leaves the soil in excellent condition for planting winter wheat. Beans do not compete seriously with wheat for labor, and the two crops can be grown with practically the same equipment.

Detailed facts brought out in the study are contained in Farmers' bulletin No. 1509-J, "Bean Growing in Northern Idaho, Eastern Washington and Eastern Oregon." A copy of the new publication may be obtained free, as long as the supply lasts, upon application to the department of agriculture, Washington, D. C.

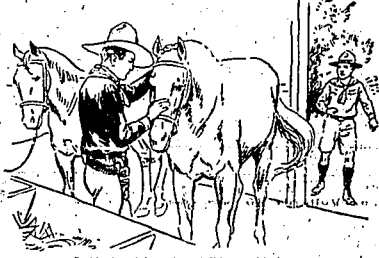

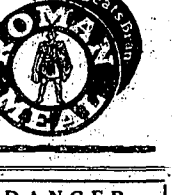
