American Five-Expert Dog Driver Is Planning to Take Grand Event in Ash-ton Derby on February 22, Many Entries.

ASHTON, Idaho, Feb. 12.—I am going to win the American dog derby this year. I positively can't state Miss Don Anderson today, on her arrival from American Falls, where she has been training her team for the world event, Feb. 22, February 22.

"I have a good team and the dogs are all well trained. I have been planning on entering this race for several years, and this year I have hope that the championship will be mine," continued Miss Anderson when asked today if she considered she had a chance against the men drivers.

The team leader is named "Donner" and she has promised him a "bonus" if he wins this big race for her.

This team is entered by the American Falls Club and that organization can well feel proud of the entry for the team is one of the best ever shown at Ashton. Miss Anderson kindly gave the editor an exhibition of her driving, and no driver has anything on her this year in a quick getaway or control of them.

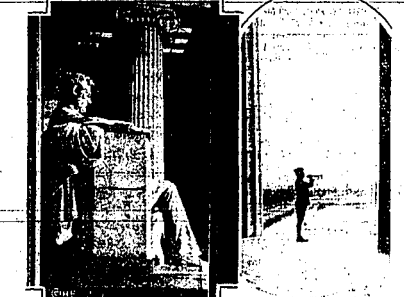
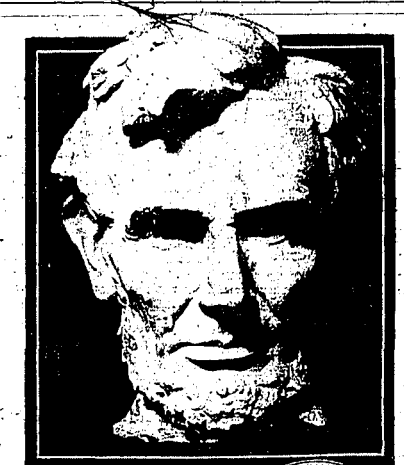

SECOND BUDGET BILL PRESENTED

Third Budget Bill Carries Additional Appropriation of \$265,500 for Five State Institutions.

BOISE, Feb. 12.—The third budget bill to be introduced in the lower house came in this week from the hands of the appropriations committee and carries with it appropriations totaling \$265,500 for the Children's Home Finding and Aid society, the northern Idaho sanitarium at Orofino, the Idaho state insane asylum, Blackfoot, the Idaho state sanitarium at Nampa and the state penitentiary.

In addition to the appropriations measure, 29 other bills were introduced, 19 of them being substituting measures for highway districts in the state, and two house joint resolutions, while five measures were passed.

The division of appropriations in House bill No. 274 is as follows: Children's home, salaries and wages, \$16,000.

Institute asylum at Blackfoot, salaries and wages, \$68,100; other expenses, \$109,650; total, \$177,750.

Sanitarium at Orofino, salaries and wages, \$92,200; other expenses, \$55,500; total, \$147,700.

State penitentiary, salaries and wages, \$58,440; other expenses, \$145,500; total, \$203,940.

The appropriations, added to those contained in the emergency bill No. 1 for the legislative session, bring the grand total to \$727,275 for charitable and penal institutions. This is an excess of \$135,236.71 over the last two years appropriations, but was necessary because of the needs of the institutions. The committee followed very carefully the recommendations of the Governor to provide means of accomplishing the several state institutions.

Annul License Money Returned. House bill No. 273, the appropriations committee made provisions of returning to various counties money due from the state on a refund from the 1925 automobile license tax. The license fee was lowered that year and those who paid the old license rate received a refund from their counties. The committee made the following provisions: The state, and this bill would make the refund available. The total due is \$268,312. Ann county having the largest amount, \$49,222. Clark county has the smallest, only 8 cents being due from the state.

House bill No. 271 by the committee on agriculture adds certain plants and powdered milk manufacturing companies to the list of concerns to be licensed under section 8, chapter 22 of the 1925 session laws creating a director of dairying. The license fee would be \$10.

House bill No. 270 by the committee on public health provides that the provisions of chapter 91 of the 1925 session laws be extended for one year for examination of employees in butcher shops, bakeries, and candy manufacturing concerns. Under this statute certificates of health are issued to employees.

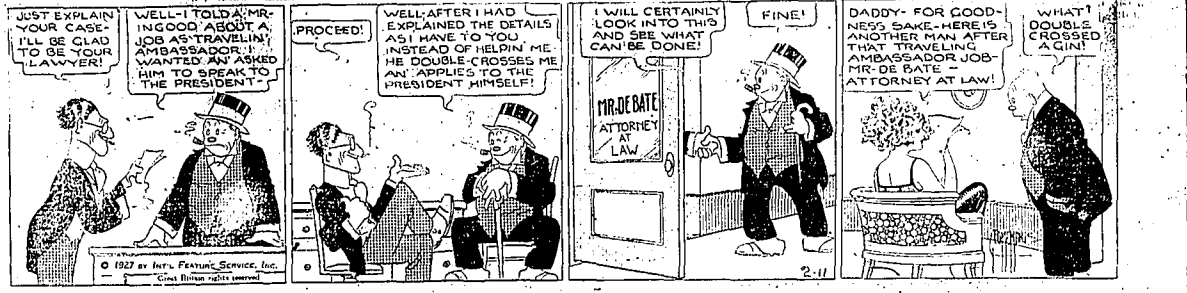

GAS TAX BILL IS DOOMED AS PIKE'S BELIEF

Twin Falls County Senator Declares That Administration Will Defeat Any Effort to Pass Measure; Twin Falls' Delegation in Earnest for Plan but Will Fail to Enact It.

Senator W. F. Pike in a letter received by the Times predicts the defeat of the plan advocated by all the Twin Falls county highway districts by the Chamber of Commerce to retain the gasoline tax in effect on county wherein it is collected. He lays the responsibility at the door of the administration, which in spite of the efforts of the Twin Falls and other favorable delegations, will, Senator Pike predicts, defeat the bill. Senator Pike says:

Least anybody should get the idea down in Twin Falls county that there is a chance of some relief being given to the taxpayers in the matter of the oil tax. I am hastening to write you that you can dispense the mind of anybody who is of the slightest intention on the part of the administration, whether right or wrong, to give up any part of the gasoline tax from the general road fund, in the matter of the oil tax is raised. Neither is there any chance of a special levy for the purpose. That does not mean it is not worth our while to make a try for the change, but, nevertheless, the fact remains that the responsibility should be placed where it belongs. I am of the impression that there is a general feeling in our county that to get a change made in that law would be easy, and that any failure to get such a change will be due to inactivity on the part of the representatives. Such is not the case.

SOME GRAIN IS NEEDED BY COW

Though rich in food elements, alfalfa hay must be supplemented with a grain mixture if the dairy legs are to keep in good condition and at the same time produce a large amount of milk. This is the conclusion drawn by the dairy department of the New Jersey State College of Agriculture, New Brunswick, from experiments and farm experience in New Jersey and elsewhere. The dairyman of this state claimed repeatedly that he could secure just as high a production from a ration of good alfalfa hay and ten class corn silage as from one containing also a liberal amount of grain concentrates. Investigation showed, however, that he was giving the cows large amounts of very choice alfalfa hay, and was not forcing them to eat it, except by allowing them to pick out only the leaves and tender parts. The leftover stems were fed to horses. This dairyman failed to appreciate that the cows were not eating alfalfa hay, but chiefly alfalfa leaves, which contain nearly as much crude protein as gluten feed, and not much more fiber than oats.

All the concentrates in a ration were replaced by alfalfa hay in a trial at the New Jersey experiment station. A ration consisting of 27.5 pounds of alfalfa hay and 35 pounds of corn stover, which contained nearly as much crude protein as gluten feed, and not much more fiber than oats. In a six-year test at the Illinois experiment station it was found that cows fed some grain in addition to silage and alfalfa hay stayed in better condition than those fed silage and alfalfa hay alone.
