## BASEBALL DIRECTORS LAY PLANS

### Twin Falls Baseball Club Will Send President Colwell to Sacramento to Negotiate for Players and Terms with Coast League Clubs.

The directors of the Twin Falls baseball club met last evening and laid plans for the coming season and for the annual stockholders meeting of the club which will be held on Tuesday, March 15. It was decided that President A. H. Colwell of the club would make a trip to Sacramento and see whether some fostering agreement could be reached between that club and the Twin Falls club for the coming season. Some of the other clubs in the Utah-Idaho league have made such an agreement with coast teams and will be expected to do for any of the Utah-Idaho clubs to have such backing.

Under the plan a minimum investment in the Coast League club would form out three or more stockholders to the club they were fostering in the Utah-Idaho league and this would greatly strengthen the local ball team. These players might be sold during the season or at the close for a few thousand dollars which would go to the treasury of the local club. This same plan has been used by the Twin Falls club.

That the Twin Falls Bruins will have a baseball team in the class "C" league this season was indicated last evening if the citizens of Southern Idaho will lend their support during the summer. Plans have already been made also to have six games played in each city and thus the cost of transportation would be greatly reduced. Other expenses will be held down to the minimum and it is believed that the coming season can be made to more than pay the way of the cost of the league for the summer.

Those present last evening besides Mr. Colwell were Pearl C. Meredith of Buhl, George Sandstrom, C. A. Bailey and R. E. McManama also of Buhl. Burley was not represented.

SCHOOL JEALOUSIES AND BICKERINGS

It seems too bad that our splendid community which so outshines most of the other parts of the world in productivity and high ideals stoops to such narrow bickerings and small town jealousies as have appeared over the school fight which has held the footlights in our city for the past few weeks.

The Times is not so greatly concerned over whether Superintendent Bloom is re-elected or rejected but we are aroused over the morale of this community. We have always felt that Twin Falls was a community that stood out in the commonwealths of Idaho and when small town bickerings came up refused to have a part in them, but from what we have heard and witnessed recently we are compelled to admit that a few of the Magic City folks have doubled at least in the mire and their skirts will never appear so beautifully white and clean as they once did.

We have a right to have our opinions and convictions on the election of a school superintendent and we would not discourage this in the least, but let's not stoop to ungentlemanly bickerings and backbitings. The most damnable part of this whole situation came when two members of the school board were threatened with boycott if they voted in a particular way.

We would be the last one to say who is to blame for this condition but we feel sure that there has been a little mud slinging on both sides and this pastime should be left to the politicians and good clean folks who are concerned over our civic problems should not become stained with this mud.

THE FALL RIVER RESERVOIR PROJECT

Idaho's house of representatives has answered the eastern wild life and other fanatics who have no conception of the great value of water, by passing a memorial to congress to exclude the Fall River basin from the Yellowstone National park so it can be used as a reservoir.

This basin has become a national home of contention because those who live far removed from the Yellowstone National park and the great open places of the mighty west, who cluster in the cramped quarters along the Atlantic seaboard, have, for some unknown reason, made it their business to fight water storage for Idaho.

It is proposed to underwrite some of the productive lands in the upper Snake river valley by creating a surplus water supply of water in a reservoir site that happens to be within the boundaries of the Yellowstone park, but which is not a sightseeing spot for tourists.

This is the Fall River basin, a large meadow section, grown largely to salt grass, more or less soggy and some swamp. The construction of a dam would impound in this basin water that can be put to beneficial use on Idaho lands. The park will not be injured. Much good will be done by conserving water now going to waste.

When so-called park and wild life advocates hear of this they immediately set up a cry an attempt was being made to despoil recreational ground set aside by the government for all the people. Magazines took it up. A regular bombardment of abuse has been hurled at Idaho.

But the house of representatives of the Idaho legislature, speaking for the people of this state, have stood pat behind the farmers who should have this surplus water. It has asked congress to make this storage capacity possible. That is what Idaho feels is no more than fair and just. And this state is far more interested in preserving the Yellowstone National park than many of its eastern critics. It is part of Idaho.—Capital News.

An average speed of 53.8 miles an hour for 24 continuous hours was recorded by one of the new type Essex Super-Sixes on the Culver City, Cal., track, according to official word received here by James Auto Sales, Hudson-Exeex distributor.

This test, according to Mr. Jensen was completed by Walter M. Murphy, the Los Angeles distributor, and was officially observed and scored by Leo Angeles newspaperman and by the Western Union. After the Essex had dashed off its 124,000 miles on the track, it completed a trip up Mt. Wilson and return, and was placed for display in the distributor's Los Angeles showroom.

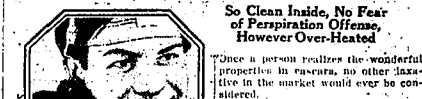

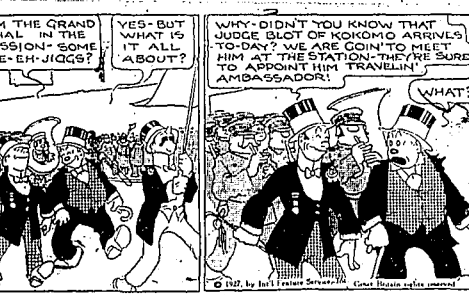

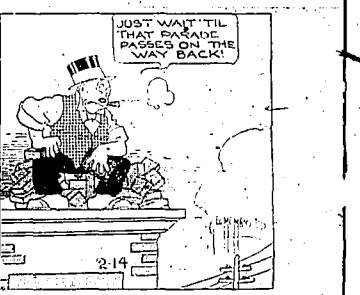
