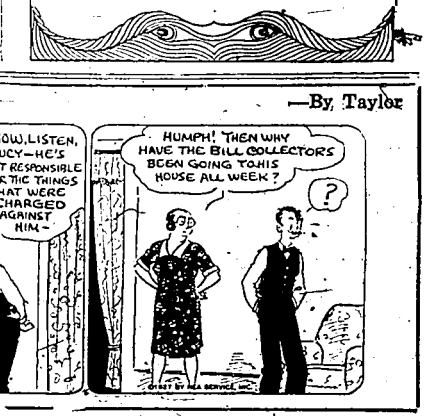

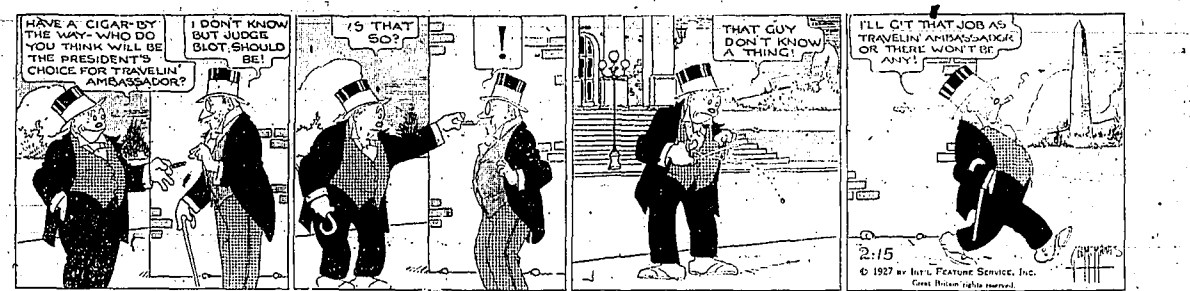

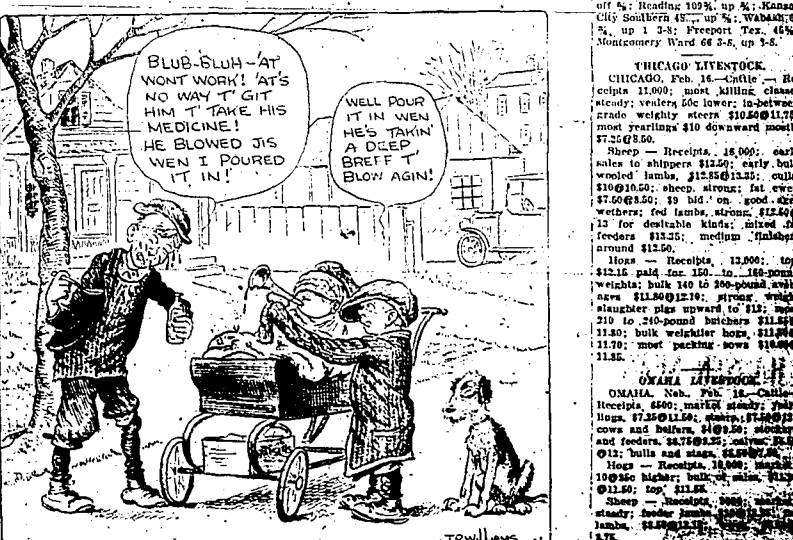

GIPSON GIVES SPUD RULES TO IDAHO SHIPPERS

Full Explanation of All Rules Are Set Forth; Grading Inspection Is Not Compulsory Under the Regulations, He States.

There is no compulsory inspection but there is compulsory grading in potatoes under the new ruling. It was adopted today by E. V. Gipson, deputy state inspector and federal food products inspector, who said:

The following information is submitted by the Idaho department of agriculture in explanation of the new regulations regarding grading and marking of containers for potatoes which become effective February 8, 1927:

Brands and Marks.
U. S. Grade No. 1: New or clean sacks to be used as receptacles in which potatoes graded United States No. 1 (U. S. No. 1) are packed. It is in interstate trade, must have stamped thereon in letters at least two inches in height, the following words: "U. S. No. 1 Selected Potatoes."

U. S. Grade No. 2: New or clean sacks to be used for receptacles in which potatoes of grade United States No. 2 (U. S. No. 2) are packed for sale, offered for sale or sold must have stamped thereon in letters at least two inches in height the following words: "U. S. No. 2."

Cull Potatoes.
All cull potatoes packed for sale, offered for sale or sold in this state of Idaho, shall be placed in new or clean, plain unbranded sacks and marked on the sack "Cull Potatoes" in letters at least two inches in height.

Private Brands.
Any other words, designs, or phrases, in addition to those compulsory wording may be added, stamped or printed upon the container as a private brand. Copies or samples containing such private brands must be sent to the department of agriculture at Boise, Idaho, for approval and registration. Any private brands are those which are so approved and registered.

The words "Idaho" or "Selected" may not be used as a part of the brand of U. S. No. 2 potatoes. The word "Idaho" may be used as a part of an address to designate the location of the packer or shipper.

Containers marked with the official brands must not be used as containers for the shipment of potatoes grown in any other state, such use would be mis-branding and a violation of the federal pure food and drug act.

Potatoes grown in Idaho must not be shipped in containers carrying brands of dealers from other states. Net Weight.

The net weight when packed must be indicated. The words "Net Weight" when packed (weight) must be stamped upon the container. This applies to all grades.

Even Weighted.
All containers in any lot or shipment must be of the same weight when filled.

Exceptions in Even and Net Weight: For early potatoes or potatoes dug between June 1 and November 1, and packed for sale, offered for sale or sold before November 1, the net weight and even weight requirements will not be compulsory.

Mingling. Containers must be mingled or faced with potatoes of superior size or quality than the remainder of the sack. To avoid deception, the potatoes in the face of the container must be representative of the contents of the package.

Sizing. All sacks must be sewn so that the edges of the sack are not more than two inches apart.

Sacks. All sacks in which potatoes are packed for sale, offered for sale, or sold must be of cloth or fibre and which are No. 1, reclaimed, unbleached, bright, undamaged, rice paddles, or which are reclaimed, unbleached, bright, undamaged No. 1 twills.

MILNER FUNERAL WILL LIKELY BE HELD SATURDAY

The funeral of E. A. Milner, brother of the late Stanley W. Milner, and of Harry O. Milner, will probably be held Saturday afternoon. It was stated this afternoon by the latter. Definite time will not be set until word is received from the children in California.

Private Brands.
Any other words, designs, or phrases, in addition to those compulsory wording may be added, stamped or printed upon the container as a private brand. Copies or samples containing such private brands must be sent to the department of agriculture at Boise, Idaho, for approval and registration. HOME PAPER ADVERTISING IS APPROVED

Speaker at Dairy School Believes in Beginning with Local Papers and Then Extending Field as Reputation Grows; Suggests Grade Cows for Average Man.

As beginning to substitute in his papers it is advisable to use first in the market where you expect to make the best sales; mainly, in the home papers; E. W. Atkinson told the dairy school this morning in the course of his discussion of record-keeping and sales.

"Then," he added, "when business warrants, extend this to your state agricultural papers and when your business is large enough, and reputation established, to national stock papers." Show ring selling was also advised.

Mr. Atkinson said that for the average man it would be best to start with grade stock rather than pure-bred and later a training and extension would warrant extent into the purebred field.

Keep Milk Pure.
In his talk this morning D. L. Ford emphasized the value of, clean milk. He urged that the milk be kept clean in preference to having it cleaned after foreign matter got into it.
