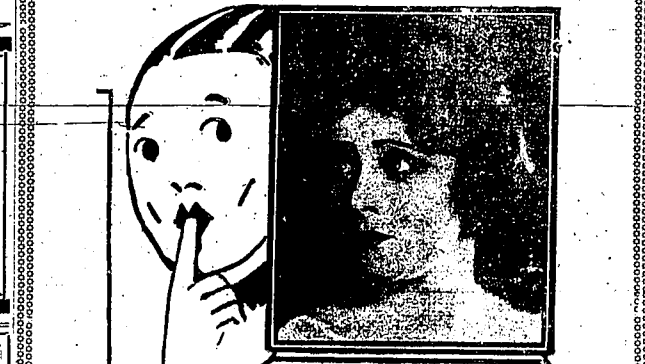

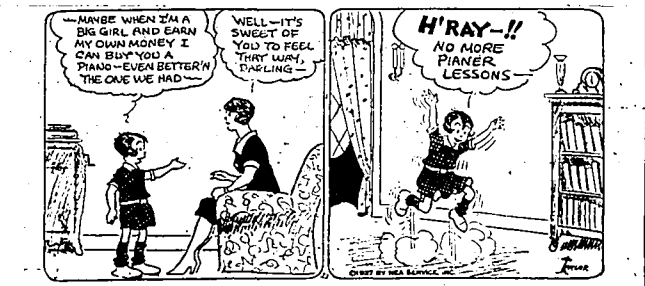

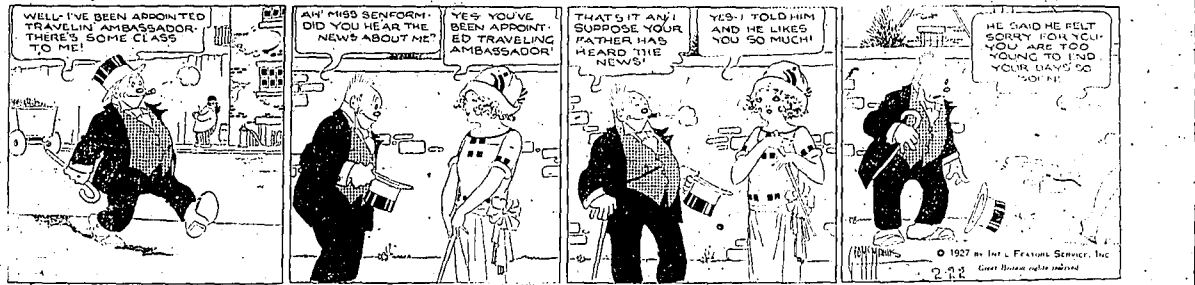

County Board Takes Steps for Public Health Against Noxious Growth in List for Action.

The weeds named are Canada thistle, purple spurge, horse-weed, Russian or black knotweed and hard core. It is contended that these weeds shall be eradicated by cutting or pulling, or by cutting, cutting or cultivation and not by plowing. Such weeds must be cut before June 1 and continue until October 1. There will be taken in to burn in February.

The rejected resolutions which did not appear on the minutes read: "That all wages and other county property be purchased and maintained exclusively for the use and benefit of the county and same must not be used by those county officials, deputies and other employees who have same in their possession and charge for their personal or individual use or be permitted to be used by any other person for personal or individual use. "That the actual and necessary expenses of county officials, deputies and other employees incurred in the performance of their official duties will be allowed as provided by law and that the words 'actual and necessary' include meals and lodging only when sold official, deputy or other employee is absent from his place of residence and in the performance of his official duty."
