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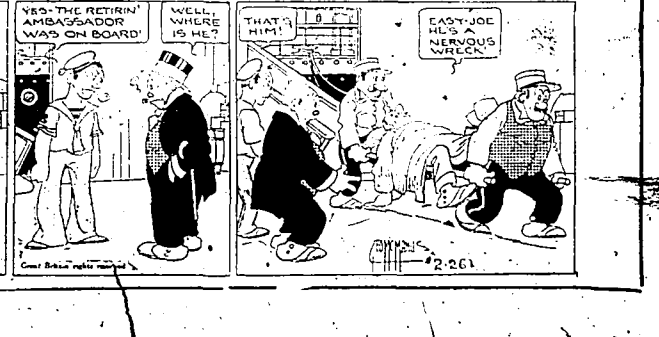

IDAHO LEGISLATURE IS PENNY WISE AND POUND FOOLISH ON ADVERTISING

The \$50,000 Idaho advertising fund, to be expended through some such agency as the Idaho state chamber of commerce, was regarded as being too small.

But the legislative mind shrunk from it in time, and now has reduced the item to \$30,000 through house amendment.

If that stands, the bill might better be defeated in the opinion of some who have had wide experience in advertising.

Usually in cases where something material is taken from little, the effectiveness of the altered original will not be consequential.

Above all the legislature should consider the effect of its action upon future enterprises. It is always difficult to raise money for public advertising.

COOLIDGE MAY BACK BORAH FOR PRESIDENT

That Borah will receive the support of President Coolidge and the regular republican leaders should the president decide not to run for a third term, is the opinion of Paul R. Mallon.

Those who believe Senator William E. Borah, republican, Idaho, may receive the support of President Coolidge for the republican presidential nomination in 1928, should Mr. Coolidge decide not to run himself, may find basis for their arguments in the record votes of Borah during the first half of the short session of congress now terminating.

A United Press compilation of Borah's stand in all record votes, shows that he has sided with the regular republican leaders and with the president in most all important matters, during that time.

As chairman of the senate foreign relations committee Borah has repeatedly indicated his opposition to the state department policies in Nicaragua and China, but he has never chose to fight with either Mr. Coolidge or Secretary of State Kellogg over the matter.

Here is Borah's record for the first half of the session: Against construction of new naval cruisers proposed by Mr. Coolidge.

Against Reed resolution barring Senator-designate Smith of Illinois, from the oath of office.

Against Bruce motion to consider French spoils. Against adoption of the Lenroot milk bill.

Upon the following proposal he voted in the affirmative: Dropping the impeachment case against Federal Judge English, of eastern Illinois, following the judge's retirement.

Amendments to correct unwise defects in present immigration law.

Motion to consider Capper truth-in-fabric bill, Robinson resolution for Mexican arbitration.

McNary motion to consider farm relief legislation. Borah was listed as not voting on the rivers and harbors bill and the Norris resolution providing that the treasury surplus should be used for debt retirement instead of tax reduction.

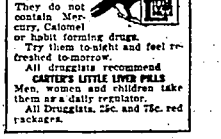

FILER, Feb. 28.—Determination of the newly appointed Twin Falls county fair board to decline the appointment in the future has been arrived at. It was learned here today, it is stated that the board had decided to set forth reasons in detail, and that they expected to declare that one of the board of commissioners, while desiring to secure complimentary admissions for his friends, was opposed to the retiring secretary, and that as the commissioners had decided to do all the hiring, presumably including that of fair board secretary, there might be undue interference which would prevent the operation of a successful fair.

It is stated that they expected to state that a certain deputy had been interfering outside his duties in other matters and might extend this interference into the fair board operation. It is expected that this determination will be communicated to the board of county commissioners at its next meeting.

Stenographer, prosecuting attorney's office, \$100.

The schedule was adopted by vote of T. E. Moore and L. H. Ciffen, Republicans, James L. Barnes, Democrat, voting no.

On motion of Mr. Barnes, the county's contribution to the monthly salary of the stenographer employed jointly by the commissioners and the bridge, took place at 6:30 Saturday evening when it was increased from \$15 to \$25.

The board held the names of deputy assessors at \$7 a month for the county and \$5 for the city, subject to allowance. The collector's expense was allowed \$2 a day.
