STRENGTHEN ANTI-TRUST LAW

An agreement to fix the price of commodities constitutes a violation of the Sherman Anti-Trust Act, whether or not the prices designated are reasonable, the supreme court of the United States held on February 21 in a decision in the government's prosecution of the Trenton and 22 other pottery manufacturing companies.

The decision, in which the opinion was rendered by Mr. Justice Stone, was a reversal of the findings of the United States circuit court of appeals, second circuit, which had held the United States district court in error in the conduct of the trial in which the pottery companies were found guilty of violation of the anti-trust law. Justice Brandeis took no part in the case. The vote of the court was 5 to 3.

It is impossible for the insistence on law enforcement, in the case of the Volstead act to exhaust itself with that measure. The cry "support the law because it is law" is far-reaching. While the trusts are the children of privilege, and cannot be exterminated without the removal of the special advantages on which they are based, yet enforcement of laws against them should accompany repeal of special legislation and hasten their doom. And until the special legislation can be repealed every energy should be bent to enforce the law. This applies not only in the nation but in the state. We have an excellent anti-trust law in Idaho which nobody seeks to enforce. We have a fairly good public utility law, when we have the right sort of commissioners. Enforcement of both would cure many evils. The present legislature, dictated to by Baldrige, who is in turn dominated by the monopolies will repeal no special privilege nor will the administration or its commissions ferret out trust law breakers.

# SPORTSMEN URGE MORE COOPERATION

Southern Idaho Fish and Game Association Holds Large Annual Banquet Here From Silver Section of Southern Idaho, Attend; Parry Is Speaker and Barton Master of Ceremonies.

Idaho can be made the greatest hunting and fishing district in the United States if proper methods are used in propagating fish and game, said R. P. Parry at the banquet of the Southern Idaho Fish and Game Association last night at the Rosecroft Hotel. Rev. E. C. Barton was toastmaster and in introducing the speakers and the subject for the evening he said, "This is the biggest group of them I have ever sat down with."

Statements are known far and wide for their wonderful stories. The effects of this organization will be felt far and wide if we join with them and cooperate to make this association a success. It seems to me that we should go out after men and enroll them as members of this association. I have hope to do things for this section of Idaho, said the toastmaster.

Secretary J. A. Chapin spoke briefly and said the association, consisting of members from all walks of life and about 200 members were now signed up but we should have 500. We have been able through this association to get close to the farmer and this new ruling about hunting on the farmer's place is not objectionable in my opinion, said the secretary. We have acquired lands on Rock creek and have erected rearing ponds and with the aid of the state have planted more than 150,000 fry. The Christian Ferry association has planted over 200,000 and both organizations hope to plant twice this number this year. The Snake river is looked upon as one of the best places for the propagation of fish since the American Falls dam is getting well under way. To the north of us is one of the greatest fly fishing grounds of the West but we fail to advertise our fish and game because this is the easiest and best way to give real publicity to Idaho. If they came here to fish and hunt they would later settle here.

Why Are We Sportsmen? In addressing the sportsmen, Parry further said, "The other day I was sitting on the observation car as I rode looked out over Idaho and said, 'Why does anybody live in this forsaken place? But I presume that is because we love to fish and hunt and love the great outdoors that we are here. The history of our country is largely the story of fishermen and hunters. This is especially true of revolutionary days and it is especially true of this great Northwest. Jim Bridger was one of the earliest of the sportsmen explorers to come in to the Northwest. If you read the story of his early explorations and those of Captain Bonneville you will see a description of this state, Washington and Oregon are now a part of the United States, rather than belonging to the Indians, because of the agitation of early hunters in this section starting the cry, 54-40 or fight."

Dr. A. H. Giffen advocated fostering of the sportsmen's creed in the rearing of youth of today and pointed out the benefits to be derived morally and physically from a program of diversion carried out in the outdoors.

Dr. K. Dillingham of Piler praised the work of the association and predicted closer cooperation during the coming year on the part of the sportsmen. This message was also the theme of a short address given by W. A. Gill of Kimberly.

Dr. E. B. Booth of Burley, secretary of the Idaho County Fish and Game Association, outlined the work of his organization during the last year. He said that solutions for some of the problems with which his organization has been confronted. He said that solutions have been brought to light and a number of solutions were presented. # LIVE STOCK FEED FOR PROFIT IN FEEDING HOGS

Hogs may be fed so that only a small profit may be made or they may be given such a balanced ration that they will return a maximum profit. There is no magic in producing the highest value per pig and a resulting high profit. It all depends on how the animals are fed.

For example, says W. W. Shay, aviculture specialist at the North Carolina State college, "we may take two men, each of whom owns ten 50-pound pigs. They feed these pigs through a period of 70 days. The first man is of an economical trend of mind, so he feeds his pigs a half ration which amounts to 1,200 pounds, costing at \$2 per hundred, \$24. His pigs gain 100 pounds on each 275 pounds of feed given them. This feed costs \$2.50 and the pigs gain a total of 475 pounds, worth, at 14 cents per pound, \$66.25. Deducing the cost of the feed, the grower has left \$42.25 or a profit per pig of \$4.22."

"Now, the second man is out for the greatest profit that he can get out of his pigs. He full feeds his ten pigs which cost him \$24.22. The 70-day period they eat 2,500 pounds of feed costing \$50. During that time and with that feed they gain 800 pounds, worth, at 14 cents per pound, \$112. The second farmer thus makes a total profit of \$90 above cost of feed, or a profit of \$9 per pig."

Mr. Shay states that this greater profit would be received even though the feed consumption per hundred pounds gain in the case of the second farmer's pigs was 525 pounds, or 50 pounds more than the first owner's pigs, and the cost of 100 pounds gain was \$0.54, which is one dollar more than the first farmer's cost. More feed might have been withheld by the first grower and the profit eliminated entirely, but there would be nothing new in that, as Mr. Shay has found many farmers practicing such a system for several years. Even today, after the value of the feeding demonstration has been amply proved, there are still men who seem to feel that it is better for a hog to pay a profit of \$4 in a given length of time than to pay a profit of \$8 in the same time. It all depends on the feed.

## Badger Stockmen Favor Shipping Associations

Nearly half of Wisconsin's live stockmen favor the co-operative system of marketing. Approximately 45 per cent of all the stock shipped in the state is handled by co-operative shipping associations, according to Marvin A. Schars of the economics staff at the Wisconsin College of Agriculture. Stockmen are partial to this method of shipping for several reasons.

First, he pointed out, it brings a greater net return to the farmers. In 1925, stockmen received nearly 20 per cent more for stock sold through their association than from the local buyers. At the same time, the co-operative system undoubtedly raised the prices paid by local buyers.

Other advantages of the co-operative associations that Schars enumerated included the fact that farmers are paid according to the quality of their stock. Shrinkage is kept at a minimum and assembling costs have been reduced. Farmers have been kept in contact with the market and have as a result attempted to feed the type of stock that brings the best price at the marketing place.

The average marketing cost, according to Schars, is 45 cents a hundredweight for cattle, 55 cents for hogs, and 75 cents for calves and sheep.

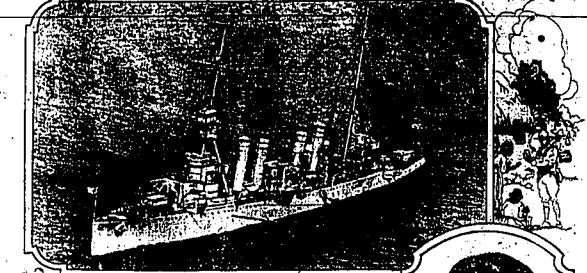

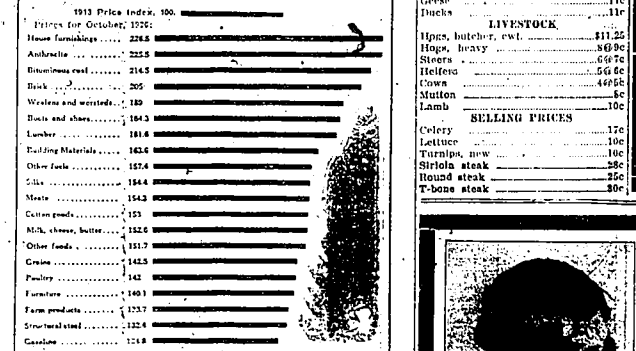
