FOUR SHIPS DISABLED OFF EAST COAST

Lightship, Two Barges and Passenger Vessel Are Adrift on the Atlantic Seaboard; March Gale Whips East.

WASHINGTON, March 3.—A lightship and two barges with a total of 25 to 28 men aboard were adrift and a passenger steamer was disabled off the Atlantic coast early today while a March gale whipped the coast line from the Carolina to the coast guard headquarters here reported.

The lightship Weatherguard, with 15 to 18 men aboard, was reported adrift between Cape Charles, Virginia, and Atlantic City, N. J.

CHUNG-CHANG STARTS DRIVE

Leader Tired of Waiting Attack; Plans Recapture of Section Relinquished by Forces of Marshal Sun.

IDAHO TAX LEVY IS RAISED

General Tax Levy Has Been Raised from 35 to 48 Cents Per One Hundred Dollars for Next Two Years; Excuses Offered.

BOISE, March 3.—The general fund tax of Idaho will be 48 cents on the taxable value for the coming biennium, as compared with 45 cents for the last two years. It was announced yesterday by Senator Roy S. Shilline, chairman of the senate finance committee. This levy is contained in a bill now before the house, usually the last measure to be considered in a legislative session.

The attention of the public is attracted by the fact that this 13 cents increase is just what was estimated as necessary in the budget prepared under the Moore administration. The general fund appropriations for 1927-1928 total \$2,066,551.56, compared with appropriations of \$1,875,515.12 for the preceding biennium. Bond issues for next biennium total \$320,000 compared with \$275,000 in the 1925-1926 biennium. This makes a total of \$6,319,551.56 authorized by this legislature, compared with \$5,452,045.12 in 1925, an increase of \$867,506.44. The budget bureau estimated that the increase would have to be approximately \$1,600,000.

It is estimated various institutions will have an income \$250,000 greater than that of two years ago, making the net increase in money to be raised by taxation of \$1,600,000.

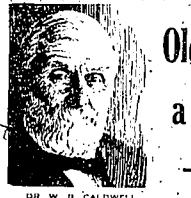

WHO WILL BE AMONG THE 25,000?

It is estimated that 23,000 people in the United States were killed during 1926 in automobile accidents. If the rate of increase continues through 1927, the death toll will number 25,000, nearly half the American losses in the world war from wounds and sickness.

Of the 23,000 killed in motor crashes in 1926, approximately 15,000 were pedestrians and about 6,000 of these were children under 15 years of age. The 1926 casualty list also includes 700,000 persons injured, of whom about 385,000 were pedestrians.

In the face of that ghastly showing, C. E. Robb, statistician of the National Safety Council, believes the United States will ultimately solve the problem just as it has solved other national menaces that threatened the welfare of the country. The solution is simple if motorists and pedestrians do their part.

To aid them, Mr. Robb suggests that the police keep records of all accidents with a view to action to prevent similar crashes; that the courts do everything they can to curb criminally reckless drivers; that state officials cooperate in working out adequate and effective laws; that parents teach children to keep off the streets and highways; that safety instruction be made a part of all school work and that civic agencies co-operate in putting through such "safety first" program.

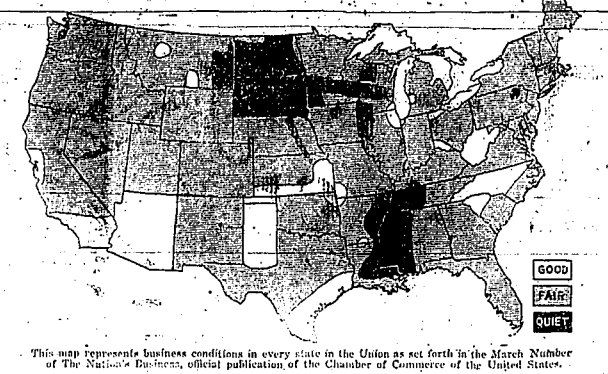

SAVE THE STOCK

WARNING ISSUED ON HOG CHOLERA

Warned by the United States Department of Agriculture. Frequent reports of hog cholera outbreaks just received by the United States Department of Agriculture are the occasion for official warnings urging strict avoidance of any contact with this disease. The reports are from scattered areas, but this far the disease has appeared chiefly in the central States and the west.

As previously pointed out in government publications and addresses by veterinary officials, the full months are the time of the year when hog cholera is most prevalent. This year the control of hog cholera is hampered somewhat by a temporary shortage of serum for immunizing susceptible animals. The situation is made more serious by the fact that a large proportion of swine in the United States have not been immunized owing to the low cost of cholera in recent years. More than three hogs at this season of the year are of good size and are being fattened for market. Large hogs require more serum for proper immunization than small pigs, and since the hog is a long-lived animal, serum companies are now increasing their production, but in the process of serum production, repeated several weeks, stock owners are urged to take special precautions in the meantime. When serum for immunizing swine is available, it should be used at once. The use of disinfectants and other disinfectants will not be effective against hog cholera infection. Outbreaks of hog cholera should be reported immediately to the most direct veterinary or federal stock inspector officials, who will make investigations, diagnoses, and render such further aid as their field forces can handle.
