## BUHL DEFEATS BURLEY, WINS TOURNAMENT

South-Central District Basketball Tournament Closed at Buhl Saturday Evening and Was Pronounced the Most Successful in Years; Buhl Won the Championship in Both Boys' and Girls' Divisions; Huge Crowds Attend.

The Buhl Indians won a decisive victory over Burley Saturday evening and clinched the South Central District championship in basketball. The game was close and hard fought but Buhl proved the better team and Coach Leslie Bowen in an after-the-speech said that the best team was Thurman at center was the star for Buhl and his playing in this last game perhaps more than any other gave him a place on the all-tournament team. However, he was returned on personnel before the game was over. Burley was somewhat tired after having played two previous games on Saturday. In the morning they defeated Buhl 11 to 8 and in the afternoon they downed the Elmer Whites by the score of 16 to 8. It was unfortunate for Burley that three games had to be played the same day but it is very much of a question whether the championship would have been different. Buhl will represent the South Central District at Moscow next week.

The Buhl girls had little difficulty in defeating the Gooding girls in the opening game of the evening and thereby won the right to represent this district in the state tournament which will be played this week in Buhl. The final score was 29 to 8. Manager Van Paton called on Coach Charles Tish of the University of Idaho to present the trophies at the close of the second game. He also announced that this was the largest crowd that had ever attended a bas-

ketball game in Buhl and the attendance was about 2100. Carey was given the trophy for having the most sportsmanlike team. Burley was presented with the trophy for the runner-up and Buhl was awarded both silver trophies for the winners of the two district championships. Coach Bowen congratulated Buhl and the officials of the district tournament and it was stated that more than 65% of the boys men playing in this tournament were students with a high standing in school.

Girls' Squad Named. The girls' all-star team was selected by competent girls' officials and coaches as follows:

Forwards, Metz and Lacy; Buhl; running center, Blank, Gooding; jumping center, Hutz, Buhl; guards, Southwick, Buhl, and Harris, Gooding.

Each player named on the all-star list received a small bronze medal upon which was embossed a basket ball, with his name and position.

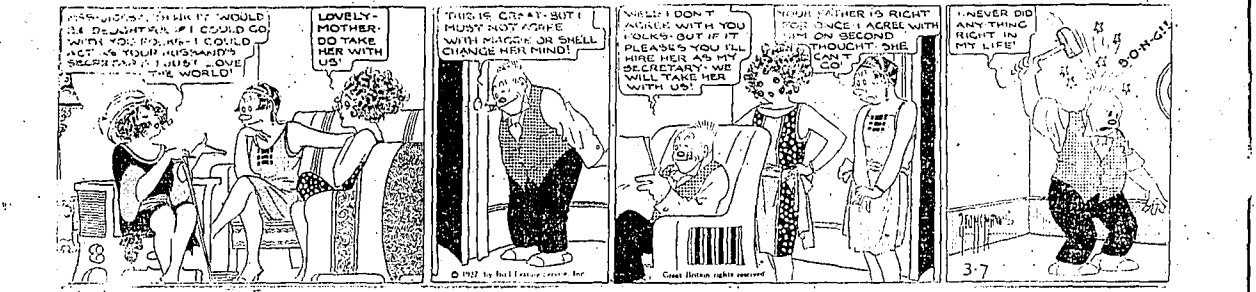

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# POULTRY FLOCK INCREASE IS GREAT; MOORE

### State Head of Division Tells About Astounding Growth in Four Years; Praises Twin Falls Advancement.

Growth of the poultry industry in Idaho has been phenomenal, according to Fred Moore, who is head of the extension work for Idaho and who was here today on a return back to Boise from Idaho Falls. Four years ago, from annual membership, there was only one cannery machine, with \$400-ex capacity in the state. Today this industry has grown to a capacity of 1,200,000 eggs, and almost all have been sold up to the middle of May. This, again, does not include small farm incubators.

Percentage of hatchlings in accredited flocks has increased in more than 50 per cent and in some flocks to as high as 80 per cent. The flocks have been greatly improved. Mr. Moore speaks in the highest terms of the progress of the industry in Twin Falls county and the fine flocks of the best breeds that are in existence here.

# PIKE FINDS GOOD IN THE LEGISLATURE

### Reform of Court Procedure of Real Importance to the State Says Twin Falls Senator; Baldrige Program Goes Through; Some Good Bills Beaten.

Although the legislative session carried out the Baldrige program in almost every particular, some killed reform bills, it performed good work in some particulars and proved a satisfactory body in this last respect than the one which he attended four years ago, Senator W. P. Pike declared today. The outstanding feature of the session was the reform of the court procedure, he said.

About 20 bills, making improvements at different places in the civil code, were adopted, on recommendation of attorneys and this was largely by procedure. Senator Pike got through several bills including the one permitting the raising of sinking funds and bond issues on public utilities out of the proceeds. This bill is broad in scope and verges on additions and improvements to be paid for in the same way.

Twin Falls interests were defeated in the indefinite postponement of the bill drafted by Attorney George Herriot for the construction of public utilities by a company along the line suggested by Harry Dunbar, chief of a bill drafted on the suggestion of Assessor S. Claude Stewart for the different distribution of taxes on electric companies. Defeat on the bill on the distribution of the gas tax was the most severe lameword setback for the committee.

# SCHOOL LEVY ELECTION ON TUESDAY P. M.

### Voters Will Take Place at the Lincoln and Bickel Schools Between the Hours of 1:30 and 7; Qualification of Electors Is Given.

Vote on the referendum to allow the school board to make the levy for school purposes 15 mills if deemed necessary will take place tomorrow afternoon between the hours of 1:30 and 7 o'clock. The election for the territory north and west of the Shoshone street will be held at the Lincoln school and the election for the rest of the city at the Bickel school. An election on this subject has been held annually ever since the law went into effect in 1921 and the vote has always been affirmative.

At the hour of landing the call for this election, it was reported that the eight mill levy would amount to \$61,777.29; the proposed seven mill levy to \$45,680.71. The 15 mill levy will raise somewhat less than last year owing to a decrease in assessed valuation an estimated. It is surmised that the balance of the tentative budget of \$109,485, or approximately \$78,000 will come from state and county funds.

A voter must be legally such under the general statutes and in addition must live within the district and be either a taxpayer or a superintendent, or guardian of at least one child of school age. Poll tax payers are not legal voters within the meaning of this statute.

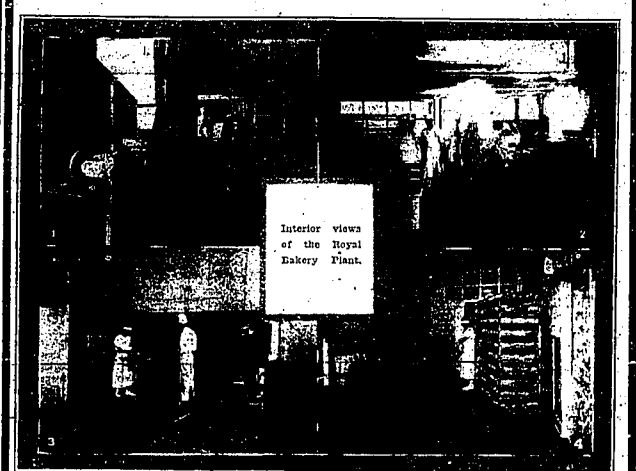
