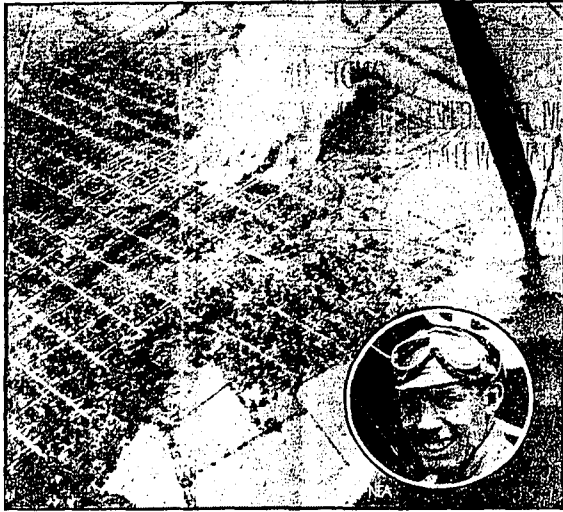

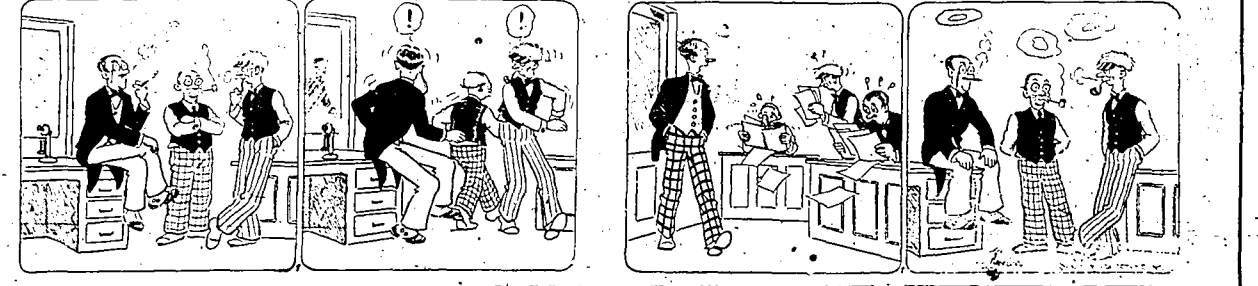

POULTRY FACTS

USING LIGHTS IN WINTER HOUSES

It is wise to be thinking about the lighting of the poultry house for the winter. There is no longer any question of the short days, many of which are dimly, the egg production can be very definitely increased by supplying artificial light to the laying flock. This has been tried out at many experimental stations and by thousands of practical poultrymen.

The hen is perfectly simple. The hen eats only when it is light, if she does not eat only when it is dark. She eats all her crop will hold, but she does not eat until early afternoon, all night and until late in the morning in the winter, she has not been able to eat enough food to keep her from starving. Therefore, she is idle for several hours when she could just as well be eating more food, thus manufacturing more eggs.

The method of using the lights to turn them on for 20 minutes to half an hour in the evening perhaps about nine o'clock or more lighting. The hen soon learns what it means when the lights go on, and they look off the roost immediately and begin to eat centered in front of them as they get their crops full they start back onto the roosts and in half an hour they are all back and the lights can go out, and the day has been made just that much longer for them.

Fattening Ration Urged for All Market Fowls

The common practice of "dusting" chickens with a lot of cokeroids, cell hens or turkeys, ducks or geese, without first making some assurance that they are in proper market condition, is sure to bring disreputation to the producer, dealer and consumer alike.

CONDITION OF JOHNNY MOSTIL VERY CRITICAL

Chicago White Sox Star Fielder Makes Attempt to Take Own Life; Expected at Training Camp; His Health Believed Cause for Actions.

SILVERSPRING, La., March 9.—Johnny Mostil, star outfielder of the Chicago White Sox baseball team and voted the second most valuable player in the American league, was in a critical condition this morning as a result of a self-inflicted knife and razor wounds on his wrists, chest and throat.

Mostil was found late yesterday in a room at the Young hotel headquarters of the White Sox, who are in spring training camp, almost unconscious from the loss of blood. He was hurried away to a hospital where with the aid of stimulants his strength was at least temporarily restored.

Worry over his physical condition was believed by his teammates to have been responsible for the attempted suicide.

Mostil, who is one of the finest outfielders in baseball, has been an habitual complainant about his health recently in the club camp. He spent several weeks during the winter in a Chicago hospital, being treated for facial neuritis.

Monday Mostil went to Ray Schalk, manager of the team, and demanded medical treatment. A physician was summoned and from him diagnostic Schalk learned for the first time that Mostil really was as sick as he had insisted he was. The doctor said the player's blood pressure was abnormally high.

Yesterday afternoon several players were organizing a card game. They asked Mostil to join them and he accepted. But there was some delay in getting the game started and when the players were ready Mostil was missing. It could not be found in the clubhouse.

The door to Mostil's room (trunk is a White Sox fan who accompanied the team in Silver Spring) was locked from the inside. It was forced open and on the floor of the room they found Mostil lying, fully clothed with blood flowing from several wounds.

The farmers are plowing their fields and preparing them for the seed and it will not be long until the crops will be in the ground, but it is not too late to take an account of what kind of crops to plant. During the past two years some crops have produced a remarkable revenue, while others have not produced so bountifully but if the law of averages holds good some other crop will be the banner in production or in marketing this fall. The best plan is a diversified production and then if one crop is a failure in yield or on the market then the year's work will not be lost. We have advocated dairying through these columns a great deal not because the dairy business produced the most money for the labor and time, but because it is a sure producer of cash. Then too the dairy check comes in during the twelve months of the year and many farm crops can be harvested only in the fall. The complaint has been made also that landowners have forbidden their tenants to plant certain crops and this is contrary to sound judgment because the man who tills the soil should certainly have something to say as to what was to be planted.

The people of Twin Falls will have a chance to choose between two different tickets in casting their ballots at the city election next month. One business man stated in his opinion this morning that the choice would be a good deal like flipping a dollar and naming heads for one ticket and tails the other and voting for the one which turned up on top. Therefore the coming city campaign is likely to be very peaceful and quiet. Either set of candidates will give the city a clean business administration we believe and we are happy that none of the bitterness which has characterized the campaigns in days gone by is to be resurrected unless some eleventh hour issue is injected by some fellow who has an axe to grind or some other point to gain.

Twin Falls debaters acquitted themselves splendidly last night and won two debates in southern Idaho. But the fact the two teams won is not the important part of the training of our boys and girls. But the facts brought out in the debate and the educational features of the question are the real benefits. But the debaters on both sides studied the question thoroughly and Gooding sent an excellent team to this city. Their arguments were clean cut and forcible.

COOLIDGE AND BALDRIDGE—HEARTS THAT BEAT AS ONE

In a searching article in the Salt Lake Tribune Sunday reviewing the effects of the veto of the McNary-Haugen bill on possible third term aspirations of the president, Mark Sullivan, himself an opponent of the bill in question, points out the contrast between the presidential attitude on this measure and his stand on the banking bill, and the proposal for increasing the tariff on pig iron produced by the steel trust; both of which were signed. On this last subject Mr. Sullivan says:

"If Mr. Coolidge had been thinking in terms of the political effect of his veto of the McNary-Haugen bill he could have avoided another step which he took about the same time. Within a few days of his veto of the McNary-Haugen bill he raised the tariff on pig iron under the provisions of the elastic tariff. This raising of the tariff on pig iron obviously furnishes the farmers with an additional grievance. They are able to say that here is a president who denies relief to the farmers, but who in almost the same breath gives added tariff protection to the steel industry, which already is in the midst of a period of sustained prosperity more conspicuous than any similar period ever enjoyed by the steel industry in the past."

"The net of which is that, as respects Mr. Coolidge's attitude toward business and industry, he would have done all he has done whether he was a candidate for another term or not. His attitude toward business is not political; it is one of the dearest traits of his personality. He doesn't favor business and business men as against farmers merely because he thinks there are more votes in the industrial east than in the farming west. He looks upon business with much the same regard that he looks upon education and sound morals. Repeatedly in his public addresses he has coupled business with spirituality. When he wrote his Washington birthday address last month the aspects of Washington he chose to extol were Washington as a business man, Washington as an owner of bank stocks, Washington as an investor in real estate for a rise, in the west and in New York state. It gives Mr. Coolidge pleasure to find those qualities in Washington, and to extol them. To the whole business community Mr. Coolidge probably is the most completely satisfying president they ever had. He believes in business even more than business men believe in it. Having never been a business man himself, looking at it as an outsider and as an admirer, he doesn't see the aspects of business about which many business men themselves have no enthusiasm."
