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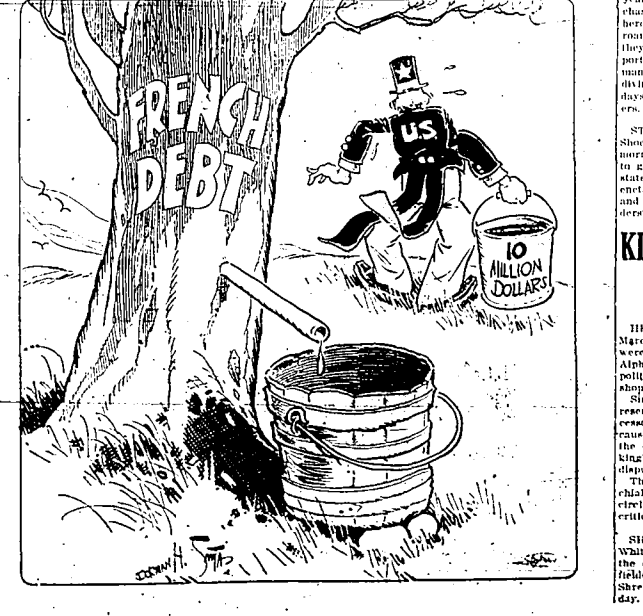

Poultry Hints

The laying hen never loaf.

Buy beans can be used in a poultry ration if minerals are added.

Poultry raising brings quick returns and involves a small capital investment in land, buildings and equipment.

The factors of scientific poultry husbandry are to keep the pens, yards and houses clean, dry and sanitary.

Thanksgiving and Christmas seasons offer good markets for eggs. January and February are also good months since at that time poultry of all kinds is scarce and buyers are willing to pay top prices.

Systematic culling may profitably be practiced throughout the year. Sick birds, those lacking in constituting vigor, and those showing any signs of physical defects should be disposed of whenever found.

Lines that are kept loose and tight is too heavy for the hen. Put a little down first when that is broken and fine, add more.

Ducks have been successfully bred up until seven years of age. The age of eggs and productivity in a duck is double that of the hen.

Green food in some form is essential and should be provided regularly during the winter months. Cabbage, carrots, turnips, beets or potatoes will serve.

When culling a flock one should find out whether it is the hen or the owner who is at fault.

Everything inside a poultry house should be made removable so that it can be cleaned.

Summer chicks command good prices in late fall. They should be ordered five weeks to the pair. Those hatched in the fall stop growing as the cold weather sets in. They are usually small but compact in appearance.

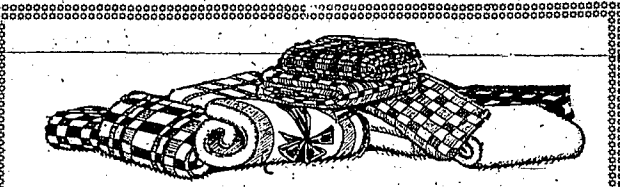

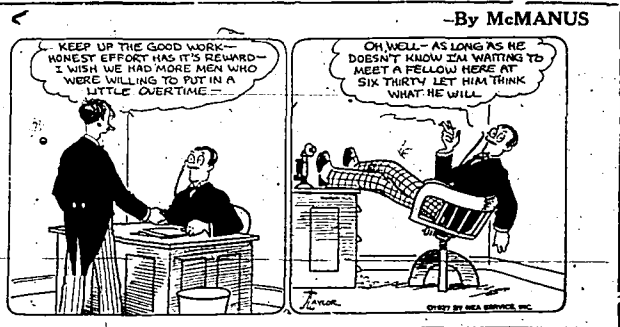
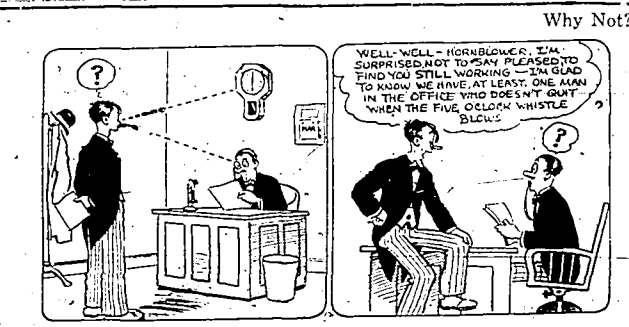

PERNICIOUS BOOKS AND MAGAZINES

You never can judge a man by his clothes, though good clothes may make a lot of difference in his appearance. Neither can you judge a man by his college degree, the church he attends or the brand of tobacco he uses. But it is possible to judge a man by the books he reads and the company he keeps. And never in the history of America were books and magazines so numerous or so freely circulated as today. If all these books and magazines were of a high type of literature, we would have no reason for criticism.

But this is not the case. Practically every news stand in the country is crisscrossed with the so-called "art" and sex magazines as well as a load of other nefarious literature, if we are to believe the "Literary Digest," and we have no reason to doubt its statements. It is true very few parents know the contents of the popular magazines. They have no time or inclination for such reading matter. Nevertheless we should become enough interested to demand that certain erotic writers cease their "foul productions."

There is a law to restrain such writers under the Post-office regulations and each state should see that this law is enforced if we are to protect our children from this menace.

We have enacted laws to suppress narcotics and booze and we are greatly wrought up if these laws are broken, but we have calmly closed our eyes to the sale of obscene books and magazines. "Excesses tend to correct themselves," we are told, but this does not excuse us from doing our duty.

It has been said that when John Toland was dying and his priest offered consolation, he replied, "My soul is doomed, for I have set in motion in my books a power that shall poison the souls of men in ages yet to come." We realize that these words are true and we realize also that "The pen is mightier than the sword." Therefore we should strive for better books and magazines as well as for better newspapers.

Authors and publishers have no more right to corrupt the morals of a people and make a fortune while doing so, than a lawyer has a right to encourage crime in order to have a case.

Let us take the writings of Judge Lindsey, for instance. His theories are demoralizing and if we were to accept his advice on love and marriage, we would have no hope for the present generation, no incentive to build homes or rear children.

Free love, with trial and companionate marriages, would wreck any home or nation. It is useless for the Judge to say he has been misquoted on these points for the evidence is all against him. His doctrines have already taken root and can be seen in the great number of divorce cases, consequently a greater number of juvenile delinquents.

We read that between eighty and ninety per cent of the child criminals are victims of divorce conditions. If this is true it is high time for the public to become aroused. Furthermore, our nation has always stood for monogamic marriage; for purity of thoughts and manners, as well as noble deeds and patriotism. Shall we permit any man or woman writer to destroy with the stroke of a pen these high ideals?

Under the title of "True Stories," "Nerve Told Tales" and "Life's Greatest Secrets," Judge Lindsey has set in motion this kind of literature and other writers have taken up the style.

The world moved along at a very decent pace before Judge Lindsey was ever heard from and we believe parents are yet capable of guiding their children's destinies without the assistance of "Free Thinkers." We believe also that our young people are quite capable of managing their love affairs without a special "School for Marriage."

Much of the sorrow, sin and sickness in our land today can be traced directly to bad books and to bad advice, especially those books which have lowered the moral standard of the nation and have cast doubt upon the word of God.

The reading of the Bible has never done any harm, but good always. And if our young students would spend as much time reading the Bible as they do reading Shakespeare, we would soon see an improvement in their conduct as well as a healthier viewpoint of life. While Shakespeare may entertain and please the fancy, the Bible sustains and comforts the soul. And who will deny that teachers and preachers do not need such comfort in these trying days?

The tendency of young students to commit suicide shows a lack of faith in God and faith in themselves. While we have consumed the books only we do not realize that bad plays and bad moving picture shows have affected the morals of our nation quite as much as bad literature.—Contributed by F. W. S.

MODERN MUFLER SAVES GASOLINE

The influence which the muffler exerts on efficiency may be over-estimated if frequently overlooked by the motorist of today in the opinion of P. B. Macel, of the Macel Brothers Co., local Diesel Brothers dealer.

"Back in the old days when many makes of cars were regularly equipped with muffler and catalytic valves in the owners of many cars or other makes added such equipment," Mr. Macel says. "It was not uncommon to hear a driver boast of the extra speed he could attain with the noise-making device. And perhaps it was true of many of the cars on the road over a decade ago.

Between two exhaust pipe engine and chassis and the rear of the open exhaust, it is perhaps not strange that some drivers in the old days preferred the "bump" of the open cut out. But conditions have changed. The car of today equipped with a cut-out is unusual and the sound of an open exhaust from aircraft and automobiles within a few years there will be legislation against noisy airplanes.

The old "cut-out" before it was abandoned, however, did accomplish one good thing. It attracted attention of the motorist, and of the engineer and designer as well. It is inefficiency of some of the many types of mufflers. Some mufflers silenced the exhaust effectively enough, they caused too much back pressure and loss of engine power—and when the cut-out valve was opened many cars showed marked increase in speed and hill climbing ability.

The natural result was the evolution of more successful, more efficient mufflers. Today the fitting of a cut-out valve to the muffler system gives so little increase in power, if any, as to be scarcely noticeable to the driver.
