

FLORENCE E. O'MALIA TO STAND TRIAL

Former Treasurer of Elmore County Will Be Tried in District Charged with Delinquency of Public Accounts.

MOUNTAIN HOME, Idaho, March 15.—Florence E. O'Malia, former treasurer of Elmore county, must stand trial in district court here on a charge of delinquency in public accounts. It was ordered at a preliminary hearing here Monday in probate court and she was released on \$5000 bond.

Shortages found in Miss O'Malia's accounts in an audit of her books for the year 1924 are responsible for the charges. Other audits reveal the loss has already been taken, one bonding company satisfying the claim against it but the other appealing to the supreme court, which appeal will probably be denied.

The amount of a judgment against the bondsmen included in the civil action was \$3000, including the cost of the witnesses.

The Monday hearing was presided over by Judge H. W. Hines, Defiance, state treasurer; G. C. Zuecher, former deputy county treasurer; James O'Neil, assistant deputy treasurer, and F. A. Hobbs, county auditor.

TWO CHILDREN FOUND FROZEN BESIDE MOTHER

Woman Became Lost in Woods with Three Babies; One Kept Alive from Warmth Radiated by Its Mother's Body.

PAISLEY, Ore., March 15.—With the bodies of two children near her and with a third infant clutched in her arms, Mrs. D. W. Amburger was found lying in the snow in the timbered wilderness between here and Lakeview last night. The two children had perished from the extreme cold which had prevailed in this high rugged country for several days.

The mother of the baby had saved the infant in her own arms but the unprotected children, aged 5 and 10 years, were frozen stiff. The mother was in a serious condition with her legs frozen to the knees.

Mr. Amburger left her cabin in search of food. She had obtained provisions at a farm house and on the return trip through the snow heaved road.

Mr. Amburger had been absent for several days. He returned home Saturday but did not report the absence of his family.

On Sunday, a search was then started which ended with the emergency find last night.

Mr. Amburger was placed under a guard on orders of the sheriff and will be held pending an investigation of the circumstances and an inquest which probably will be held over the children.

CONDITION OF AUSTIN'S CITY MANAGER SAME

Docoy Commits Suicide in Jail Cell Following Shooting of Adm. R. Johnson; Had Made No Statement Regarding Act.

AUSTIN, Tex., March 15.—The condition of Adm. R. Johnson, city manager of Austin, today was said to be "unchanged" at the hospital where he lies. Johnson was shot in his office here yesterday.

The shooting is believed to have been the climax of a long standing disagreement with Dr. C. W. Goldard, city health officer and one of the best known physicians in Austin. Goldard was arrested following the shooting and committed following by slushing his wrists and throat with a penknife a short time later.

Goldard had gone to Johnson's office to present some papers to the manager. Johnson said he told Goldard to get out of his office for the day and Goldard "pulled a gun from his pocket and started firing at me," Goldard made no statement before the grand jury in the case.

SETUP OF OHIO MINES IS CERTAIN

Authorities Believe That Nathan Leopold Is Brains Behind Plan for Wholesale Prison Break.

According to Officials Quantities of Arsenic Were to Be Supplied Cooks in Institution by Chicago Cabaret Owner.

CHICAGO, March 15.—A poisoning plot designed to liberate some 1200 convicts, confined in the Illinois state penitentiary at Joliet may be revealed here with Nathan Leopold, "thrill shooter" of little Bobbie Franks exposed as the "brains" behind the scheme, authorities said today.

The announcement came as a sequel to an official order to question Leopold in connection with the escape from the VIII county jail of three Mexicans, who were among six men sentenced to be hanged for the murder of Deputy Sheriff Peter Klein in a flight from the Joliet prison last summer.

Subsequent questioning failed to prove this allegation. It was said today that Leopold may have helped the convicts in the second escape through fear that his part in the first one, if any, might be exposed.

The present plot, according to Hjalmar Rehn, state's attorney at Joliet, and Chief of Detectives William Shoenover of Chicago, has as its objective the poisoning of all guards in the Joliet institution.

According to the officials, quantities of arsenic, supplied by Chicago cabaret owner were to be smuggled into the prison and into the hands of the convict-cooks.

With the guards out of the way, the prisoners were to make their way to freedom.

GRAND JURY WILL PROBE BANK FAILURE

Special Body Called to Make An Investigation Into Closing of Wyoming's Largest Banking Institution

CHEYENNE, Wyo., March 15.—A special federal grand jury has begun an investigation of the failure of the First National bank of Cheyenne, it was learned today.

The failure of the bank on July 9, 1924, was considered Wyoming's biggest bank failure and rocked 12 member-states in the state to such an extent that depositors demanded a government probe.

The bank had \$5,000,000 in deposits and was considered one of the strongest financial institutions in the state.

Depositors have been paid 35 percent and the receiver, it was learned, is ready to wind up the bank's affairs.

WASHINGTON, March 15.—The British schooner Vinces has been seized by the coast guard cutter Muscogean in St. Helena Sound off the coast of South Carolina, according to reports received at coast guard headquarters today. The Vinces was carrying 2000 cases of liquor, the report stated.

CANTONESE SUCCESSFUL IN ATTACK

Reports That Troops Have Achieved Objective of Cutting the Nanking-Shanghai Railway Lines; Removing Missionaries.

SHANGHAI, March 15.—Cantonese troops were reported today to have captured their immediate objective of cutting the Nanking-Shanghai railway lines.

The Cantonese suddenly lifted their attack from the snowbound front to the vicinity of Nanking. Heavy fighting is reported between Tsing and Shanghai. The Cantonese were believed to have forced their way in a position only twenty miles from Nanking.

Ambassador and British authorities hastily completed arrangements for evacuation of missionaries at Nanking.

A load of munitions was reported to have been captured and looted the salt mined Cantonese there.

The several weeks the Cantonese have been active at several places along the Nanking-Shanghai railway to cut the road and thus further block the northern forces at Shanghai from their allies to the north.

PROSPECTING RESUMES AFTER WIND STORM

Weepah, Nev., Suffers from Blustery Day; Several Tents Were Blown Away Yesterday Amid Pots and Pans.

TOMBHAH, Nevada, March 15.—Gold seekers at Weepah, the new mine for mining men, today stopped digging out of the ground and dug sand out of their camp.

The camp, still very much on the temporary order, straggled out to the wind and rain which blew in yesterday and all but wrecked things.

These weren't much to wreck, but the wind did its best.

Some half dozen or so prospectors' tents, hastily erected, were torn to shreds and flying pans and other baggage blundering equipment went scattering down the way.

As a result no one slept at Weepah last night.

Instead, prospectors and all came back to Tombah to wash up.

SENATOR KING PREPARES TO ENTER HAITI

Utah Solon Plans One-Man Invasion of Gulf Country; President, Borno Described Him as An Undesirable

SAN JUAN, Porto Rico, March 15.—Senator King, democrat, Utah, today prepared for a one-man invasion of Haiti, which he formally described today as an "undesirable" territory.

The Haitian government denied senator an outspoken critic of the regime of President Borno, would be a "troubling" influence.

"I have decided to enter Haiti anyway," Senator King said before he left here yesterday for Santa Domingo.

"As a United States senator I will make my rights prevail. Not even armed forces would make me desist."

TO IMPROVE AND ENLARGE IDAHO'S PENITENTIARY

(A. F. RIDDLE.) Boise, March 15.—Gov. H. C. Boise, Attorney General Frank L. Stephan and Secretary of State Fred E. Lukens, all three state officials, are the new board of parole and penitentiary commission.

The legislature have them \$125,000 from a bond issue, and they have about \$50,000 in the state treasury. They will bring about some physical improvements at the penitentiary. It is now up to their wisdom and responsibility.

MAY CURB MANUFACTURE OF ALL WAR MATERIALS

GENEVA, March 15.—A special commission composed of all of the states invited to give the League of Nations convened here today for the purpose of drafting an international convention for the control of the manufacture of war material.

"Although the United States notified the league that the American government does not give the federal government control of the manufacture of war material in the various states," the United States agreed to participate with the understanding that the convention will provide merely for the fullest publicity by every country involved in any agreement which may be reached of statistics on the private production of war material.

The convention which the commission met today will draw up a treaty which will be submitted to all of the governments of the world for their observations and when these have been sent in to the secretary, it will be presented to all of the nations of the world for their approval.

The question of government control of the private manufacture of war material was one of the specific issues given the league by the Versailles treaty. It was one of the issues which the league has been discussing since its formation.

The schooner, bound from Charleston, S. C., to New York, was owned by T. D. Gillmartin of New York city.

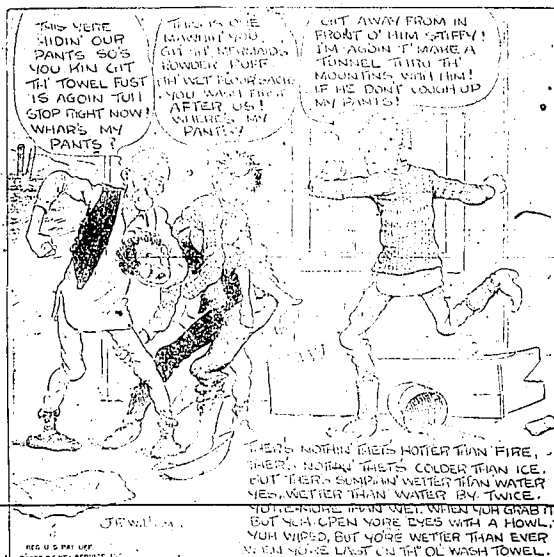

IDAHO PUBLIC UTILITY FUTILITY

Idaho's Nineteenth legislature, which has been called the best legislature in the state's history, made one sad blunder. It might have been suffering from amnesia so far as solving the public utility problems is concerned.

Nothing with which government concerns itself comes closer to the people than public utility services. The trains on which they ride to visit Aunt Susan, attend lodge conventions and complete business deals, the street cars which carry them to their shops and offices, the water that gushes from the kitchen, bathroom and laundry faucets and the lawn hydrants, the electricity that lights, sweeps, cooks, cools and comforts them in their homes, all these are more important than statehouse offices, distant institutions and miles of highway the other fellow uses.

When service is poor, when managers are dictatorial and when rates are high, the people feel it sharply. And they can lose more money by paying padded utility rates than the best economists can save in taxes.

Nevertheless, the Nineteenth session shut its eyes and let the present utility system stand. It continued, for at least two years more, the spectacle of monopolistic companies out of control, for experience has shown us that our little board of five, underpaid and overworked men supported by a tiny and incompetent trio of technicians, is helpless. When the skilled accountants, expensive engineers and cunning lawyers of the companies go after something, the commission is like King Canute commanding the tides to fall back.

We have in Idaho, too, the infamous cost-plus system of figuring rates. We approve such rates as will give the companies a certain per cent on what they spend which, of course, is no incentive to cut down expenditures.

So we launch out upon two years more of valuations and revaluations; with our commissioners still timid, underpaid and overworked, and the technicians on behalf of the people still miserably unable to cope with the brilliant array of specialists brought in by the companies. If we get through these years reasonably well, it will be because the managers of the utility companies have themselves been reasonable, economical and efficient. And that we submit, is too much to expect of all of them—Statesman.

After all, why should the Statesman complain because the administration and legislature did what everyone familiar with the situation knew they would do when elected—the things they were elected to do. Senator T. J. Walsh of Montana, just before the adjournment of congress gave startling figures showing the growth of trusts especially electrical and other public service trusts during the last two administrations, under lax enforcement of the anti-trust law in the nation. The situation in Idaho is a reproduction on a small scale of what is happening in the nation.

COST OF CATCHING A SALMON

An editorial in the Portland Telegram is of interest and refers to the high cost of sport to the tourist, which raises an item of legal interest. The paper says probably every salmon caught "costs a minimum of ten dollars."

Unquestionably that is true. The writer has managed many shoots for local lodges in just years and the minimum, for instance, on ducks provided for any occasion averaged \$2.20 per duck to the shooter.

Very well. The shooter does not raise any objection. He comes into the state by the thousand, pays his gasoline and hotel bills, buys his fishing tackle and shells takes on a license or two and fishes with the life of the state. His business is worthwhile and should be developed; he should be given every courtesy and shown every convenience, as he may not even be a tourist. He may be a scout for enterprise and have an eye open. It costs something to shoot and fish.

STUDY MADE ON COSTS OF MILK

Additional facts on what it costs farmers to produce milk in the large milk-producing centers of Illinois have been obtained by the college of agriculture at the University of Illinois at Urbana, Clinton and Madison counties where 130 farmers, most of whom were producing fluid milk for St. Louis last year, made 10 cents above all expenses on every 100 pounds of milk produced.

These farmers had 115 cows which cost them an average of \$12 a cow and produced 510 worth of products during the year, according to Karl Z. Wright of the college farm organization and management department, who summarized the records which the farmers kept in cooperation with the Institute. These 115 cows produced 157,470 pounds of milk during the year, at an average of 0.72 pounds each, at an average net cost of \$3.85 a hundred. Most of the farmers have been keeping a daily record of each cow's production and have disposed of last products, so it is evident that the average farmer in this territory produced milk at a loss.

The feed cost ranged from 31 cents to \$1.27, depending on the quality of feed produced, while the man-labor cost varied from 20 cents to 80 cents when figured at 20 cents an hour. In other words, the feed cost for the year for each cow varied from \$27 to \$109 and man-labor cost from \$12 to \$147, which shows that there is much room for improvement. While the feed cost a cow was \$17 in the one case and \$109 in the other, it amounted to 53 cents a hundred for milk produced in the first case and 48 cents in the 2nd. This shows that cheap production comes not so much from the cost of a cow, but from the high efficiency of the cow. A farmer can secure low feed and labor cost on each 100 pounds of milk produced only by the use of the best cow and the best man-labor, nearly 24 per cent. Charges for fuel, building and equipment, interest on investment in cows, insurance, veterinary and miscellaneous items, made up the 15 per cent.

One of these farmers spent 20 hours taking care of each cow, while most spent 25 to 30 hours, and increased the production of milk, was not possible in the last case. There seems to be very little cause for the difference in the cost of production per cow. It required 1.2 hours as an average for all the farmers to care for each cow throughout the year.

Since feed and labor made up 83 per cent of all cost, it follows the farmer to watch these two items closely. The cost of feed and labor, however, does not mean that the farmer should neglect the other high-producing cow, the most important single factor in getting profits.

Forget Them While They're Here

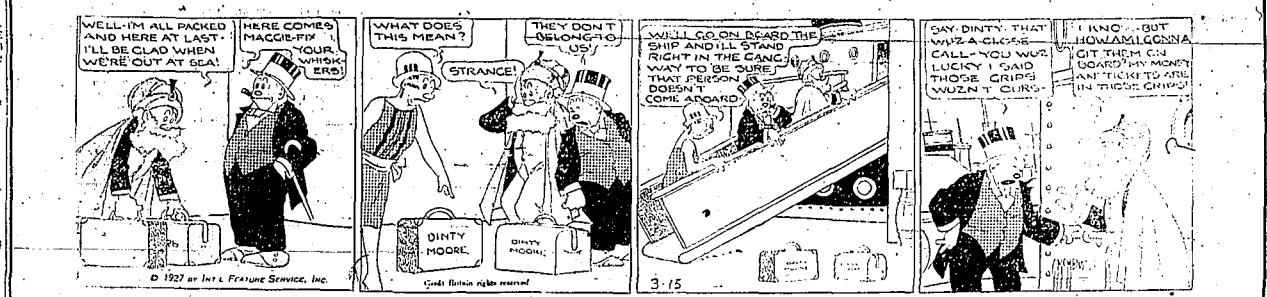

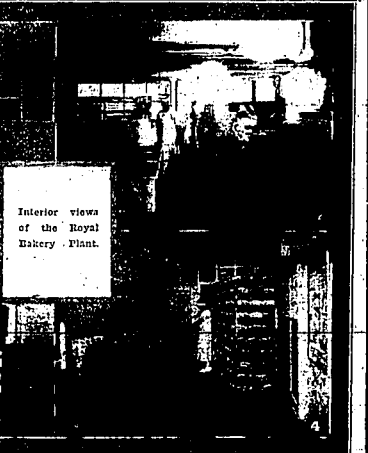
