## Auto Makes Fast Time in Fourteen Hour Test Run

An average of more than a mile a minute—61.7 miles an hour, to be exact—was achieved by a Buick and Essex super-six-cylinder in a continuous run of nearly 14 hours on a dirt track at Tamaran, Cal., just outside of San Francisco, according to a report received by Mr. Jensen, race dealer in Twin Falls.

This record run, said Mr. Jensen, was made by a Buick and Essex, according to a report received by the service department of Stanley W. Smith, the San Francisco distributor for Hudson and Essex cars. NEW YORK, March 17.—When Babe Ruth and Rogers Hornsby were picking during the winter about 40 more or making on a new contract, there were reasons to believe that less than 20 discontented players might inhibit the two prize show elephants of baseball in an organized holdout campaign.

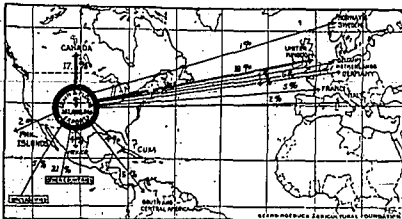

HEROES ARE MADE—NOT BORN.

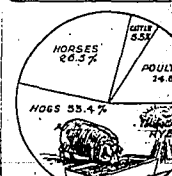
\$262,896,309 Grain Export—Wheat and Flour Top List



The value of grains and grain products exported from the United States in the fiscal year ending June 30, 1926, is placed at \$262,896,309 by the Sears-Roback Agricultural Foundation in a survey of the situation just issued. Wheat and flour topped the list, making up nearly two-thirds of the total.

largest receiver of American grain. This is due to the fact that much of the grain is shipped via the Great Lakes and the St. Lawrence river and is cleared to European ports. The bulk of it, however, is destined for Europe. The leading buyer of American grain was Great Britain, with a round of 18 per cent of the total export.

More Rye This Year



American farms have always been turned down where rye for table purposes is concerned. Most of our rye crop has been exported to Europe and the bulk of the remainder fed to farm animals, according to a report by the Sears-Roback Agricultural Foundation.

# MUTUAL POWER AT WORK UPON CLEAR LAKES

Work on Pipe Line Has Started and Ten Carloads of Material Will Be on the Ground April 1 for Completion of Preliminary Development.

Work on the Peoples Mutual Power site at Clear Lake has begun, according to M. L. McGuire, president of the company.

Half a dozen men are down at work on the job there and others will soon be employed. Experts from California will arrive in a few days to take charge of the operations and carry the work to completion.

Financing of the enterprise has been made through a California group and they are ready to go through with the enterprise where all people here want them to. Contracts have been let for the building of the pipe line and a bond has been put up to insure completion of the work by May 1, says the Bill Heford.

Ten cars of material to be used in construction work are expected to arrive at the station in Idaho about the first of April.

In discussing the project Mr. McGuire said:

"For many years the people of the Twin Falls tract have looked forward to the time they might have the advantage of their nearness to the power sites along the Snake river and receive electricity at rates where all could use it. Instead, they have experienced a gradual increase in rates from year to year and have become so unprofitable today, they were forced to carry their power to some distant states. It was beginning to look as if the natural power resources were to go to the people of other states. It is more than gratifying to the officers of the Peoples Mutual Power company that they are now able to inaugurate the assistance of the people of their efforts to save the people's power site."

Croarkin's mother—who had testified in an affidavit that her son was in the court room when the verdict was read. She screamed then started weeping. Croarkin had little attention to her.

There is little chance of any appeal in the case. Attorneys for the defense announced they were pleased at having saved their client from the gallows.

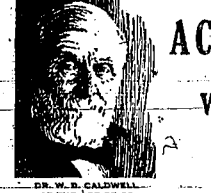

Sentence probably will be passed on Sinclair a week from tomorrow, which Justice William Dies is expected to hear the defense motion for a new trial.

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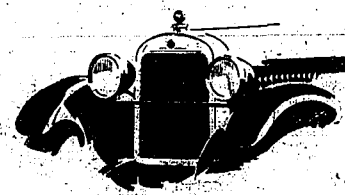

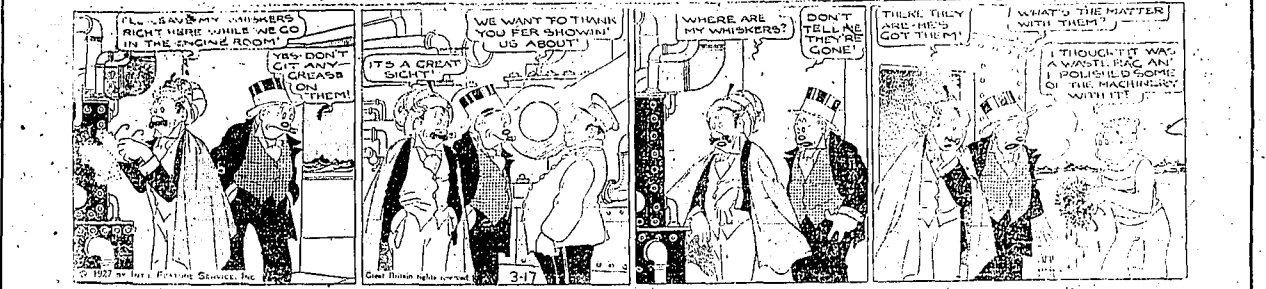

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# HINTON CASE STARTS TODAY BEFORE JURY

### Twelve Men Are Selected Without the Exercise of Peremptory Challenge on Either Side; State Is Presenting Its Side; 'Fifteen Is Acquitted'

After a rigid examination which convinced both attorneys that all members called on the jury and not excused for having opinions were of open mind and would vote fairly, the jury in the case of the state against Frank Hinton for alleged possession of stolen goods was accepted without the exercise of a single peremptory challenge. Jurors so chosen were Wilson H. Beck, W. E. Fehnewald, G. J. Cowen, Will Savage, Frank DeKlois, H. G. Regan, Calvin Owens, William Walker, J. E. Green, H. P. Barker, Craig T. Bracken, F. D. Brown. Prosecutor O. W. Witham represents the state and Shad L. Hodgkin the defense.

This is the case wherein Hinton, his brother Clyde, and Mr. and Mrs. Ross Stevens were arrested early in January. Stevens was released for lack of evidence convicting him with the crime. Mrs. Stevens pleaded guilty of receiving stolen goods and also was the mother of tiny baby, sentence was withheld. Clyde Hinton took all blame for thefts in a dozen burglary cases. The state claims Hinton admitted taking goods to his ranch and making a trip on which he delivered part and asserted he had delivered all that came into his possession. He is said to have claimed that he had a rifle on the way up.

## Enrollment Figures of the Twin Falls Dist. School System

There were 2891 enrolled during the last six weeks period in the public schools of this city, with an average daily attendance of 2673.3. Enrollment included 536 in Hicket, 223 in Lincoln, 458 in Washington, 271 in Junior high and 293 in high school.

In the elementary schools Hicket ranks first in percentage of attendance and first in punctuality; Lincoln ranks third in percentage of attendance and first in punctuality; Washington ranks second in percentage of attendance and third in punctuality.

Percentage for the whole system follows: Hicket, second in attendance and punctuality; Lincoln, fifth in attendance and first in punctuality; Washington, fourth in attendance and fifth in punctuality; high, first in attendance and third in punctuality.
