W. J. CAMERON TELLS ABOUT FORD'S PAPER

Editor of Dearborn Independent Explains That Campaign Against Jews Was Started Without Consulting Henry Ford.

COURT ROOM, DETROIT, Mich., March 21.—Henry Ford's paper, the Dearborn Independent, began its campaign against the "international Jew" and denounced Aaron Sapiro as an agent of a "band of Jews" exploiting American farmers, without consulting Ford, William J. Cameron, editor of the Independent, testified today.

COURT ROOM, DETROIT, Mich., "The so-called 'Jew ban' is much so unconstitutionally heretofore in the Aaron Sapiro million dollar suit case against Henry Ford, broke suddenly upon me today.

An apparently innocent question asked William J. Cameron, editor of the Dearborn Independent, by William Henry Haller, attorney for Sapiro, brought two of Ford's lawyers to their feet protesting; the jury was excused and the session turned into a dead legal argument, full of citations of decisions of other courts and the law book.

It was before this argument started a letter was introduced containing the instructions under which "Cameron testified in the Sapiro case." Cameron, it was said, wrote the alleged libelous articles.

The letter told Dunn that the "Jew boys" were "settling on the farmers" and that the movement had been started by Bernard Baruch in Kansas City soon after President Wilson left the White House. Dunn was asked to investigate the situation on the Pacific coast.

WILL SUBMIT CRISIS TO THE LEAGUE

Jugo-Slavia Would Approve Dispatching An International Expeditionary Under Auspices of League of Nations

PARIS, March 21.—Jugo-Slavia is willing to submit the Albanian crisis to the League of Nations, a dispatch from Belgrade reported today.

Foreign Minister Perich of Jugo-Slavia assured Minister Berthelot at Belgrade that Jugo-Slavia would keep the Balkan peace at any price and that Albanian revolutionary plot had been organized in Jugo-Slav territory.

Reports of problem league action arose from the visit of German Ambassador Von Hoesch to the French foreign office, where he conferred with Secretary General Berthelot on the matter of British viewpoints towards league action.

ROME, March 21.—Italy has made it distinctly understood that Jugo-Slavia must keep her hands off in the Albanian situation, a foreign office spokesman told the United Press today.

Although no formal note was dispatched, Italian Minister Berthelot explained to the Jugo-Slav foreign office that the fascist government could not remain neutral if warlike aggression toward Albania continued.

Weepah, Nevada Has Fire Department But No Water

TONDPAH, Nev., March 21.—Weepah, scene of Nevada's recent gold strike in 1925, opened a hotel and organized a fire department today. What the weepah was a deserted resting spot with one or two frame shacks in evidence, is fast becoming a city.

The Weepah hotel, with a big sign heralding the fact, was drawn upon to the public. Its 200 beds were almost immediately rented at \$4 per night.

The fire department was organized but there is no water system and no fire apparatus to use. A public subscription has been started to remedy this situation.

COUNCIL AND MAYOR MUST SHOW CAUSES

Idaho Falls Officials Cited to Appear in District Court and Explain Entries in Amended Contract with Drillers.

IDAHO FALLS, March 21.—Mayor Ralph Louis and members of the city council are cited to appear in district court Thursday evening to show cause why they should not be enjoined for entering an amended contract with the Layne-Howler company for the drilling of additional wells for the purpose of supplying the city with pure water.

The city clerk, retaining the city officials from signing any contract until after the court hearing, today was signed by George W. Edinger, judge of the ninth judicial district.

Twenty citizens are plaintiffs in the action, which was brought in the district court. The plaintiffs ask to keep the mayor and council from signing the amended contract. The action is based on the ground that the amended contract is not a new contract and cannot be entered in or awarded until the proposed law submitted to competitive bids.

The Layne-Howler company has sunk one well for the city of Idaho Falls and city officials took steps to have additional wells sunk to increase supply of pure water for the city.

The first well, at 250 feet, came in about a month and a half ago and produced the water in 1400 gallons of water a minute. The water comes from 200 feet underground and meets all requirements of the state and national health departments.

WASHINGTON, March 21.—Lawrence Dennis, former American charge d'affaires to Nicaragua, today denied published reports that he received instructions from the state department last fall to work for the election of President Diaz.

Dennis said Secretary Kellogg and other department officials today. He declined to comment on the report that in offering his resignation he charged wealth and social position influenced promotion and appointments in the foreign service.

He denied he left his post at Havana, en route to New York, and proceeded to Washington by rail under state department orders to escape press suggestions before entering with officials.

Following is the account and last installment of a letter written by Howard Barrett, Twin Falls student, written to his father and mother. Barrett and Patricia Wilson are students on the university effort which is crisscross European and Mediterranean countries. The first installment of the letter was published in Saturday's issue of the Times.

The letter follows:
Just before we got to Jerusalem, which was late in the evening we stopped at the Mount of Olives, the hill of the Ascension. Here you can see the Jordan valley on one side, the Dead Sea on the other, and the Jordan river running through the valley. It was wonderful. We then entered the Holy City and were taken to our hotels, where we had dinner.

After dinner we walked down to Solomon's quarry. The quarry is a cave, and it is there that the rock was taken out to build Solomon's temple. It is well preserved and has only been opened to the public for 70 years, being discovered accidentally. We found a guide and went down, he carrying a candle. The rock is a white limestone, and on the sides of the wall the chisel work can be plainly seen. You can see how they cut the rock out by hand and then inserted wooden wedges in the cracks and poured water on the wooden wedges. The wood expanded and split the rock. It was hard to realize that we were standing in the workshop of Solomon's men which was dated back about 3000 B. C.

Solomon's quarry is a great gathering place for Masons when they are in Jerusalem, and every few days a ship of four or five comes to the quarry to meet in their various lodges. You see Solomon was the originator of Freemasonry and I understand a great Mason.

De Moly is what you might call an unscrupulous sort of Marlon or contractor, he is sponsored by the Masons. De Moly is a sort of organization of young men, having for its purposes certain ideas for the betterment of the city. It is a somewhat religious organization. I wrote you quite a while ago that I had been elected to membership in the order of the Knights of St. John. There are two degrees in the De Moly, Initiatory and the De Moly degree. So they held an initiation in the caves on the spot the Masons hold all of their meetings and now I am a full-fledged De Moly. About two dozen Masons were at the initiation and it was certainly an honor to me to be one of the candidates.

The next day we went to Bethlehem by auto, all of these students and there we visited the Church of the Nativity wherein lies the manger and the exact spot Jesus was born. On the way back one of the ladies in the car started to burp and she thought she did not know how to loosen it, so I got out and under and fixed it and then he was driven to Jerusalem. It was a big Six Sedan, and I felt right at home. It was the first time I had been behind the wheel since I left home. It was certainly great to have Beth and worked. FORMER TWIN FALLS COACH REPLACES 'BRICK' MULLER ON U. OF C. VARSITY STAFF

With Clinton Evans now assigned to replace 'Brick' Muller as chief aide to C. M. Price on the University of California varsity football coaching staff, members of the student executive committee face the task of finding a man capable of filling Evans' place as freshman grid mentor. The task is a formidable one as there are few football teachers available at this time who appear able to keep fresh football on the high plane that 'Brick' Evans has placed it since coming to California from Twin Falls, Idaho.

Although the status of 'Brick' Muller is at present under question, it is felt by followers of Blue and Gold football that he will no longer be able to retain his place on the Bruin coaching staff as his professional grid work will prevent him from remaining in Berkeley after the start of the season.

As a result of this action the complete coaching staff of the Bruins will be as follows:

- Head coach: C. M. Price.
- Assistant coach: C. W. Evans.
- Assistant coach: Dr. Albert Hoban.
- Assistant coach: Dan McMinn.
- Scout: Walter Gage.

Backed by an enviable reputation as a coach of successful high school and freshman gridsters during the last several years, Coach Evans will be an important part of the Bruin coaching staff. He will act chiefly as an assistant to Price in the backfield department. Dr. Hoban takes care of the line.

In Former Years, Evans is a graduate of the University of California and first entered coaching among prep schools of Southern California. In 1921 he was engaged to coach the Twin Falls, Idaho, prepsters, where the coaches were big but lacked the football knowledge. There Evans' teams surpassed in fame the noted 'Preps'—preparators.

In 1924 it took over a year for California freshman football, for Stanford was beginning to come through with surprising victories and was setting the East States named an impossibility.

That was the year Evans took the helm to direct the Bruin Yearlings and that was the year that same freshman started winning their games and they have defeated Stanford every year since then.

Evans puts great emphasis on the use of hard kicking, but also stresses their capabilities. He has an ability to work out any type of play that a particular occasion demands, as was evidenced in last year's "tit-to-tig game" when his men broke forth with a new type of passing play that completely baffled the Cards, Berkeley Times.

Southern Idaho Association Will Hold Its 15th Annual Meeting at the Idaho Field Trial club, 1000 N. 1st St., on Sunday, March 27. The program will consist of a variety of events, including a dog show, a horse show, and a variety of other sports.

The Idaho Field Trial club will hold its seventh annual trials next Sunday. The crowd is expected to be the largest ever at the old country corner at 8 o'clock and then proceed to the Twin Falls farm which is half a mile south and half a mile west of the high line. The course will run two miles south from the old farm, where the dog trials will be held, then across the highway to an east for two miles, then north to the north side of Idaho's meadows. The course will then turn north across the low line that for one mile, then west to gravel road.

There will be three different classes. First, the open class, open for all puppies whelped in 1926. Second, the shooting dog stakes open to all amateur dogs and judged from a shooting dog standpoint. FRUIT GROWERS OPPOSE RATES ON PRODUCTS

California Growers Backed by State Railroad Commission Sights Fight for Lower Rates to Central and Eastern Points.

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U. S. MARINES TO PROTECT AMERICANS

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 21—The United States has intervened in the Chinese civil war by sending to protect and defend American citizens and property at any cost. The American marines will protect American lives and property only.

Prevent Pneumonia

Full Feed for Cows

When fed a full ration she needs only her feed to maintain her body. This fact shows the importance of full feeding good cows.

Dairy Notes

One of the milk to 70 degrees F. and hold at this temperature as neatly as you can.

It is a mistake to think that because the summer has gone on, milk should necessarily be in the cow's ration. The two are essential.

Apples or apple pomace may be fed to dairy cows as a substitute for corn silage.

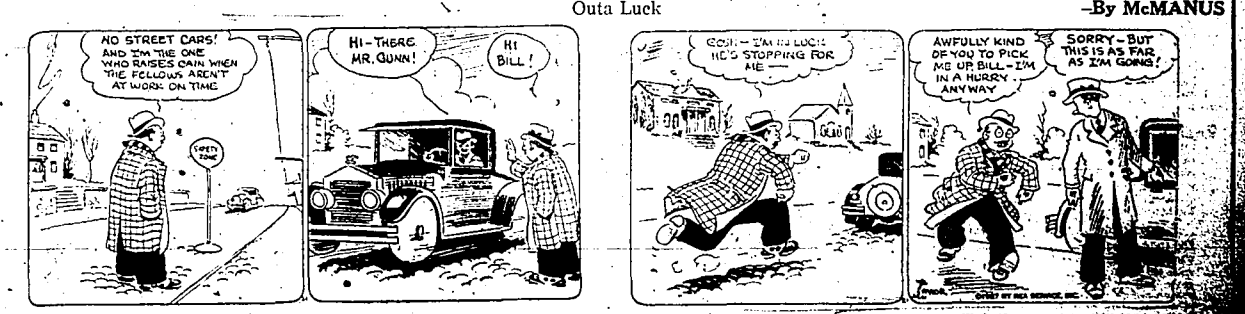

WILL COOLIDGE FAVOR RECIPROCITY?

BY JAMES D. WHELAN.

Whether Calvin Coolidge will embrace the opportunity presented by Prime Minister MacKenzie King of Canada to return to the old policy of trade pacts with our northern neighbor, which was in harmony with the historic stand of the republican party, especially from the days of Blaine to the close of the Taft administration, or whether he will continue the innovation forced on the party by the American Protective Tariff league in 1920, is a question which is perturbing the national capital.

Reciprocity in America is older than Blaine. It constituted the practical policy of Jefferson, who was in theory a free trader. An effort was made to carry it into effect during the administration of Tyler, a whig. Later on a treaty was made with Canada, under a democratic administration and strongly advocated by Stephen A. Douglas. This lasted through the Lincoln administration terminating in 1866. When Blaine, with his strong Pan-American views, became secretary of state under Garfield, it is believed he intended to reopen the question, but the assassination of the president terminated any such plan that he may have had. When he again took up the state portfolio under Harrison, he urged the principle of reciprocity. Canada was not specifically mentioned by him, though the western hemisphere was specified particularly. A bill introduced by Senator Hale, it was believed, with the approval of Blaine, however, would have had the effect of complete free trade with Canada. Harrison and Blaine negotiated many reciprocity treaties.

McKinley as president negotiated seven reciprocity treaties, but the Tariff league blocked them. His last speech was a plea for reciprocity. Roosevelt continued the work, negotiating two. Taft negotiated one with Canada which passed July 26, 1911. In Canada both parties had previously favored reciprocity, though the manufacturers in the conservative party opposed. Incantations uttered by President Taft, a wholly indiscreet speech of Champ Clark and a series of flamboyant editorials in the Hearst press gave the Canadian manufacturing trusts a chance to claim that the whole scheme was a deep laid plot to annex Canada to the United States. The conservative party, flopped overnight, and reciprocity was beaten north of the line. The republican party continued to advocate reciprocity until the surrender in 1920 of this with its foreign peace policy to the tariff league.

So far as Blaine was concerned, reciprocity was part of his general plan of Pan-Americanism, which has been fully adopted would have laid the foundation for settlement of our quarrel with Mexico and Nicaragua. In diplomatic lines, it was followed by Wilson in the matter of the A. B. C. conference, and might with profit be followed by Coolidge and Kellough today. It involved on its economic side understandings with nations on the western continent, and on its diplomatic side complete arbitration. South American writers today say that the easiest way of reaching diplomatic understanding would be through such Pan-American diplomacy, or through our adherence without reservation to the world court.

So far as the tariff on the Canadian line helping American farmers, the admissions of Senator Gooding, and of the republican backers of the McNary-Haugen bill constitute a vindication of the statements of President Taft on that issue, and show that such alleged protection to be a fraud.

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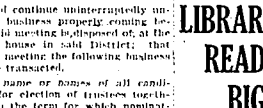
