

RETRACT IF WRONG SAYS HENRY FORD

Manufacturer Tells Editor to Take Back Printed Articles if They Are Wrong But If Right to Stick to Them

COURT ROOM, Detroit, Mich., March 25.—Henry Ford directed William J. Cameron, editor of the Dearborn Independent, to retract the attacks on Aaron Sapiro in the Independent. If they were wrong but stick to them if right, Cameron testified in the million dollar Ford-Sapiro libel suit today.

"I told Mr. Ford I had a demand for a retraction on some things published in the Independent," Cameron said, referring to the Sapiro articles.

"I tried to tell him what it was and he waved his hand and said, 'Well, if we are wrong, take them back and if they are right, stick to them.'"

Cameron then said an investigation was made by Fred Beck, business manager of the Independent, but his department did not make any inquiry. There was no retraction.

TRIGUIERO JURY IS IN DISSENTION

**FREEDOM OF SCREEN
URGED BY WILL HAYS**

NEW YORK, March 25.—The suggestion that the federal constitution be amended to guarantee freedom of the motion picture screen, the freedom of speech and press is now guaranteed, was made by Will H. Hays, president of the Motion Picture Producers and Distributors of America, in an article in "Ownership of the Movies" in the number of Review of Reviews issued today.

"To release the product of one's brain only after it has been strained through the sieve of a censor," said Hays, is a discouragement and an affront to conscientious men.

"The founders of our republic recognized this when they guaranteed to all men freedom of speech, freedom of assembly, and freedom of conscience. Had the motion picture been known when the constitution was written, there is not the slightest doubt that it too would have been accorded those inalienable rights which Americans jealously safeguard, for motion pictures are but visualized speech and thought. The whole matter is so important that perhaps provision in the federal constitution itself might be wise to protect the integrity of the people's favorite amusement against unfair aggression and consequent attrition."

"The tendency to censor motion pictures, books, all forms of expression, is a mark of the times," Hays continued. "The passion, on the part of a small minority, for restricting and directing other people, in their will, has become almost a national pastime."

"Political invasion assumed its most threatening aspects shortly after the termination of the war. Soon it became apparent that continued aggression would ultimately mean that there could be no physical distribution of motion pictures in America. The industry, hampered by censoring laws and restrictions, will no set standards would have been forced to go out of business."

"Then, too, censors have their own prejudices, their own likes and dislikes, which are not necessarily the likes and dislikes and prejudices which govern their neighbors."

"One censor board had a lawyer among its members and the lawyer objected to the showing of any picture in which an 'unethical' or 'crooked' lawyer appeared. An island state prohibited the display of girls in bathing suits; while a seacoast state, which boasts one of the finest beaches in America, did not see impropriety in such scenes."

"Scenes of strike riots were ordered eliminated from news reels in one state at the same time his newspapers were using photographs of the exact incidents recorded in the films. Another board, upset by the appearance in a picture of an employer who did not use safety devices to protect his employees, ordered insertion of a title reading: 'Henry Jones, a type of employer now happily extinct, who does not believe in safety devices.'"

"The public, having its attention called to the matter, realizes that censorship is the wrong method of protecting the people from real and fancied danger. Censorship has proved as ineffective in operation as it was unnecessary in actuality."

REVIEW—STUDIES IN THE CHRISTIAN LIFE

THE FOLLOWING METHODS OF REVIEW ARE SUGGESTED:

1. A Descriptive Essay Method. Each member of the class should be assigned to the task a week ahead of the preparation of an essay on the topics involved in the quarterly lessons, as for example: What constitutes a true Christian? Following Christ, the prayer life of a Christian, The Christian and his Bible, The home life of a Christian, Christian stewardship, The Christian and the missionary obligation.

II. The Question Review Method. The teacher will prepare a list of questions dealing with the various phases of the quarter's lessons. These will be written on slips of paper and the members of the class will draw them. As examples of questions note the following: What does following Christ involve? What is the Christian's responsibility as to his Bible? What is the Christian's obligation as to stewardship? What are the duties of the members of the home? What is the Christian's obligation as to the evangelization of the world? What is the Christian's hope? Is Christ coming again? Will there be a resurrection of the body?

III. The Summary Method. This method can always be used to good advantage with the advanced classes. The following fact or facts should be grouped and the principal teaching of the quarter's lessons suggested.

Lesson for January 2. Jesus first calls men to His disciples. He then calls them to have fellowship in His service. Those who receive His free-forgiveness will walk as He walked.

Lesson for January 9. The one who really follows Christ shall have much and possess—fellowship with Christ, he will love his enemies, do good to those who hate him, bless them that curse him, pray for those which despitefully use him.

Lesson for January 16. The Bible teaches the Christian with full knowledge of God and man's obligation to Him. The only way to be able to stand firm and true in the coming perilous times is to be thoroughly grounded in the knowledge of the Scriptures.

Lesson for January 23. Jesus, though divided, resorted much to prayer. If he needed this fellowship, how much more do His followers need it.

Lesson for January 30. Followers of Jesus may expect temptations, but divine help is available for every need.

Lesson for February 6. To every believer has been given certain talents such as gifts for service, knowledge, time, money, etc. to be used for the honor of His Lord. A time of reckoning is coming at which reward will be given for fidelity, and judgment noted out for faithfulness.

Lesson for February 13. The home is the oldest and most important institution in the world. The most effective way of making strong and pure the church, society, and the nation is to make the home Christian.

Lesson for February 20. The subject of the kingdom is under solemn obligation to promote sobriety and let his light shine so that the heavenly father may be glorified.

Lesson for February 27. Every believer has two natures—the flesh and the spirit. The only way to overcome the flesh is to be filled with the Spirit.

Lesson for March 6. The Lord permitted persecution to fall upon the church to cause the disciples to be scattered in order for the widening of the testimony.

Lesson for March 13. Christ has inquired upon every disciple the obligation of witnessing for Him to all the nations of the world.

Lesson for March 20. The Christian's hope is the personal return of Jesus Christ to take him to His heavenly home. When Christ comes, the body of the believer who has followed arduously will be resurrected and living believers will be caught up into glory with Christ.

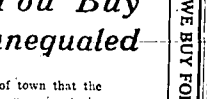
