

MINERS ENTOMBED BY GAS EXPLOSIONS

MEN TRAPPED IN MINE BY EXPLOSION

Eight Miners Entombed in Illinois by Gas Blast; Little Hope Held for Finding Men Alive.

HARRISBURG, Ill., March 30.—The eight men entombed in the Steel Tipple mine in Saline County Coal corporation by an explosion this morning, were found dead this afternoon by rescue crews.

HARRISBURG, Ill., March 30.—Little hope was held out by rescue workers today for recovery alive of eight miners entombed by an explosion in the steel-tipple mine of the Saline County Coal corporation at Leadford, five miles south of here.

The victims are: Joe Toth, William Filber, Claude Lynch, George Ambrick, and Cecil Reynolds, and Leo Morris, all Illinois; Elmer Smith, creek hobo, and Peter Dorris, air man.

The other eight men were closer to the blast and probably were killed instantly, although there is hope that some of them survived the explosion here.

They are entombed below the spot where the explosion occurred and rescue crews may not be able to reach them before night. The mine is filled with fumes and blocked by debris from loose from its walls.

The explosion occurred at 8 a. m. a few yards from the face of the mine. An open light is believed to have touched off an undetected gas pocket.

All available first aid facilities and ambulances were dispatched from here. Every physician in Harrisburg hastened to the scene.

The famous Eldorado rescue crew arrived at the mine shortly before midnight with rescue equipment and set about the task of clearing away to the entombed men.

The tragedy preceded only two days the closing of the mine with the signing of the present wage contract. The probability that families of the eight men will be left penniless without wages before the same time that their neighbors are temporarily thrown out of work.

MISSION AT FUCHOW HAS BEEN LOOTED

Missionaries Leaving Nanking Were Reported to Have Been Stoned; Report Evacuation Proceeding Satisfactorily.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 30.—The American Catholic mission at Fuchow in Kiating province was reported today to have been looted and its members have fled to Nanking. Other missionaries leaving Nanking are reported to have been stoned.

Admiral C. S. Williams, Asiatic fleet commander, reporting this to the navy department at 4:50 p. m. Shanghai time, added that evacuation of Americans from upper Yangtze river districts was proceeding satisfactorily. "Amongst, however, continued firing on destroyers and refuse ships plying from Nanking and other river points."

At Nanking there is an accumulation of British and other ships and stores. Forty-seven British and American missionaries left for Shanghai and Nanking by Chinese.

Williams confirmed reports that Dr. Taylor, an American missionary, his wife and children, though warned to leave, persist in remaining at Nanking.

ENGLAND WILL RETAIN HONG KONG AS COLONY

Great Britain Will Not Surrender City and Mainlands Leased to America to Demands Made by Natives.

LONDON, March 30.—The British and Mexican governments have agreed upon adjustment of pecuniary claims for losses to British nationals incurred through revolution in Mexico. It was announced today and a convention is being concluded between the two countries.

HONG KONG, March 30.—Great Britain will retain Hong Kong as a colony, the governor of Hong Kong announced today. Acting on instructions from London, the governor informed the community that Great Britain would not surrender either the island of Hong Kong or leased mainland territories in response to Native demands.

BIG GENERAL STRIKE MAY MATERIALIZE

Expect Huge Tie-up; Two Foreign River-Boats Fired Upon by Forces at Nanking; Ships Escape Without Damage.

SHANGHAI, March 29.—Thursday, (12:30 a. m.)—Another general strike similar to that which caused trouble several weeks ago, tonight, seemed likely to be called in Shanghai, according to a report received here. It was learned from a reliable source that the General Labor Union leaders had decided to call a general strike almost solely at British industries.

SHANGHAI, March 30 (5:20 p. m.)—Five hundred rifle shots were fired at two foreign river boats at Nanking last night, but the vessels escaped without damage and today were enroute down the Yangtze to Szechwan, under escort of the U. S. S. Paul Jones. The vessels were Linxow and Tatung, which left Nanking for Chinkiang.

Two other foreign river boats were ordered enroute along Avenue Edward VII which divides the French concession from the international settlement because of an incident last night during which Chinese mole mines burned the gates to the concession. An iron gate was removed from its hinges and stolen by the Chinese.

Authorities said the erection of additional barbed wire defenses between the concession and the settlement did not indicate any doubt of the French intentions. Americans living in the concession have been removing to the settlement and the exodus continued today.

There are 1700 French troops available for the defense of the 12 mile portion of the concession circumference where it abuts on Chinese territory, but a large portion of the troops are natives from French colonies.

Nationalist authorities today took over control of foreign owned buildings in Chinkeiang. Two Japanese and one French national remained at Kiangchow and D. H. Clark and H. Hartog, Baptists, are the only missionaries remaining at Nanking.

PLANES LAUNCHED FROM BATTLESHIPS VISIT LIGHTHOUSE

WITH THE UNITED STATES FLEET IN THE CARIBBEAN, March 30.—The lighthouse keeper on lonely Navassa Island has been given an unexpected thrill as a result of the war game now in progress in the western Caribbean. Planes launched from the decks of battleships by means of catapults have been appearing from nowhere in the neighborhood of his help.

After inspection they fly away again. The U. S. S. Scattle, under the command of Captain and "battleship" in about 250 miles south of Navassa. Fleet operations incident to the strategic maneuvers continued today in perfect weather. The scouting fleet, commanded by Vice Admiral Ashley H. NATIONALISM SPREADING TO PHILIPPINES

Aspirations of Filipinos Has Been Spurred by Cantonese Success, Says Pedro Guevara; Want Separation.

WASHINGTON, March 30.—China's nationalistic movement in the Philippines and stimulating an intensified campaign for island independence. Philippine leaders here today expressed the conviction that the political ascendancy of the Cantonese nationalistic movement will lead to a new balance of power in the Far East.

Pedro Guevara, resident commissioner of the Philippines in the United States department of State, said today: "Since the national aspirations of the Filipino people have been spurred by the Chinese successes," adding that a campaign for independence from United States supervision will consequently result.

"We feel the triumph of the Chinese nationalistic movement will mean the failure of the imperialistic policy of Japan, which will then become a factor in promoting democracy in the Far East," he said. "As democratic Japan would never renounce the independence of the Philippines, and we believe this fact will help to assure the fears of Americans who now oppose independence."

Isidro Galatind, the other Philippine resident commissioner in Washington, is convinced complete immediate independence is the only solution for Filipino aspirations. He is intensifying the Filipino independence campaign and thinks the new situation in the Orient will influence Congress to regard the Filipino claim more earnestly.

"The Orient has awakened, and the Filipinos are not less patriotic in their national sentiment than are the Chinese," he said.

"Those who underestimate the importance of the national success in China have failed to understand the present world movement toward democracy. The stable government provided by the Jones law as the prerequisite to Philippine independence has been established and in successful operation for 11 years. During that time the United States has failed to act in accordance with its covenant."

350 WORKERS ARE TRAPPED IN COAL MINE

Three Hundred Men Are Hoisted to Surface; Two Rescue Teams Working Below; Blast Far Removed from Workmen.

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., March 30.—With 350 men still entombed at 1:30 o'clock today in the No. 5 of the Pennsylvania Coal and Coke company at Earsfield, 14 miles east of Erie, Pa., rescue workers were confident that at least two hundred and fifty were in the area of an explosion that wrecked the drift mine at 12:20 today.

Three hundred men in the mine at the time of the explosion were hoisted to the surface and leaving only eight unaccounted for. Two rescue teams equipped with gas masks worked below.

The exact location of the explosion was not known at first, but the face of the shaft, 15 feet from the face of the entry, it was far removed from the section where most of the men were at work.

Two rescue workers were overcome shortly after they descended but were brought to the surface and revived.

No one has been rescued since 1:20 p. m. and officials could not say the extent of the explosion. Hundreds of yards away, however, were knocked off, leaving only a few men in the mine office was wrecked, and the explosion was felt for miles around.

The rescue office of the company it was said that in lack of complete information the hope was held that 300 men may have escaped the explosion and may be rescued.

No one had contacted the mine at 1:30 p. m. pending arrival of mine rescue team from Johnstown and other rescue teams from the nearby mines, doctors and nurses. The Johnstown chapter of the Red Cross had four nurses and two first aid men and four men from the nearby mine centers of Cambria county have sent aid of all kinds.

The mine is a drift operation, normally employing between 300 and 400 men. The mine was working full time. Safety lamps were used and officials are at a loss to account for the explosion.

At 2:30 p. m. it was reported several men had escaped by way of air shafts from section No. 15, but that they knew nothing of the fate of their fellows.

ALTOONA, Pa., March 30.—The Pennsylvania Coal and Coke company, with headquarters in Erie city, was today being told the explosion occurred, has little information of the disaster. The company officials said the mine is equipped with three sections known as "A," "B" and "C" sections. Early investigations revealed that the "B" section is not involved in the explosion.

At the last word from Earsfield, the fate of the men in the mine was not known.

The explosion was terrific, being felt at Eriehaven and as far as well as surrounding country. It was caused by gas.

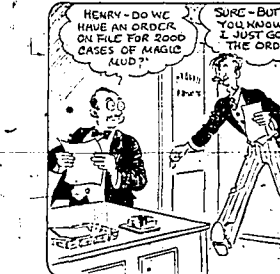
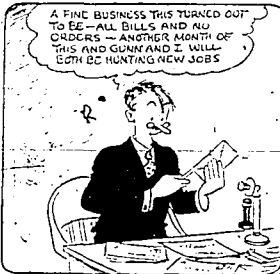

WRONG CENSUS ESTIMATE

According to the latest estimate of the census bureau the eleven far western states now have a population of 10,898,407, almost two millions more than in 1920. A growth of 19.7 per cent in seven years is indicated by these estimates, as against an increase of only 9.9 per cent for the rest of the country. California, Colorado and Washington now have over a million inhabitants each. California's population reaching 4,816,000, passing Massachusetts and approaching the fifth state, Michigan, with a narrow margin of only 57,000 separating the two.

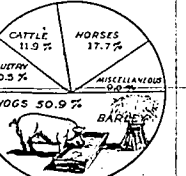
That's fine, except that a counting of noses at this time would reveal wide departures from the estimates, says Sunset Magazine. Arizona, for instance, has not gained the 110,000 the state is credited with, neither has Montana increased its population by 147,000 since 1920. Idaho is likewise in the same boat. These states increased their population very rapidly during the war-induced metal and farming boom; when the boom collapsed, their pace was slackened and has been slow ever since.

On the other hand, Oregon, Washington, Colorado and California have exceeded their estimated rate of increase by a large margin. It is safe to credit California with a population close to five millions today as against the census estimate of 4,316,000; instead of the 1,538,000 estimated by the census bureau, Washington probably has 1,800,000. Oregon has either exceeded 1,000,000 or is dangerously close to it, and Colorado's estimated 1,059,000 should be lifted to 1,200,000 bringing the total population of the far west to the 11,600,000 mark.

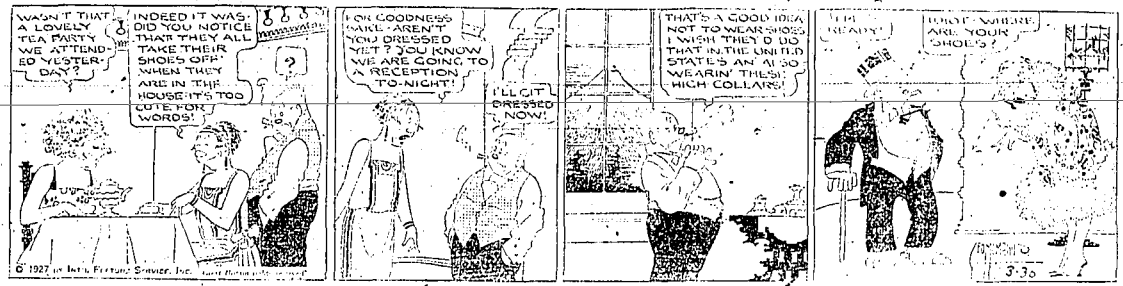

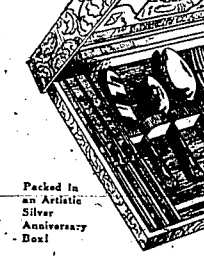
