

# CHEN OBJECTS TO FIRING ON HANKING

## 6 Killed, 5 Hurt; Big Mine Explosion EXPRESSES REGRET OVER DEATHS; OUSTING CHIANG DANGEROUS TO FOREIGNERS

### BLAST WAS CAUSED BY COAL DUST

WASHINGTON, Pa., April 2. (UP)—Six miners were instantly killed in an explosion of coal dust and gas which had accumulated in the workings of the Okeburg mine of the Bethlehem Mine corporation at Okeburg, near here.

The interior of the mine was wrecked. Five men were injured.

The dead:

Frank Smith, married; Henry Kelley, single; William Gibson, single; Eastman White, married; Tony Stule, single, and Joseph Jordan, married.

The Washington county coroner said the blast was caused by a coal dust shot off by a miner engaged in excavating shelves of coal.

The mine is operated on the open shop plan.

### GOVERNOR MOODY ORDERS RANGERS TO PATROL TOWN

BORGER, Texas, April 2. (UP)—Bandits and gunmen who have plagued Borger for months "paid law" today as ten Texas Rangers sped their way here from Austin on orders of Governor Dan Moody.

A request by Borger citizens for martial law to drive out the lawless element was answered by the dispatch of the rangers, traditionally famous officers.

The unexpected wave of crime and "outlaw" in recent weeks was climaxed yesterday when Deputy Sheriff Pat Kenyon and A. L. Terry were murdered on the roadside near here, apparently obtained in a revolver battle with bandits.

Two weeks ago Patrolman Cole Buchanan, picturesque Texas posse officer, was shot to death when he challenged a gang of men in the act of robbing a wholesale grocery house.

Lawlessness followed the oil boom into Borger. A number of persons have been slain in vice dens and dance halls.

Terry and Kenyon were the third and fourth officers to be killed within a year by bandits here.

### HAYNES MUST OBTAIN APPROVAL ON MATTERS

WASHINGTON, April 2. (UP)—A checkrein was placed today on Roy A. Haynes, new acting commissioner of prohibition, to prevent him having full control of the federal dry forces.

Acting Secretary of the Treasury W. C. Clegg, in a letter directing Haynes' full authority to decline in all prohibition matters—but first he must obtain the approval of Assistant Secretary of the Treasury L. C. Andrews.

Haynes, by this order, is directly under Andrews' supervision. All writs, subpoenas, appointments and administrative matters will be decided by the assistant secretary. Then the commissioner will be allowed to put the orders into effect.

### SURGEONS CUT MAN'S THROAT TO SAVE LIFE

JAMAICA, La., April 2. (UP)—Physicians cut the throat of Charles Collins to save his life. Collins was shot in the neck. The bullet punctured his windpipe. The wound caused his throat to swell, cutting off his air supply.

Physicians slashed his throat and inserted a silver tube in the windpipe.

### TROUBLE, FEAR HAS CAUSED MOBILIZATION

Ordering of Marines to Concentrate on West Coast Indicates Expectation of Disturbances.

WASHINGTON, April 2. (UP)—Ordering of 1200 marine troops to concentrate at San Diego, Cal., in readiness for Chinese service, is taken here today as indicating the administration's fear of further trouble and an expectation that the disturbed condition in China will last a long time.

The order for the new marine expeditionary force, the third, came only a few hours after Admiral C. S. Williams, commander of the Asiatic fleet, had reported the possibility of serious trouble south in the upper Yangtze valley, where nearly all Americans now have been evacuated.

Williams, it was learned today, asked for the concentration of other marines at San Diego when he requested 1200 more marines for Shanghai, which he expects to be 1500 bound for Shanghai are now proceeding across country and will sail on the transport Henderson within a week. The voyage will take 22 days.

### GAS TAXES NET IDAHO MILLION IN LAST YEAR

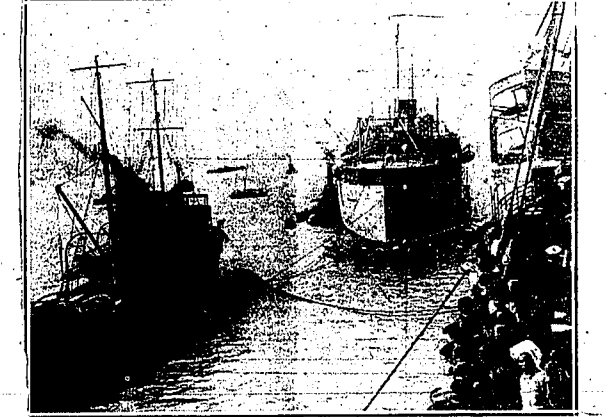
WASHINGTON, April 2. (UP)—Gasoline taxes collected by states in 1926 totaled \$187,000,237, the United States Bureau of Public Roads announced today. Forty-four states now impose gasoline taxes ranging from 1 cent to five cents a gallon. States that do not impose the tax are Illinois, Massachusetts, New Jersey and New York.

The collection by states includes: Arkansas, \$678,264; California, \$16,602,123; Colorado, \$2,091,746; Idaho, \$1,123,217; Montana, \$570,720; Nebraska, \$1,620,700; Nevada, \$762,851; Oklahoma, \$6,512,409; Oregon, \$3,233,829; Texas, \$5,255,886; Utah, \$1,258,989; Washington, \$3,152,057; Wyoming, \$568,583.

The revenue from the tax was allocated \$125,411,529 for state highways, \$42,600,679 for county and local roads and \$9,923,363 for miscellaneous purposes.

#### FOREST HIGHWAY FUND APPROVED BY GOVERNMENT

WASHINGTON, April 2. (UP)—Appropriations from the \$1,200,000 forest highway fund for July 1 have been approved for 11 western states and Alaska, the United States forest service announced today.

The amount which has been approved for Idaho is the third largest. California leads with \$275,000, Oregon is second with \$252,000, and Idaho third with \$102,200.

The amounts allotted, after setting aside equipment funds and amounts for confinement and maintenance, follows:

Alaska, \$201,500; Arizona, \$215,500; California, \$275,000; Colorado, \$192,000; Idaho, \$102,200; Minnesota, \$180,500; Montana, \$201,000; Nebraska, \$125,510; Nevada, \$25,507; New Mexico, \$185,000; Oregon, \$252,000; South Dakota, \$25,000; Utah, \$164,000; Washington, \$145,000; Wyoming, \$200,000.

The amounts programmed for each state will be devoted to local highways, maintaining existing roads and building new ones.

#### DRINKING IS PART OF NEW PSYCHOLOGY

WASHINGTON, April 2. (UP)—Liquor drinking by the younger generation today is part of the psychology of youth in throwing aside the veil that heretofore concealed from them the knowledge of life. In the opinion of Assistant Secretary of the Treasury, L. C. Andrews.

"Prohibition was brought into effect after a long struggle by the older generation," Andrews said in an interview with the United Press. "At the same time the younger generation was developing fast."

"The combination made an unfortunate team."

Andrews said one of the causes of drinking among the younger set is that old fashioned home life is no longer existent.

"Home life at present is greatly different from that of years ago," he continued. "In fact, home life of the past is gone—especially in the larger centers, and everybody is seeking entertainment outside. They, too, the generation of youth is characterized by genuineness, frankness and outspokenness. They do not believe in Santa Claus or the stock. They have learned true stories."

Andrews said he felt youth of today have no patience with hypocrisy heretofore practiced by elders. Conventions that always stood, especially that youngsters should not know the lot of things, are now characterized as "bunk" he said.

Claim Order to Diminish Commander Chiang Is Already Drafted; Would Leave Extremist Wing in Control; Making Situation Still More Dangerous to Foreigners in Hankow Area.

SHANGHAI, April 2. The Chinese government strongly protests announcement of Sankling by British and American embassies. It said a statement issued by it today by Eugene Chen, foreign minister, in reply to the government, and released to Shanghai by Admiral Houchi commanding the United States Vandeputer.

The Chinese cabinet today is in the midst of a session on the subject of Sankling. Chen said he had received the order from the foreign consulates and expressed regret over foreign casualties.

Chen said for safety of foreigners, he is pleased as a result of reports that general ordering the moderate Chiang Kai-shek as generalissimo of the southern armies has been drafted as a flanker. The order, it was understood, would not take effect for several days. The extremist wing of the generalissimo would be left in complete control if Chiang were turned out, it is more strongly anti-foreign than the central faction.

### MINERS WILL NOT AGREE TO LOWER WAGES

No Break Apparent Today in General Strike; Lewis Voices Workers' Feelings in Address

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., April 2. (UP)—No break was apparent today in the general strike that has crippled the unmined bituminous coal mines of the central competitive district for the past 30 hours.

The miners have indicated through a speech by John L. Lewis, international president of the United Mine Workers, that they will not accept the demands of the operators for lower wages, even though the lower wages shall be only for a term while conciliatory conferences are in session.

Lewis in a speech to several hundred miners at Taylorville, Ill., said: "We are willing to meet the operators at any time to negotiate any question, but they cannot force us to concede a wage reduction as the price of a conference for a new year."

### EDGAR WILKINS WAS KILLED BY MEXICAN BANDITS

MEXICO CITY, April 2. (UP)—The body of Edgar Mark Wilkins, United States citizen, kidnapped a week ago by Mexican bandits, was today being returned to Mexico City from Guadalajara.

The United States embassy, however, had received an official confirmation of reports that Wilkins had been found near Guadalajara. News had been expressed for several days that Wilkins might have been freed by the bandits, who demanded heavy ransom.

Wilkins had been kidnapped twice before. The United States embassy today had not notified of the discovery of his body.

### REQUEST SENDING TROOPS TO WINDY CITY ON TUESDAY

CHICAGO, April 2. (UP)—The military may be brought into Chicago today to safeguard the mayoralty election.

William Hale Thompson, republican candidate, and former mayor, through a lieutenant, has asked Governor Len Small to have the national guard in readiness to send to Chicago in event of trouble at the polls. Small's answer has not been received.

Thompson's request for troops— which would give the majority election the aspect of a military plebiscite—has been received by the republican candidate is Mayor William E. Devere, is trying to create a false hatred. Part of Thompson's main support is thought to negro districts of the south side.

In addition to the request for troops it became known that the police will maintain strict vigilance on Tuesday. Thirty-five machine gun squads will be in readiness. Despite the favorable official bulletin, anxiety over the king continues. In some quarters it was declared his condition was hopeless. Troops filled the streets of the city today as the government guarded against a possible revolt if the king dies.

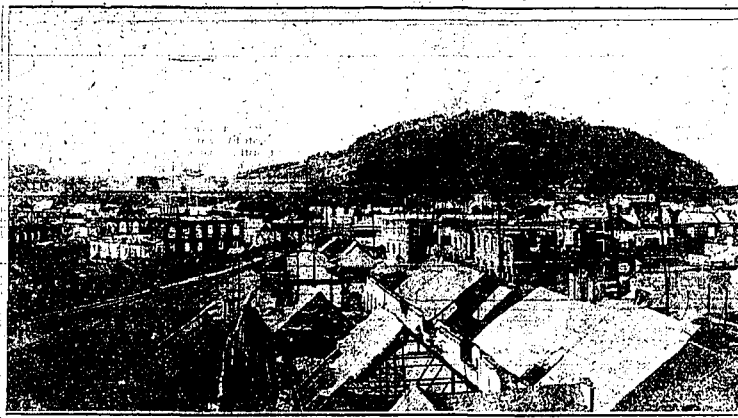

It is planned to abolish steps leading to the grandstand and install runways instead. A number of new boxes will be added.

At the meeting this week the board took steps toward seeding down unused parts of the ground and discussed other methods of beautification. There will be another meeting next Tuesday at which engagement of a secretary may be announced.

## FISH LICENSE OF 1926 GOOD FOR PRESENT

Miss Commissioner Thomas Expires Time Until the Issue of 1927 Has Been Received.

Fishing licenses for 1926 will be recognized until the 1927 licenses have been issued and received by vendors. It was stated today by E. E. Thomas, commissioner of fish and game for the state of Idaho who is here investigating conditions. The new licenses will be in hand in about two days, he said.

week. In the course of which damage to the foreign steamer at times was narrowly averted. 22 Chinese were killed or fatally injured and total native casualties amounted to 2,000, a municipal police report said.

Foreign Minister Chen's statement on the Nanking bombardment follows:  
"A competent investigation of the Nanking incident has led to the orders were the work of reactionaries who during continued hostilities following the defeat of the northern and white Russian mercenaries instigated brutal remnants and local troops to attack peaceful foreigners."  
"The British, American, French, and Chinese consulates were attacked and a few foreign lives were unfortunately lost and property was looted before order could be fully restored by the nationalists."

"From four to six foreigners were reported killed and about 50 were wounded. On the other hand, an estimate which now is being verified, places Chinese casualties as a result of the Anglo-American bombardment at more than 100 killed or wounded for every single foreign casualty."  
"While the nationalist government denounces the attack on Peking and other consulates at Nanking and deeply regrets the foreign casualties, it is strongly protesting against the bombardment of Nanking by British and American warships."

## CAMBRIDGE WINS ANNUAL BOAT RACE

HIP'S HOTEL, MOIT LAKE, England, April 2. (UP)—Cambridge won victory today in the 1926 renewal of the classic Inter-University boat race while thousands of spectators representing all classes of English society urged the victors from along the Thames course.

Cambridge won the toss and chose the Surrey side of the river, and a few minutes later the crews were away on the long pull around an elbow in the Thames. Tonight the winners will celebrate victory and the losers will suffer defeat with illustrious parties in London.  
Cambridge won by four lengths. It was officially established.  
The victory was the 38th for Cambridge since the inception of the race and the seventh post-war victory for Cambridge crews. Oxford has won only once since the war.

The time was 20 minutes, 46 seconds. The course record is 18 minutes, 29 seconds, established by Oxford in 1911.

## ZONING PLAN APPROVED BY CITY COUNCIL

Movement Toward Putting Into Effect the System in Twin Falls Takes Form at Special Session.

The Twin Falls city council last evening at a special session took steps toward the adoption of a zoning ordinance under the new law enacted by the late legislature at the request of this city. Resolutions explaining the purpose of the council were presented. Hereofore zoning was locally permissible only in cities of the first class.

During the present administration a great deal of study has been given to this problem and an amendment to the statutes was drafted and presented to the legislature which was adopted. Much of the work looking toward the adoption of the system here was done by E. R. Kasper, city engineer and finance, who is now ill in the hospital. An advisory committee will be appointed Monday evening in furtherance of the plan.

The resolutions adopted last evening, after setting forth the amendments to the statutes, read:  
Now, therefore, be it resolved, that this council immediately appoint a committee consisting principally of citizens of the said city, until the taking effect of the said amendment to the said statute shall be appointed;

And be it further resolved, that all persons contemplating the construction of a building of any kind or the establishing of a business of any kind within the city of Twin Falls, be and they are, hereby most earnestly urged to advise with and co-operate with the members of the said committee;

And be it further resolved, that, until a city zoning ordinance is finally adopted, this council withhold, as far as it has authority so to do, the granting of any permit for the construction of any building or the establishing or carrying on of any kind of business which in the judgment of the said committee of the city council shall appear as likely to be in conflict with the true purpose and intent of the zoning ordinance intended to be adopted.

## CHECKING UP ON SHIPMENT

With a view of determining the point of greatest demand for Idaho products, the Twin Falls chamber of commerce is sending a special committee to various cities and ports. Returns for 1925 have been received for Los Angeles, later reports not being available. In that year \$3,550,000 worth of hutter, 3,828,083 pounds of cheese, 51,896 pounds of dressed poultry, 62,048 cases of eggs, 2572 cars of potatoes, 413 cars of apples, 15 cars of onions, two cars of prunes and one car went to that city from Idaho. At that time Idaho's total export of cattle, 1429 calves, 35,233 head of hogs and 420 sheep were received.
