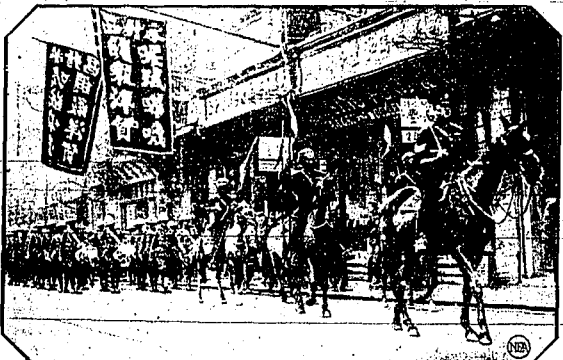

RANGERS FIGHT COYOTE PACKS TO SAVE DEER

Special Dispatch to The Times. GLACIER PARK, Mont., April 4. Packs of ravaging coyotes moving in army formations have herded hundreds of deer into the snow-filled valleys along the western slope of the Continental divide outside the boundary of Glacier National Park during the winter months. They have starved and slaughtered more than 90 per cent of their quarry, too. Forest rangers sent out by the Montana State Game commission yesterday to this section on snow shoes, killing many of the wolves and saving most of the trapped deer. The frantic deer stripped most of the smaller trees and bushes of all available forage, being forced to starve in small areas, unable to escape to better forage on account of the deep snow and attacking coyotes. The corridors of coyotes held them penned in so that the wolves were able to feast upon those that finally died of starvation. During the early part of March, considerable relief work was done by the rangers, driving off the coyotes and hauling hay to the deer on top sledges. This relief work was carried on over a wide front in the Flathead, Big Creek, North Park and Blackfoot forest regions. Forest Rangers Harry Thiel, M. H. Mendahl and Roy Hutchinson, recently returned from a four weeks snow-shoe trip up the South Park River as far as Big Prairie. They found a herd of 500 deer at Big Prairie surrounded by an angry mob of rangers. Immediately started back into the country with dog sleds to feed hay to the deer until spring melts the snow sufficiently to allow the animals to dig for and eat their natural

food supplies. They will neither poison nor use gas to kill the leading coyotes. "Hays will be hauled on the dog sleds from Spotted Bear and Elk Park ranger stations, where a large quantity was stored last fall. The rangers report the elk in the South Park are not suffering more than usual and many pictures taken prove these animals are in no certain condition. The elk are larger and heavier than the deer and can work forage and are more able to plow through the deep snow in search of forage. They also are better able to withstand the attacks of the predatory animals. Although the year turned out to be entirely on hay and snow the elk are not in any immediate danger.

Sweet Clover Harmful in the Alfalfa Fields

Farmers who wish to sell a good quality of alfalfa seed cannot afford to allow sweet clover plants to remain in the crop. A few hours of close sowing in removing these plants will well repay in the price received for alfalfa seed. The plants can be pulled or cut below the surface of the ground. Most buyers of seed object to the presence of sweet clover in alfalfa and a small number of it causes a loss in reputation. Some have asked a capital court to annul her sales and various forms of evidence. Buyers of certified seed prefer to receive good seed and not a mixture. Sweet clover is a hindrance to the production of superior alfalfa seed. Through the extensive planting of sweet clover the seeds have become very general in the ground and it has become increasingly difficult to grow alfalfa without some sweet clover appearing in the seed crop either from volunteer plants in the field or from seedling the alfalfa after sweet clover.

ORIENTAL PEACH MOTH DISCUSSED

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture)

The oriental peach moth, which attacks cherry, young growing twigs and ripening fruit, has been reported as pest of peaches, quinces, and other fruits, says the United States Department of Agriculture. As yet no one cultural practice or insecticide has been found which will control this insect.

Nicotine sulphate sprays, while killing some of the eggs, are not a satisfactory remedy. Certain other measures employed likewise give only partial relief. Investigators in the bureau of entomology of the department, and several state agricultural experiment stations are endeavoring to find a satisfactory method of controlling the pest. The oriental peach moth is attacked by many parasites, and in their uses lies a strong possibility of successful control.

The rapid and extensive spread of the insect is attributed chiefly to shipments of imported fruit, and nursery trees, but has also been carried in cocoons. The pest is thought to have been introduced into this country from Japan about 1913. But its original home is in the mountains of Connecticut, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Delaware, Virginia and the District of Columbia, and since that time has for several years had infestations ranging in high as 70 to 100 per cent wormy fruit.

Dr. H. C. G. C. "The Oriental Peach Moth," contains a description of the insect and also considerable information relative to its distribution, injury to fruit trees, as well as other data. A copy of the new publication may be obtained free, as long as the supply lasts, upon application to the Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.

Spreaders Do Not Help Efficiency of Sprays

Glue, calcium caseinate and soap of various kinds used as "spreaders" in common spray mixtures are employed against the insect pests and diseases of apples failed to give any appreciable increase in the killing efficiency of the sprays in tests carried on by the entomologists at the New York State Experiment station at Geneva. This statement is made by the station entomologist in a report of the work of the station for the past year. The report is available for free distribution to all those interested.

"No appreciable improvement in the killing efficiency of common spray mixtures was derived from the incorporation of such materials," says the station entomologist with reference to "spreaders." "Theoretical considerations suggest the desirability of building calcium caseinate to the lime sulphate and lead arsenate spray as a means of avoiding certain undesirable chemical reactions. The casein material also serves a very useful purpose in the preparation of such sprays as sulphur suspensions and lubricating oil emulsions."

The report also touches on many other lines of work having to do with the control of insect pests of fruit and vegetables, and on the numerous other activities of the station research workers.

More and Better Grapes

Severe pruning seems best for grapes. The Michigan Agricultural college, which has been trying this method out, says that it makes heavier yields, larger and lighter clusters, larger berries of better color, and that the grapes ripen earlier than when pruned lightly. But the crop is likely to be smaller the first year that the vines are severely cut back.

Horticultural Hints

Set peach, apple, and other fruit trees.

Watch the young fruit trees for rabbit injury. It is safer to protect them with a collar of paper.

Manure will not cure a sick plant when it is sick from fungus or insect pests. It must have insecticides or fungicides, arsenic and nicotine preparation, and bordeaux mixture.

The variety of peaches which seem to be taking the lead in commercial peach orchards are Alberta and Hale, with the latter bringing the better price in the market. Some Heavy Cans are being grown, but they bring less in the market.

The green grape plant is named after Sir William Gage, who popularized its cultivation early in the eighteenth century.

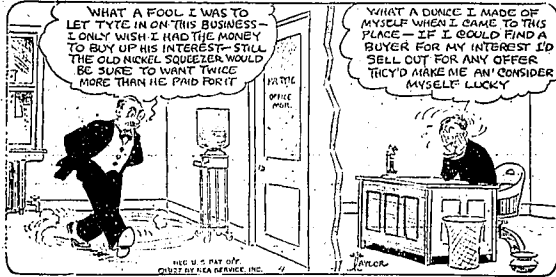
Planting raspberries 2 feet apart in rows 6 feet apart will require 2,600 plants to the acre. At 2 by 6, 2,722 will be needed.

Raspberries, blackberries, currants and gooseberries are all adapted to January pruning. And by removing dead wood—burning it—there will get rid of a good deal of fungus disease.

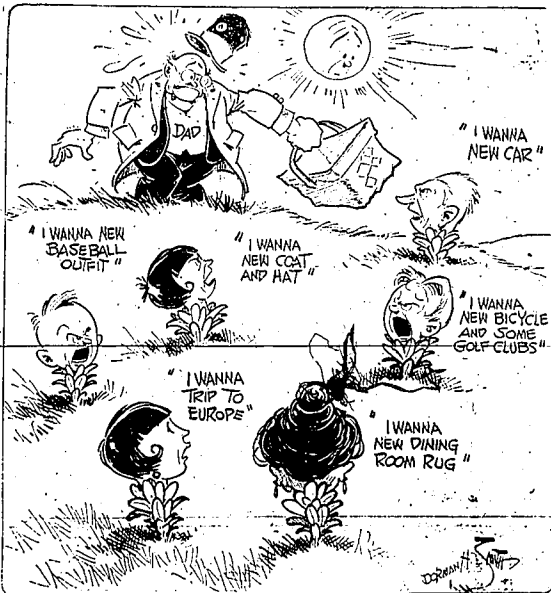

Manure Benefits Heavy Soil in Fruit Orchard

Applied to orchards on a heavy soil, the benefits of manure are equally advantageous, or even more so than those on light soils. While the latter are made more supple, the heavier soil is made lighter and easier to work. The individual soil particles are kept from running together and thus there is less hardening of the surface after a rain or irrigation. The larger the proportion of manure applied, the greater will be the extent to which this will be true. Combining the chemical and physical effects of manure in the soil, it would seem difficult to find a more suitable fertilizer for orchards. While the chemical plant food elements which it contains are not so readily available for the plant's use as in the case with some commercial fertilizers, it accomplishes the important purpose of adding the building element of most soils—humus. In some sections a much more satisfactory cover crop growth—further increasing the organic matter of the soil—is secured following.

SPUD ACREAGE INCREASED BY 13 PER CENT

Special Dispatch to The Times. UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, MOSCOW, April 4.—A serious probability that an excessive acreage of potatoes will be planted this season is seen by R. C. Engberg, associate professor of economics, writing in the current issue of the Idaho economist bulletin.

Reports received from farmers in all sections of the state indicate that the acreage needed to produce the crop will be increased approximately 13 per cent, according to the article. Under average growing conditions it is pointed out, such an increase probably will result in considerably lower prices.

"In considering the potato situation," Professor Engberg writes, "one must bear in mind the fluctuation in acreage and the yield during the past seasons. The high price in 1927, that other crops were being low in 1926, led to the planting of an excessive acreage in 1922 and to the production of a bumper crop. The following season the acreage was sharply cut, but a good yield was secured and the price continued low. In 1924 the acreage was again sharply reduced, but the yield of 12 bushels per acre was by far the highest ever harvested and the resulting low prices caused great losses to the growers. Acreage was reduced to 1925 levels, but the yield was only a small increase in the acreage, a larger increase being prevented by the high cost of seed and the fear of over-production and low prices.

"The acreage has not been normally low, but the price above the average for two seasons in succession. The price being received by farmers on September 1, 1925, averaged \$1.42 per bushel, and the year previous \$1.57, whereas previously potato prices have rarely been high for two years in succession. Under the circumstances a general increase in planting seems inevitable."

Some Vegetables Should Be Sown Early in Spring

The seed of certain kinds of vegetables should be sown early in the spring for best results, states W. T. Mason, Canadian horticulturist. They should be prepared to begin operations in the garden as soon as the soil is dry enough. Those plants of which the leaves are eaten which should be started early are lettuce, spinach, mustard and cress, and there is little danger of planting them too soon. Other vegetables which are grown for their bulbs or roots may also be planted at the same time, though they are not quite so hardy as those grown for their leaves. These are onions, carrots, beets, parsnips and early turnips. Peas are about as early as these but may be sown if the weather turns cold and wet. However, it usually pays to plant peas at the same time as the others, as early-sown peas give a much better crop in a rule than if sown late. Other vegetables which should be started early to get best results are cauliflowers, tomatoes and melons. The latter will not stand any frost, hence the plants must be protected in hubs or cold frames or in the house until danger of frost is over. However, cabbage and cauliflower, if well hardened off before setting out, will stand several degrees of frost.

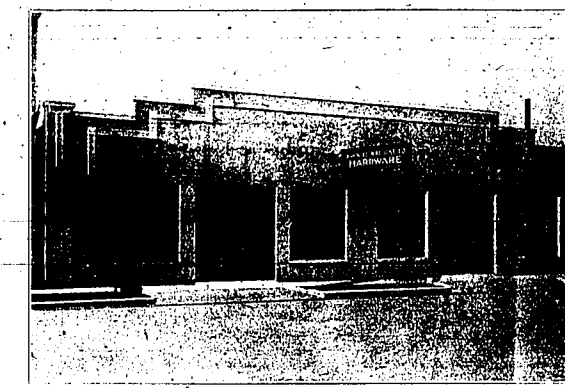
