

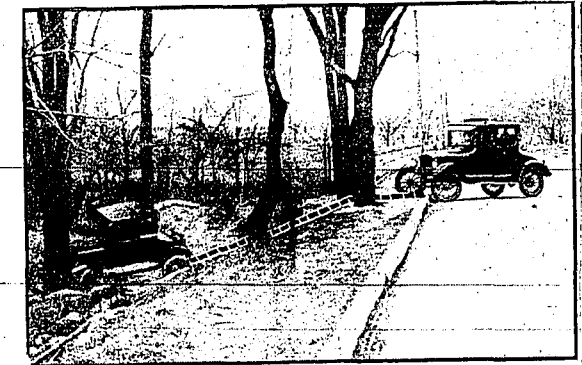

# MEMORIAL WILL BE BUILT SOON AT U. OF IDAHO

Special Dispatch to The Times.—(UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, April 5.—Construction of Idaho's memorial army and gymnasium is well advanced and the estimated cost for occupancy and use next fall is forecast in a statement issued by Dwight Leeper, Lawson president of the Idaho Memorial association. When informed of the details of the state bond education in approving the proposal submitted by the association, Mr. Leeper said that immediate steps would be taken to obtain bids and to start actual work.

The proposal accepted by the board of education provides that the association build an army and gymnasium costing between \$250,000 and \$300,000 on the university campus.

The association, according to Mr. Leeper, now has on hand approximately \$75,000 in cash and pledges, and this will be augmented by the sale of bonds in the amount of \$200,000. The university will pay an annual rental for the use of the site of the building over a period of 20 years, at which time the building will be turned over to the university. A principal feature of the structure will be the historical character which will contain tablets bearing the names of all fighting men who have died in the World war. The building is to be approximately 210 by 220 feet and will be the largest building on the campus. Architecture is of the collegiate-Gothic type, in harmony with other new buildings on the campus. The gymnasium itself will provide seats for 3500 persons at a cost of \$100,000 for 4000 seats used in an auditorium. Plans and specifications are at complete, and the architect, J. W. Atwood, is the designer.

cal, but none was injured. Police were on guard at the precinct and ran to the front door, opening fire on the machine gun. It sped away but one of the occupants was seen to fall and is believed to have been hit.

CHICAGO, April 5 (UP)—Five thousand police, including 25 machine gun squads, were on duty today in Chicago's greatest strike against lawlessness in the three-armed machine gun squad.

Despite these precautions, two democratic precinct headquarters were bombed shortly before dawn and one was injured. Previous to this there had been one fatal shooting and numerous police raids which yielded a harvest of guns—no attempts were made to safeguard the election.

There was a ray cast in the skies and forecasts of rain before midnight but veteran political observers said this would not prevent the greatest turnout of voters in the city's history. Nearly a million voters are expected.

The three mayoralty candidates, Mayor William E. Dever, Democrat, former mayor William Hale Thompson, Republican, and Dr. John Dill Robertson, Independent, each predicted victory by a wide margin.

Within 10 minutes after the polls opened election commissioners started receiving complaints that gangs were loitering about the polling places. One gunman was arrested. The police quickly moved to the scene and arrested a man with a machine gun. The man was shot in the chest and died. The police were alerted by James Holan and which later had become a precinct headquarters. It was run by the blast. The explosion was almost simultaneous.

The first outbreak of violence came about 10 hours before opening of the polls at 6 a. m. gave the mobilized police their first warning, said a police spokesman. Five expert marksmen, fired through the silent Loop as soon as the machine gun was reported. No one was found near the unattended precinct headquarters.

The machine gun was that of Vincent Drucel, the schemer, who was shot in death by police. It had been arrested for carrying a weapon. Drucel was a gang leader and heir to the mantle of the late John Dill Robertson, a bootlegger. When he was arrested he attempted to slay Patrolman Daniel Lewis, the officer opened fire and killed Drucel.

ure of 171 Americans from the Tientsin district, leaving 119 Americans there.

Runners that area had been allotted among the Chinese civilian population here frightened foreign residents today, but the report was unverified.

SHANGHAI, April 5 (UP)—The Shanghai foreign settlement was excited today by publication in the Herald owned North China Daily News of affidavits charging unprovoked attacks against white women at Nan-tang. While indignation arose among foreigners, unprovoked attacks among natives throughout the Yangtze valley.

Greater danger of native riots appeared to be at hand which was being hastily evacuated by Americans of Amoy.

At Hankow, where Japanese and natives clashed Sunday, anti-foreign feeling was renewed. Two Japanese were killed and the vicissitudes was unprovoked. It was reported.

There has been no information in London or Washington bearing on the North China Daily News statement that foreign women were unprovokedly attacked or that the facts at Nan-tang had been confirmed. United States Consul John K. Davis, who with his wife and children and other foreigners were beleaguered by the Chinese on Standard Oil Hill, reported to the United States State department that there had been two attempts at remaining at the hotel.

Members of the Japanese colony at Hankow charged the attack on the missionaries there was carefully organized and pre-arranged, although it ostensibly grew from a direct display of sympathy with scenes and postal employees who already had walked out. The situation was reported to be growing rapidly worse, although the Chinese remained relatively quiet. Native clerks were heckled on their way to work.

# FARM NOTES

Door sills mean poverty-stricken farm homes.

Sow beans every ten days. The first bean crop is the best. It doesn't pay to make the same crop hear too much.

A day off occasionally to visit and study low successful farmers do it in a wise use of their time in a long season.

Leafhoppers, good green color, soft stems, and freedom from weeds and brush are the best indications of high feed value in alfalfa hay.

Little potatoes are not good for seed. The Ohio agricultural experiment station says, unless you know they come from high yielding disease-free hills.

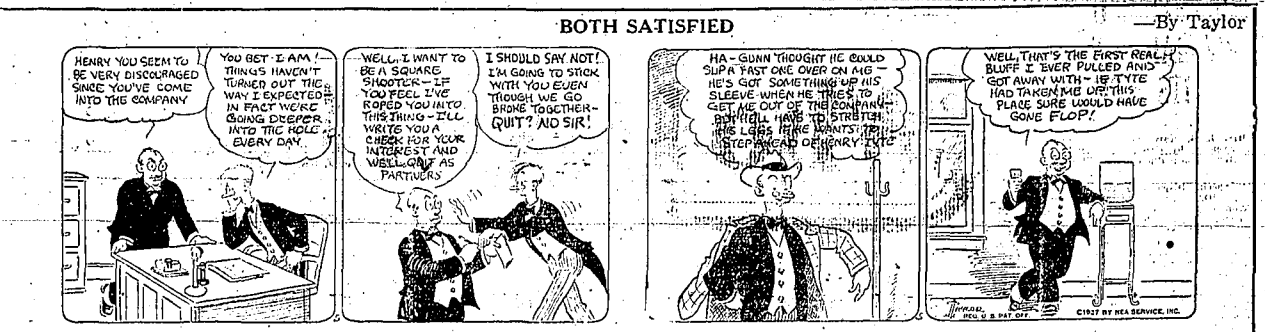

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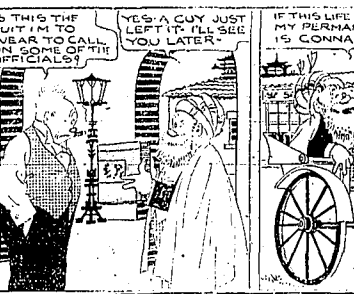
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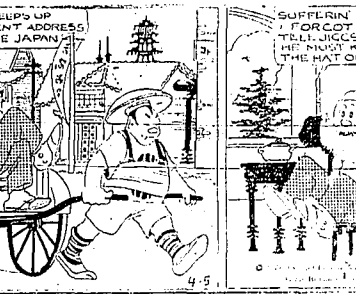
