## FAIR, UNEASY

### Earthquake Shakes Chile; 50 Dead

#### FALLING WALLS TAKE HEAVIEST TOLL; 100 HURT

Santiago Streets Crowded with Persons Wearing Night Clothes.

SANTIAGO, Chile, April 14.—A violent earthquake rocked Santiago at 1:30 a. m. today, taking a heavy toll in life and damage. More than 50 persons were killed and 100 injured. It was reported as 4.5 violent.

Deaths and injuries resulted principally from falling walls. Some buildings were cracked and others were wrecked by the shocks, which left half the city in darkness.

The quake which came when most of the city was in bed, caused a panic through Santiago. Within a few minutes after the shock the streets were crowded with persons, many in night clothes. Open squares and parks were thronged for the rest of the night, although some returned to their beds.

Bienville, La., April 14.—A major earthquake today killed 20 persons and injured 100. The quake was felt in the cities of Yaguajay, Concepcion and Antofagasta, however, suffered little damage.

Washington, April 14.—Newspapers today were led by the Weather Bureau today for the Mississippi valley and other midwestern sections.

# SPUD HEARING FOR TWIN-FALLS APRIL 18

Dulce, April 14.—John S. Welch, commissioner of Agriculture, announced today that public hearings will be held in the potato production sections of Idaho to determine what changes, if any, are necessary in the potato grading and branding regulations, which have been in effect since January 1, 1927.

Potato growers and dealers in the state seem to still disagree on certain points of the grading and branding regulations. In order that the department may be properly guided in drafting the new regulations it is thought best that meetings be held in every potato producing section.

Several questions will be placed for consideration at these meetings: Whether branded bags shall be used as containers for potato grading below U. S. No. 1, and whether a commercial grade shall be established. It is thought best that the most important questions upon which the growers and dealers will be asked for an opinion.

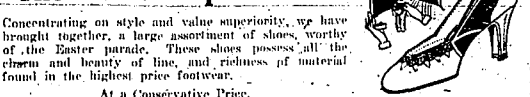

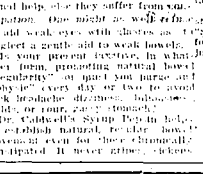

# FARMERS ARE URGED TO PUT IN BEET CROP

P. A. Harvey, Appeals to Growers to Plant Beets and Sugar Beets in the Mill and Securing of Beets.

Appeal is made by P. A. Harvey to farmers to plant more sugar beets in order to secure the extra money received by the Amalgamated Sugar Company for a total of 5000 acres, which in addition to the extra money received will insure the running of the factory here this fall. In a communication to the Times, Mr. Harvey says: "It appears that there is still 500 acres needed to get the highest price allowed—\$200 per ton. Now here is an assured price with a possible yield of from 12 to 16 tons per acre and big proceeds for a sugar crop. Now with potatoes also practically a sure yield, but an unknown price and very likely a greatly reduced price from that paid for the past two years because the United States average has been increased a large percentage and a big acreage almost assured in every section of the country. It would insure good policy in 'try out the beets,' once more and increase the acreage considerably more than at the present time. The assured price guaranteed by the sugar factory will all these makes better planting, while with potatoes, onions and even beans, the market price in this unknown quantity and quality, the yield, the lesser the market price. Every farmer who will change 10 acres of potatoes to beets will surely find he has made a wise move when he markets his crop in the fall. 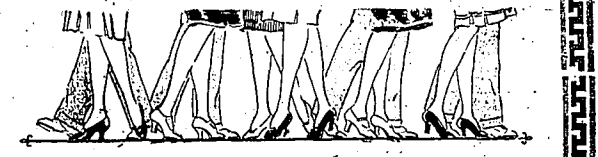

It also seems apparent, however, that Ty Cobb and Eddie Collins alone will not make an American League team "win" out of the Philadelphia Athletics and that Bill Terry at Al Tyson may turn the New York Giants into a National League championship club.

The majority of the critics pined for the Athletics as favorite in the American League because of Cobb and Collins.

But the opinion now seems to be that the offensive value of the two old stars will not be up to standard and that a weakness in defense will be more than can be made up by the hitting and scoring ability and the husbandly status of Cobb, Collins, and Zach Wheat.

The Athletics also seem to be more too strong in first base in the complimentary things that have been

said about them, a high priced infielder.

Those who did not pick the Giants to win the National League pennant thought that was a slight weakness and unreliable fit, a base play would keep McGraw's team out of the world series. It would see, however, that the outfield problem has been solved by Al Tyson and that Bill Terry is a good first baseman.

Tyson came up to the Giants as a highly touted outfielder last year but he was in poor health all during the season and made such a poor showing that he was hardly considered when McGraw was reconstructing his outfield.

Terry has been with the club for three years but he never had a chance to show regularly as long as George Kelly was holding down left base and that discouraged him. His ability was not tested but his playing time was not better.

The confidence that a regular job on a national contender brings in a young player has had an obvious effect upon Terry and it may make him the most valuable first baseman in the league.

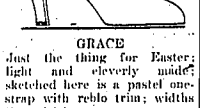

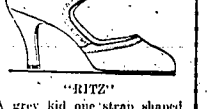

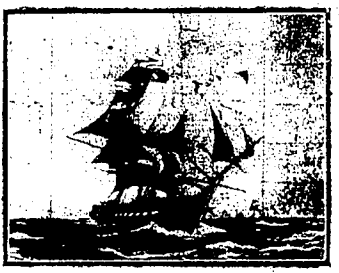
